Remaining Branches of the Vine

We may feel encouraged by today's readings and want to live a more fully Christian life, but ask ourselves what are we supposed to do, tied down as we are by all the things required to be done in our day-to-day lives. St John tells us that whoever keeps his commandments lives in God and God lives in him (or her). And Jesus tells us that whoever remains in him, and he in them, bears plenty of fruit. We may say that sounds wonderful, but what do we do, on Tuesday for instance? Well, perhaps an answer, or a start anyway, is to pray, to renew (or restart!) a prayer life. Simple, but in practice not that easy.

We struggle at times to pray at all. People say God knows what we need, so why do we have to ask. Well without any communication it would not be much of a relationship. And asking is not the only type of prayer, there is also thanking, adoration, listening, acknowledging our sins and so on. But asking is an important part, and not just for "holy things." Jesus tells us to ask the Father for what we need; God wants to hear from us about all that weighs on our hearts. Jesus expects his followers to pray, he says to us "when you pray", not "if you pray." As we experience answers to prayer, our faith and our relationship with God grows. There are times when our prayers seem unheard, not every request for a new Mercedes gets answered. God only promises "good gifts," he loves us and knows what is best for us. He will answer "No" if what we ask would not be good for us, or for others, "directly, indirectly or ultimately." The answer to our prayer may be: yes, no or wait; and there will be times when we just don't understand.

Whilst there are many reasons for praying, prayer itself is a life giving activity which keeps our faith alive, it is the way in which we develop a relationship with God. Jesus prayed, and taught us to pray. We can pray whenever and wherever we are in an ongoing conversation, on the bus, in the car, on a bike, walking along the road, in bed in the middle of the night. But it is helpful to have a set time with God when you know you are simply meeting to talk. Some people like to combine Bible reading with prayer, at the beginning of the day. This depends on circumstances and our particular make up. But it is good to have a pattern. Prayer is that vital activity which enables us to remain part of the vine, as Jesus says. As we remain close to him in prayer we are nourished and our relationship goes deeper, he guides us by his Spirit in the circumstances of our lives and develops in us a oneness of outlook with him and with his Father.

He refreshes our soul, and gives us his peace.

These reactions are a normal part of grieving and it does help to talk about them with someone you trust. While we may even feel God has abandoned us, He is there with us. THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Acts 9: 26-31

When St. Stephen was stoned to death because of his preaching Paul (then known as Saul) was in charge of the execution. Now, however, after his conversion on the road to Damascus, he returns to Jerusalem and takes up where Stephen left off: preaching the same message. Again this preaching arouses the same fury and the Disciples, fearing for his life, sent him away to his home town of Tarsus.

Second Reading: 1 John 3: 18-24

Love of God and of the neighbour are inseparable. In practising either we must not rest satisfied with expressions of devotion and good will. Only when charity is active does conscience assure us that we are leading sincere Christian lives. Two things sum up what is most pleasing to God; faith in the divine personality of Jesus Christ and brotherly love according to Christ's instructions.

Gospel: John 15: 1-8

In this allegory the cultivation of the vine is attributed to God the Father. A fruitless branch is lopped off like Judas. The pruning clean of the Apostles is the result of the words Jesus spoke to them. A separated vine branch is useless. It is destined for the fire. Fruitfulness and discipleship go together.

Ballincollig Scouts

Survival of the scout leader at summer camp is not a matter of physical well being. It is a matter of dignity and status. Scouters are of course privileged; they have been entrusted with the fond offspring of doting parents who probably have never previously let them stray from the family nest. Whilst mother entrusts her little darling to the leader's tender care, father watches with a lump in his throat as his son and heir staggers off to his first camp, he expects his son will return with the same strength of character and imagination of B-P. The scout leader will instil this in him.

It is of course vital that the Scout Leader should pass this searching examination and return with his dignity and status unimpaired. I would go so far as to say that the whole year ahead is firmly based on the leader's reputation. It is therefore vital that he not only survive Summer Camp but return with enhanced charisma. The Scout leader is regarded by his scouts with affection and respect. If he is lucky they also may regard with awe and wonder. Once a year at summer camp he lays all these virtues on the line, for it is then that he must be seen to live up to these qualities. If he fails his days as a Scout Leader are numbered.

In my experience I venture to suggest that there is one simple straightforward philosophy be applied- **be second!** It can be proved without too much difficulty that all of history's great achievements and inventions came from the men who came second. For example the first successful aeroplane was certainly not the first one, because the first one either crashed or never got off the ground. Ask people what did Dr. Livingstone do? Ask them what was Stanley famous for, and everyone will know that he found Dr. Livingstone and said “Dr. Livingstone I presume”. So it is with summer camp if you are not first to arrive it is much easier to offer advice. Some of the pitfalls a leader may encounter include the fire that won't light, the knot that slips, and the compass that points east; there is only one safe answer- stay out of it.


