#### Tsunami Disaster

The tsunami disaster in South East Asia has dominated our news and our lives for more than ten days; the scale of the destruction of homes, property and loss of life is the biggest we have ever experienced on our TV screens. Whole communities have been wiped out, leaving few survivors. Those left have lost their families, their social network and almost everyone they have ever known. The suffering and trauma caused by such loss is beyond imagining. Those who are waiting and hoping to hear from family members and loved ones deserve our thoughts and prayers. Commentators have pointed out that the effects of this disaster have been felt by the poorest of the poor. This disaster has also affected people who are the most primitive and little known cultures in the world i.e. North Sentinel Islands, and the boat people living off the coast of Burma.

This disaster raises lots of questions, not least being the question why does such a disaster happen. This question is all the more urgent as we live in an age that presumes that in a modern culture we should be able to stop such tragedies or at least be able to predict them. However this tragedy has brought home to us again our inability to accept the enormous power of nature and to accept our vulnerability in the face of nature. For people of faith or no faith the question arises where was God.? I don't have an answer for this question but I do find it helpful to my own faith to read Matt. 13: 24 - 30 where I find the parable of the wheat and the damel; and Matt. chapters 26 and 27, here I rediscover that I am part of a very complex world where wheat and damel always seem to be mixed; God communicating his love for each of us is done by the death of his Son and a loving God continues to be with us.

The other question that a disaster raises is what can I do, the generosity of so many people and the work of so many personnel from relief agencies is making a difference; long may we have the generosity and commitment to support the relief effort.

## SAINT OF THE WEEK Saint Ita 15-January-2005

Saint Ita is the most famous woman saint in Ireland after Saint Brigid, and is known as the Brigid of Munster. She is said to have been of royal lineage, born in one of the baronies of Decies near Drum in County Waterford, and called Deirdre. An aristocrat wished to marry her, but after prayer and fasting for three

days and supposedly with divine help, she convinced her father to allow her to lead the life of a maiden.

She migrated to Killeedy in the western part of Limerick, and founded a community of women dedicated to God, which soon attracted many young women. She also founded and directed a school. Many Irish saints were taught by her for years. For this reason she is often called "foster-mother of the saints of Ireland." Brendan is supposed to have once asked her what three things God especially loved. She replied, "True faith in God with a pure heart, a simple life with a religious spirit, and open-handedness inspired by charity." An Irish lullaby for the Infant Jesus is attributed to her. She was supposedly known for her physical austerities. The principal mark of her devotion was the indwelling of the Holy Trinity. She spent much time in solitude, praying and fasting and the rest of the time in service to those seeking her assistance and advice. She and her Sisters helped to treat the sick of the area. It is claimed that she lived only on food from heaven. She is also known as Deirdre and Mida.

Ita died on January 15th, which is now kept as her feast, about the year 570. There is a strong local cult of her in Munster, particularly in Waterford and Limerick, and her name is a popular one for Irish girls. In the middle of the nineteenth century a new move was made in Ireland for the development of her cult, when Bishop Butler of Limerick obtained from Pope Pius IX a special office and mass for her feast.
