Two Vineyard Parables

We have seen a rejection of the Faith by some in Ireland; this rejection varies from apathy to ridicule to hostility. There are positive and good aspects of present day Irish life, generosity to those in need, a sense of humour and of fun, but we may also notice a certain coarseness in life, a lack of respect for values that was not there before, and at the moment a certain pervasive anxiety. The Christian message stands in stark contrast to the consumerism and the selfish individualism of modern Irish culture.

The readings in today's liturgy present us with two vineyard parables. In Isaiah the vineyard is Israel, the beloved of God, a common metaphor in Hebrew poetry. This vineyard failed to produce the fruit that was expected of it, in spite of all the necessary care and attention being lavished on it, and produced instead sour grapes. Isaiah indicates that the consequences of rejecting God's kingdom, God's message, are simply that God will no longer care for, tend and protect the particular vineyard. In this context it is important for us to remember that we are the "New Israel" of God, and these stories serve as a warning for us as well. If our faith practice produces sour grapes we have only ourselves to blame for the consequences. The kingdom may be taken from us.

The custodians of the vineyard are the subject of the Gospel vineyard parable, representing the religious leaders of Israel. In this Gospel parable the message was rejected, the messengers were rejected, God himself was rejected in Jesus. We may ask ourselves if we reject God at times. On this Life Sunday we are asked to reflect particularly on those in our midst who have mental health difficulties. Do we fail to reach out to those brothers and sisters to give them support, to affirm their lives? Have we learned to be patient, kind and loving with those who suffer from depression or other forms of mental suffering? If we reject them we reject Christ.

The teachings of Isaiah and of Jesus make it clear that there are consequences when we reject faith, when we reject God's grace. This raises the question of how to we respond to the situation in our own lives and to the situation in our culture and in our place. A key is given in the psalm included in today's readings, the plea: God of hosts bring us back, let your face shine on us and we shall be saved. We turn to prayer, a prayer that includes an admission of guilt, an acknowledgement that it is we who have forsaken God, and a promise that we will not forsake him again.

St Paul sets prayer as a sort of polar opposite to worry. He advises us to fill our minds with all that is good, true, noble and turn to God in prayer, placing all our needs before him. Then the God of peace will be with us and fill our hearts with that peace of Christ which is beyond all human

understanding. That peace will answer all our anxieties.. Billy O'Sullivan

This Week's Calendar

Monday 6 – Saint Bruno, priest. Born in Cologne, 1033, Bruno became professor of theology in Reims University and later its head. But his desire was to found a monastery where poverty, manual work, silence and worship would be the basics. He founded the Carthusians at La Grande Chartreuse, where de died in 1101.

Tuesday 7 – Our Lady of the Rosary. 'Today's celebration urges all to meditate on the divine mysteries of Christ, following the example of the Blessed Virgin Mary, who was in a special manner associated with the incarnation, passion and glorious resurrection of the Son of God.' (Divine Office)

Wednesday 8 – Weekday (27th Week in Ordinary Time)

Thursday 9 – Saint Denis, bishop, and Companions, martyrs. Denis and his companions, Rusticus and Eleutherius, were beheaded and thrown into the Seine in 258 and later buried at Montmartre. Their finest tribute is the abbey Church of Saint Denis, where the kings of France are buried. Denis, the bishop of Paris, is one of the patrons of France. Also, St John Leonardi, priest. John supported the reforms of Trent, published a Catechism and helped to found the seminary of the Propagation of the Faith in Rome.

Friday 10 – Weekday

Saturday 11 – St Canice was born in Co Derry around 527 and died in 603. Though his people were poor he studied at Clonard under Finnian and at Glasnevin under Mobhi. A deep friendship developed between himself and Colum Cille, with whom he worked for a time in Scotland, where he set up a number of churches. In Ireland his principle foundation was in Aghaboe in Ossory, but this was replaced centuries later by his church in Kilkenny.
