Are you Semi-Detached?

In urban Ballincollig the most familiar residence is the semi-detached house. (I live in one!) However many families aspire to the greater space and privacy offered in the detached home. This is generally considered an upwardly mobile move for those lucky enough to have gained sufficient equity in their semi. To be detached or semi-detached is the question?

This question relates very well to our religious commitment too. In the not too distant past, the trend of moving away from formal regular religious worship and practice was often described as "a la carte" Catholicism. This was manifest in Catholics choosing aspects of their tradition that they wanted and quietly ignoring aspects or teachings that they couldn't relate to, or that somehow didn't resonate with their life experience.

Today, perhaps semi-detached would be a good analogy to use to explain the relationship many Catholics have with their church. They are still connected, but only in a small way. Like the regular 3 bed semi, the connection is only one wall. These Catholics do not wish to sever all ties with the church, but are happy maintain a loose connection. Religion and religious worship is concentrated on special events in their lives. The big sacramental occasions are the obvious touchstones; Baptism, First Communion and Confirmation followed some years later by marriage. The funerals of loved ones are also important times when they want the church and it's ministers to be there for them.

That's the semi detached catholic. A nice kindly neighbour, leading a busy life, won't cause a stir, but still managing to find space for a bit of public religious expression at significant times. This semi detached catholic will never consider that they are not part of the church and would identify themselves in a census as catholic and in their own view, regularly practice their faith. When I worked in Peru over 20 years ago, it was considered to be a strongly catholic country. The semi-detached (although the living conditions of the populace were far from the salubrious semi's we know) catholic was the norm. Certain times of the year brought religious fervour to fever pitch, especially Holy Week. Then it quietened down and we were back again to the smaller numbers at church. Defining the Irish catholic experience today is far more complex than heretofore. The recent decline in public church attendance is only new to Ireland, but taken in the context of the global catholic experience, even one so diverse as the Peruvian culture, it is nothing strange. Perhaps what was unique/strange/different about Ireland of the past was the almost 100% level of weekly church attendance. That has clearly levelled off.

It is worth bringing into this changed arena the relationship between the weekly church attendees and the semi-detached. How are these semi-detached folk looked on by the regular daily and weekly mass goers? Are they looked down on, as somehow lesser Catholics? (If the former definition was based on weekly attendance at public worship) Do they risk not being accepted or welcomed when they do turn up at church? Are they criticised and spoken of negatively for what is perceived as their lack of commitment? Hmmm. Does it suddenly occur to you that this attitude (smacking of historical clericalist undertones) may cause the semi-detached catholic to make their strongest silent protest yet and make the move to being detached?

The semi-detached catholic is here to stay. Let's get used to it. Let's be open and welcoming and not be the cause of them choosing to become detached. The detached catholic has made a decision; I no longer want to be part of what's on offer. For many reasons ties with the church are cut. It is a decision that should be respected.

Where is Jesus with all this? The gospels show Him as compassionate and welcoming. He invited people to follow Him. That invite is always open and we trust the Holy Spirit will blow where it will and the invite will generate a level of response that people are prepared to give at this stage of their life journey.


