Third Sunday of Lent - Moses and the Bush

Today's Old Testament reading is a meeting of God and Moses. The account of the burning bush is one of the better-known passages from the Old Testament. Moses went and looked at this strange sight. Suddenly Moses finds himself face to face with the power of God and he is being asked to bring a message of Hope and Liberation to an oppressed people. Moses is full of doubts and needs loads of re-assuring and he wants to know the answer or what to say when he is asked "What is his name" and God said to Moses "I am who am". In this reading and throughout Lent, God makes clear that he is a God of Justice who brings a promise of liberation and hope to the human race. With this promise we are also asked to work in partnership with God to make it happen.

During the past week a Draft Pastoral strategy was published. (Copies available in sacristies) This document is the product of discussion and debate throughout the Diocese for the past two years. This document is inspired by the call of John Paul II -- He invites us to "make room" for each other, and to develop a trust and openness wholly in accord with the dignity and responsibility of every member of the People of God. The gifts God has given us we are called to offer to the faith community for the building up of the kingdom. During the last thirty years various efforts have been made to recognise the role and talents of all the Baptised in the Church and to try to learn to work together in partnership to build the Lord's kingdom. Hopefully this process will take us further along the road of partnership.

Finally well done to the big number of parishioners who turned up on Thursday 4th March at the parochial house to commence four weeks of faith development and Bible study? A word of thanks to the Scouts and their leaders who made space willingly available at a minutes notice for the big crowd.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Exodus 3:1-8, 13-15

To Moses, God spoke in a burning bush. He gave Moses a message to preach. Moses was to tell his people that freedom was at hand, freedom and happiness.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12

Paul compares the Exodus story to Christian baptism. He reminds us again that God was not always pleased with His people. We are warned not to become complacent

Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

God calls us to conversion, to turn to him, to reform. Moses once formed a people, but in the desert most of them sinned. Today, if we repent, God will again bring us out of captivity.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Patrick 17-March-2004

The kidnapping of St. Patrick and subsequent years of slavery in Ireland form the story of a personal tragedy in a young man's life. Historians agree that Patrick was born in Britain though the exact location will never be known for certain. Most probably he was born in Candida Casa, 25 miles to the east of the Mull of Galloway which lies no more than 20 miles from the coast of Down. The date was probably 385 A.D. His family would have been reasonably well off officials of the Roman Empire in Britain. Irish attacks on the Roman province of Britain can be traced back to about 350. The Emperor Theodosius erected fortifications against the marauders in Britain in 368. At this time there are references to a naval demonstration by the Romans in the Irish Sea, when the Irish "were driven back to their bogs". In 399 Claudian writes that the sea was full of Irish ships interested in plunder. Irish tradition confirms the Roman sources. Niall of the Nine Hostages met his death near the Isle of Wight.

Patrick himself describes the raid, which led to his capture. He refers to thousands of prisoners being taken. The ships engaged must have constituted quite a fleet and the place attacked must have been rich and well populated. The attack would have been sudden, ferocious and quickly executed. Patrick, a lad of sixteen, found himself a slave of the lowest category - minding pigs - without friends or family, not even understanding the language. Years later the day came for his escape. The 200 Roman miles which he said he travelled, would be about the distance from Slemish to Gorey, Arklow or Wexford. As a penniless slave he must have offered to work his passage to the Continent on the first ship he found in the harbour. Some, if not all, of the cargo was dogs, obviously Irish wolfhounds, - those gentle grey giants, largest dogs in the world -, bred for the chase and therefore valuable in France where the great aristocrats were devoted to this sport. We can imagine Patrick feeding and watering the dogs on the three-day voyage and cleaning out their basket-work cages as he calmed their fear of the rolling ship. Nantes, at the mouth of the Loire, would have been a likely landing place. From there the crew would have had to take the dogs to a market place inland. But here they met "a desert" through which they wandered for 28 days. This devastation would have been a consequence of a German raid on Gaul in 407. The raiding tribes marched down the Rhine, swung left to the Channel and then turned south and west along the coast of France, devastating as they went. Eventually the market was reached and Patrick was a free man at

But even as Patrick enjoyed his good fortune he heard the voices of the Irish calling him back to Ireland. His missionary vocation revealed the hand of God in all his extraordinary trials and his willing "yes" to God's invitation revealed the greatness of his character.
