Baptism

The Baptism of Jesus is celebrated today. It is an opportunity to reflect on the undertakings of parents when they promise at the baptism of their infant children to "hand on the faith to their child". How can parents effectively fulfill this task in the culture in which we live?

"Stevie wants to water ski because she sees you ski, Larry. Maureen wants to sing at Mass because dad sings at Mass. Everything you do, they do, Larry!" Mary was trying to convince her husband that he was the primary role model for their daughters. Mary was voicing what parents and teachers know in their hearts: we teach by our example. Our actions speak louder than words. Mary's point was that their daughters learn from their parents' actions. She went on to argue that the only reason Maureen was interested in singing at Mass was because Larry did it. She even suggested that their daughters would never learn to cook because she and Larry didn't cook!

And, so it is with our life of faith. Our young people learn the Christian way of life primarily by what they witness in the home. Children first learn how to be disciples of Jesus from those around them who live the Good News. Learning to follow Jesus is an "apprenticeship of the entire Christian life" (General Directory for Catechesis, no. 67). An apprentice learns by living the life.

Young people learn to follow the teachings of Jesus when they see us striving, sometimes struggling, to follow Jesus' command to "love one another." A teacher went to great lengths to be patient, compassionate and loving to a student who was being very mean and very disrespectful. No one would have blamed her if she had reacted differently. But she taught her students a great deal about treating others with dignity and mercy. She treated the misbehaving student, as Jesus would have. All those who witnessed her Christ-like love, learned a lesson in how to "love one another."

Learning to pray is a part of the Christian way of life that can be taught from the earliest years of a child's life. Children learn the melodic, comforting sound of the traditional Catholic prayers because they have heard those words prayed over them, to them, and with them since they were infants. As they grow, they learn for themselves the power and comfort of those prayers. In addition, they learn to call on God in times of stress and worry because they see their parents doing the same.

Seeing parents worshiping in Church, Sunday after Sunday is the most important lesson a child can learn. For so many families, weekend soccer, tournaments, basketball games, and other sport commitments make it difficult to "get to Mass."

However, when parents live as though the Eucharist is the "source and summit" of the their Christian lives, children learn that nothing is more important than taking time to praise and worship the Living God.

Last and perhaps most important, it's the ordinary things. Loving those who are unlovable, going to church, singing at Mass, forgiving an unfriendly neighbor, smiling in the checkout line, visiting a feeble grandparent. These are the things kids learn from us. Whether it's water skiing or singing or cooking or discipleship, our children first learn from the parent/guardians who surround them and love them. And, it helps to remember that God loved them first. So even where we fail, God's grace prevails.

Job - a model of mature faith

We often ask the question: how come bad things happen to good people? And how come some of the biggest chancers can thrive?

The Bible addresses such questions in the book of Job. Job is a just and prosperous man, but one day, God takes it all away. Job's wife and friends tell him to curse God and be done with it. Job refuses.

While Job doesn't exactly curse God, he does curse the very day he was born. Job refuses to accept that he offended against God. Look around the world, he says. All over the place, God lets the wicked prosper! And look at the weather! God allows droughts in some places and floods in others! And look at governments! God puts people in government and then removes wisdom from them! While God doesn't answer the question of evil and suffering directly, He warns Job not to become a self-righteous religious phoney.

God seems to say to Job, that everything has its place, that He respects human freedom, even that of the wicked. There's always hope they'll change. Job's story is what true religion is about: mature friendship with God, where a frank exchange of views is encouraged, along with the ability to live happily with the mixed bag that life can sometimes be.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: IS. 40:1-5, 9-11

The passage from Isaiah which forms today's first Scripture reading is one of the songs of the servant which is found in Isaiah. It describes the ideal Jew, the servant of God who will bring justice and light to the world and save his people. This servant is Christ.

The second Scripture passage is the conclusion of an episode in which Peter has a vision. In the vision he is instructed to receive into the infant Church not only Jews, but the whole

Gospel: Lk. 3:15-16. 21-22

People in the crowds wondered if John the Baptist was the Messiah. Luke provided a direct question and response to make clear that John understood he was not the Messiah. Luke removed the attention completely from John by not even making it clear whether or not John was present at Jesus' baptism. For Luke, John was the last prophet from the old age. Jesus marked the beginning of a new age. Luke was the only evangelist to have Jesus praying when the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, came down on Jesus while a voice from heaven proclaimed him as God's beloved Son.
