Transfiguration

In today's Gospel story we hear of Jesus taking Peter, James and John up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. Just before this journey Jesus had been telling his disciples that he was destined to suffer, to be rejected, be put to death and to rise again after three days. Now that this time is drawing near, Jesus spends time in prayer, to prepare himself and his disciples. It was during this time of prayer that "he was transfigured before them and his clothes became dazzling white." Moses and Elijah appeared in conversation with him, while a cloud descended over them and a voice from the cloud said: 'This is my beloved Son, listen to him'. Hearing those loving words from his Father must have given Jesus strength to face the painful journey to Jerusalem and to take the road that led to Calvary.

While the disciples were confused and frightened, the transfiguration experience gives them a little glimpse of God's glory to sustain them as they witness Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. I'm sure all of us can remember times when God responded to our prayer giving us the courage to carry our cross. We too are his beloved children. Knowing we are loved by God gives us the strength to face our own trials and sufferings with renewed hope and to bring that hope, love and encouragement to others around us. In our own journey through life we can face difficult decisions knowing that we are loved and supported.

While the Transfiguration event happened over two thousand years ago, we are called today to be aware of moments of transformation in our own lives. When have I glimpsed God's light or glory in my life? It could be during times of great suffering; a close experience of God in prayer or even being on a mountain top taking in the beauty of creation all around - moments of experiencing God's closeness and beauty. All of us need to find our own space to spend quiet moments of prayer with our heavenly Father, who' in the words of today's Gospel' says of Jesus: 'this is my beloved son, Listen to him'. We hear Jesus speaking to us when we open our hearts to listen to him in prayer and when we reflect on his word in Scripture. He also speaks to us in the events of everyday life and through the voice of others around us.

Ballincollig Scouts

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Genesis 22: 1-2, 9-13, 15-18
 By his command to sacrifice Isaac God proclaimed his absolute dominion over the lives of men who are the work of his hands. By the revocation of the order he manifested that he did not wish this dominion to be acknowledged by the actual sacrifice of human life. The double lesson was necessary as the neighbouring Canaanites offered such sacrifices to their gods.

Second Reading: Romans 8: 31-34
 St. Paul summarises the blessings of the spiritual life in the assurance of God's love for us in Christ. All our personal difficulties become insignificant as soon as our eyes turn away from them to contemplate that one great act of love of God in which he did not spare his own Son for our salvation. It is true that there will be an examination after death, which we all fear. Redeemed and defended by Christ we need fear no condemnation from his lips.

Gospel: Mark 9: 2-10
 The Transfiguration of Christ, together with the appearance of Moses and Elias and the declaration by the Father, was a confirmation of all that Christ had taught them concerning his own Person and his relation to the Old Law. It was intended to strengthen the faith of the Apostles and to prepare them for the trials of the Passion. According to Leo the Great the chief purpose of the Transfiguration was to remove the scandal of the Cross from the hearts of the disciples.

Car Parks

Due to recent vandalism in car parks adjacent to the churches parishioners are reminded not to leave handbags or personal items in their cars. We ask people to be vigilant with a view to protecting other people's belongings.

Car Parking, Station Road & Environs

Cork County Council has engaged Consultants to develop a parking plan for Station Road, Church View & Tudor Grove. These plans were made public a few months ago at a meeting of invited guests. Basically the plan is to develop park and pay in the areas adjacent to St Mary & John's Church and Station Road. This system may change the parking patterns for the patrons of St Mary & St John Church. There is limited parking around the Church, in the play ground of Scoil Eoin and around the Parochial house.

Last year there were seventy two funerals and thirty seven weddings. Most take place on weekdays and people generally travel. I envisage that park and pay in areas around the Church will cause major difficulties for parishioners during morning mass, funerals and weddings.

I am aware that Cork County Council has made adjustments to their parking plans in other towns to take into account the parking of parishioners for daily mass, funerals and weddings. I think it would help if parishioners spoke to our local council representatives to highlight the issues raised by the proposed park and pay by Cork County Council. The importance of accommodating the parking needs of worshippers at St Mary & St John need to be emphasised to the Councillors and Council Officials.
