## The Talents

This Sunday's Gospel continues on with another passage from Matthew chapter 25. This parable seems to be very harsh and many people find it difficult because the master seems to be exceedingly angry. The third servant, the poor relation of the group, seems to get a very bad deal. If this is what the Kingdom of Heaven is like, it is indeed bad news.

However, I think the parable of the talents has a great deal to say to our modern world where power, wealth, possessions and authority are the order of the day. Daily news items carry accounts of the abuse of children by priests, the abandoning of the thirteen Latvians on a remote island in Dublin Harbour, the riots in the suburbs of Paris and other French cities, is a product of neglect and mistrust of people.

The master in this parable is an interesting character, a rarity in present day culture. He is the kind of person that does not cling to power. He entrusts his property to the servants without counting the risk.

The parable is crucial teaching for our modern culture which glorifies mistrust as not merely necessary but actually beneficial. This tends to affect the way we Christians see Jesus, we become concerned to "protect" his message against our competitors and then of course we are no longer life giving to the world.

The verse "For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but for the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away". Again it seems unfair, however, when we realise this "thing" that when people "have it" they are "given more"; this thing is TRUST. People who have no trust in themselves, in God, in others or in life end up losing "even what they have". This invites us to celebrate Jesus the teacher, there is not a trace of cynicism in him, his message is go ahead and trust.

### THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Prov. 31: 10-13. 19-20. 30-31 This reading from the Book of Proverbs may need a little 'translation' for today's world! Is the ideal marriage partner hidden here?

Second Reading: Thess. 5:1-6 This reading will have many echoes during Advent. The message is: 'Be alert!'

#### Gospel: Matthew 24:36, 25:14-30

In this story, a man went away on a journey. He must have been very wealthy because he entrusted large portions of his money to three of his servants. The first two servants invested the money during the master's absence and it yielded great returns. The third servant, however, was fearful of investing (or some scholars say he was lazy). In either case, the servant buried the money he was given and returned the full amount to the master when he came home. The master was pleased with the investments of the first two servants, but was very upset with the third one. To those who have much, much more will be given. To those who have little, even that little will be taken away.

### SAINT OF THE WEEK

### St. Laurence O'Toole 17-November-2005

St Laurence O'Toole (Lorcán Ó Tuathail) was born in Castledermot, Co. Kildare in 1128. He became Abbot of Glendalough in 1153 and Archbishop of Dublin in 1162. He died in Eu in Normandy on the 14th of November 1180 and was canonised in 1225.

Laurence's father was Maurice O'Toole, King of Hy Murray. When Laurence was 10 he was given as a hostage to Dermot McMurrough, King of Leinster, who treated him with great harshness. The boy was sent in chains to a remote area where he was ill-housed, ill-clothed and ill-fed. For two years, the king's son learned what it was to experience real poverty and oppression.

After two years, Dermot was forced to release Laurence and send him to Glendalough monastery, where his father could reclaim him. When Maurice arrived, he found his son had fallen in love with the life of the monks and he gave him permission to join the community. Laurence was only 25 when he was elected Abbot, and he proved to be the greatest Abbot of Glendalough since St Kevin its founder. He encouraged learning, built new churches and renewed -monastic life by bringing in monks from the continent. He was unfailing in his care for the poor and sold the monastery treasures to feed famine victims.

In 1162 Laurence became the first Irish Archbishop of the Danish city of Dublin. Many of the citizens were no more than nominal Christians and he made it his duty to deepen their faith and reform their lives. He introduced Augustinian monks from France to Christ Church Cathedral to reform the liturgy and he became a member of their community. He continued his works of charity, especially towards homeless children, whom he led and housed in his own residence.

Laurence left Dublin for the last time in the spring of 1180. His mission was to settle a dispute that had arisen between the English and Irish Kings. Henry II, the man responsible for the murder of St Thomas a Becket, Archbishop of Canterbury, received him badly, abused him roundly and forbade him to return to Ireland. Then he went to visit his dominions in Normandy. Laurence followed him, sick and exhausted though he was. He died in the monastery at Eu, without having met the King. His tomb in Eu rapidly became a place of pilgrimage and many miracles were attributed to his intercession. He was canonised in 1225.


