Christmas Warning by Charity Organisation

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul will be making its annual Christmas Collection at all Churches in Ballincollig this weekend. This week the Society published its annual national report and warned that there was a classic difference evident this Christmas from any previous Christmas when it sought help from the public for those who are not well-off.

"Those who have been fortunate enough to do well from the economic growth of the past few years are no longer seeing the problems for those left behind. But those who have not benefited can see all the things they do not have and have little hope of achieving. This is the classic gap between the 'haves' and the 'have-nots'. If we do not address this gap and close it to benefit those who are deprived, we have a serious social situation ahead." This was the warning of the Society which in the past year has spent £3 million on relieving social deprivation in Cork. It visits people in their homes, runs hostels for the homeless, youth groups and has a number of 'special works' Conferences dealing with activities such as debt management advice, job creation and repairs to homes, as well as Conferences which engage in prison and hospital visitation.

In Ballincollig there are three parish Conferences. They deal with home visitation, running the Family Centre at Station Road and the Youth Club and support services which include a creche and a shop.

"The public has always been very generous to us and we look forward to this continuing," according to the SVP who will hold their collection at all Masses in Ballincollig this weekend.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

Monday 11th - St. Damasus I, b. c. 304, d. 11 December 384, pope 366-384. He insisted on the apostolic foundations of the Roman See and was active in suppressing Arianism and other heresies. He commissioned St. Jerome to prepare the Vulgate version of the Bible.

Tuesday 12th - St Finnian studied in Idrone (Co. Carlow) and later in Wales and on his return to Ireland he settled in Clonard, Co. Meath, around 520, where he established a famous school. His pupils, among whom were Canice, Colum Cille, and Brendan, were the initiators of the great monastic expansion in Ireland. He died in 549 and is remembered as the tutor of the saints of Ireland. St Jane Frances de Chantal 1572-1641, was left a widow with six children at the age of 29. With the support and direction of St. Francis de Sales, she had founded more than eighty convents of Visitation nuns by the time of her death.

Wednesday 13th - St Lucy died 304 in Sicily, is invoked for eye trouble. she suffered much for her desire to remain consecrated to Christ alone. She was martyred by a sword thrust through her

Thursday 14th - St John of the Cross 1542-91, a Carmelite who suffered much in his work of spreading the reform of the Carmelites. He was a man of prayer, an outstanding poet and spiritual writer. Declared Doctor of the Church.



CHRISTMAS CONFESSION

Going to confession for Christmas has been part and parcel of Irish Catholic life for generations. Older people will recall long slow-moving queues at the confessionals on Christmas Eve. Even today when attitudes have changed Catholics still see a close connection between the Sacrament of Reconciliation and the celebration of the birth of Christ.

The old style Confession was an ordeal for many people: they found the slow queuing unnerving, they were afraid the priest might be deaf and that his questions and comments might be overheard by those waiting in line; they were afraid that if they were kept in longer than usual it might embarrass them. Children also were afraid that they might 'get stuck' in the Act of Contrition.

Perhaps it is because of all these considerations that the Reconciliation Service, the modern form of the Sacrament has taken on so well. In the new communal celebration we prepare ourselves together for confession and give thanks together for the forgiveness received. There are readings, a homily, an examination of conscience conducted in common, a shared request for forgiveness and a thanksgiving in common. Central to the ceremony is the opportunity given to each person to come up to the priest of their choice and make a brief confession of their sins. At the Reconciliation Ceremony there may be some people who for one reason or another do not wish to make a confession. These may ask the priest for a blessing and no one will know whether or not they have made a confession.

The confession of sins, in a sense, frees us from the power sin had over our lives. By telling his sins to the priest, man looks squarely at the sins he is guilty of, takes responsibility for them, and thereby opens himself again to God and to the communion of the Church in order to make a new future possible. Being open to the communion of the Church refers, not to Holy Communion or the Blessed Eucharist but rather to our sense of belonging to the parish community. Sin damages or even breaks brotherly friendship in the family, in the neighbourhood or in the wider community in which we live. To steal, to aggress others, to hate, to insult, to drive drunkenly - all such actions offend God but they also offend against other people. Sin is an act of aggression against our fellow man as well as against God. The Sacrament of Penance repairs and restores our union with our fellow man. Because the Reconciliation Service is shared publicly with our neighbours it expresses our desire to admit our sin and our desire to 'make up' with our families, our neighbours and all of God's children throughout the world.
