TRAVELS IN AOTEAROA THE LAND OF THE LONG WHITE CLOUD

On a dark and wet evening recently, while seated behind the wheel at a very congested junction, I listened to a radio commentator mention the time and date. What a jolt to the memory! Exactly twelve months to the day I was in a situation and place that contrasted totally with the present one.

I was on the open road, driving contentedly in the Land of the Long White Cloud (It's Maori name), or New Zealand, it's more modern name. I was heading for the town of Cromwell but more precisely the local Catholic Church with it's unique title, the Irish Martyrs. I was intrigued: How did it happen? Who was responsible for this little piece of Irish Church history in this rather remote part of New Zealand's South Island? I was hoping to find some answers to these questions that were beginning to perplex.

I was aware of Irish place names, in particular county names. While driving through Alexandra, a large and pleasant town, I had noted Killarney St., Galway St., and Limerick St. Certainly some Irish settlers had put down roots in this area but it was the Scottish settlers who had moved into & established themselves in great numbers in this district of Central Otago.

For its modest size, New Zealand has an astonishing diversity of landscapes and natural attractions, ranging from geysers to glaciers, rugged peaks to rushing rivers and endless beaches to ancient beech forests. In this beautiful and unspoilt country, it is impossible to resist the call of nature.

This was my sixth visit to New Zealand and my impressions were still of the warmth and friendliness of the people, many of whom went out of their way to be helpful and hospitable during my travels while on my sabbatical year.

Like our own country, New Zealand is heavily dependant on agriculture. It is sometimes referred to as 'the world's biggest farm'. The old adage on counting sheep certainly comes to mind with over 24,000 sheep farms stocked with over 50 million sheep - yes, impossible to count. So easy to count the two cars that I had passed on the open road after one hour of driving.

Back to the reality of the Cork Suburban Traffic Jam, no longer a burden. The bright and vivid memories of the Land of the Long White Cloud had raised the Maori Spirits and I was touched by them again.

Lk. 20:27-38. *Lect I:930*

These final Sundays of the year highlight the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.

12 Monday Wis. 1:1-7. Ps. 138. Lk. 17:1-6. *Lect II:412*
The Book of Wisdom was written in the second century BC for large Jewish community in Alexandria. It encourages fidelity to traditional teachings, but is influenced by some Greek thought. It begins by teaching that religious faith and virtuous living are the basis of true wisdom, and lead to immortal life.

13 Tuesday Wis. 2:23-3:9. Ps. 33. Lk. 17:7-10. *Lect II:414*
"God did not bring death, and he does not delight in the death of the living....It was through the devil's envy that death entered the world." CCC, 413.

14 Wednesday Wis. 6:1-11. Ps. 81. Lk. 17:11-19. *Lect II:416*
Rulers who acquire true wisdom will show concern for the poor and weak, the oppressed and alienated.

15 Thursday Wis. 7:22-8:1. Ps. 118. Lk. 17:20-25. *Lect II:418*
In praise of Wisdom, its nature and origin. This Wisdom, close to God, with his power and creating with him, anticipates the theology of the Spirit of New Testament times. A perfect number of 21 attributes are given to describe Wisdom.

16 Friday Wis. 13:1-9. Ps. 18. Lk. 17:26-37. *Lect II:420*
Idolatry in whatever form is to be condemned. The study of nature should lead us to acknowledge the transcendent God, universal Creator. The beauty of the world is a work of art reflecting the beauty of its creator.

17 Saturday Wis. 18:14-16. 19:6-9. Ps. 104. Lk. 18:1-8.
Lect II:422

On the night of the Exodus the Word of God is seen as the agent of God's power in the deaths of the first-born and the journey across the Red Sea. At his Second Coming the Word will again stand in judgement.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

12 Monday - St. Josaphat, 1580-1623, Bishop of Polotz, worked for reunion of Ukrainian Catholics; but his murder by those who opposed it brought about many conversions.

14 Wednesday - St. Laurence O'Toole, became a monk and abbot of Glendalough. He was made Archbishop of Dublin in 1162. He returned to Ireland after the Third Lateran Council as papal legate in 1179. He died at Eu in Normandy in 1180, where he was seeking to make peace between Henry II and the Irish rulers.

15 Thursday - St. Albert the Great, 1206-1280, Dominican theologian who taught in Cologne, was called the "Universal Teacher" for the vast range of his interests. Patron of scientists.

16 Friday - St. Margaret, 1045-1093, wife of Malcolm III, King of Scotland, helped by her example and influence, the work of reform in the Church.

St. Gertrude, 1256-1302, a Benedictine nun from the age of five, she cultivated devotion to the Sacred Heart, and advocated frequent Communion.

17 Saturday - St. Elizabeth, 1207-1231, queen at 14, widowed and exiled at 20, Franciscan tertiary until her death at 24. A woman of prayer and service of the poor.

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THE SPLENDOUR OF TRUTH

“What is the strongest thing in the world?” asked a king of his wise men long ago. “Pleasure” answered some. “Royal power” declared others, flattering him. Then one stood up and said: “No. The strongest thing in the world is Truth and it shall have the victory.” It is not always easy to see that. There are times when Truth seems to be the weakest thing in all the world. It seemed like that when Our Lord was crucified. Yet He rose from the dead.

To love the Truth is what is asked of us before all things and it includes all things, it leads to supreme strength and nobility of character - it brings us straight to God.

To love the Truth means in the first place that I want, at all costs, to see things straight, as they really are. Then it could be said of me, as it was of Abraham Lincoln: “His thoughts were roots that gripped the granite truth.”

To love the Truth means secondly that no lie ever passes my lips. My words, like my thoughts, will always correspond to things as they really are. To seek some advantage by deceiving others is to deceive myself still more, because nothing can stand that is not built upon the granite Truth. In the end falsehood destroys itself and the one who uses it.

To love the Truth means not only knowing it and speaking it but building my life on it. I must have truth of life. That means my life must be exactly what God wants it to be. A metal is true gold when it corresponds exactly to God's idea of what gold should be. So too with myself and my life. I will be truly myself if I correspond perfectly to the particular idea which God has for me personally. How can I do that? By seeking nothing but God's will, moment by moment, in the little things that make up my day. Thus, brick by brick, I shall be building the house of my life on the rock of Truth.

To KNOW the Truth, to SPEAK the Truth, to LIVE the Truth - to make that one's programme is to walk in the way of greatness and of holiness.

THE BALLINCOLLIG PARISHIONER**INFLUENZA - ITS THAT TIME AGAIN****WHAT IS INFLUENZA?**

Influenza is an acute viral disease of the respiratory tract, affecting all age groups and characterised by the abrupt onset of fever, chills and headache. These symptoms are usually accompanied by a dry cough and sore throat.

COULD I CATCH IT?

Influenza is highly infectious and spreads rapidly. You are most likely to catch it during the cold months between October and March.

IS IT SERIOUS?

Influenza can be a serious illness in those with chronic underlying disease, especially if elderly. Persons considered to be most at risk of complications, should they develop influenza, are the elderly and adults and children with any of the following:

- Chronic lung disease
- Chronic heart disease
- Chronic kidney failure
- Diabetes
- Persons whose immune system is suppressed.

HOW CAN IT BE PREVENTED?

Immunisation (also known as vaccination) is a safe and effective way to help prevent infection. Influenza vaccine is prepared each year using virus strains similar to those most likely to be circulating in the forthcoming season. Protection lasts for about one year, and to provide continuing protection, annual vaccination is necessary.

**IMMUNISATION IS THEREFORE STRONGLY
RECOMMENDED FOR THOSE CONSIDERED TO BE 'AT RISK'**

Now is the time when vaccination for the winter should be undertaken. Immunisation of fit children and adults is not recommended as routine. The final decision as to who should be offered immunisation is a matter for that person's medical practitioner.

Further information concerning vaccination or the availability of vaccine should be made from your local G.P. or pharmacist.
