The Triumph of the Cross

"God loved the world so much that He gave his only Son, that we may have Eternal life." "For God sent his Son into the world that through Him the world might be saved." The life of Christ and His message is Gods' way of making his love and plans for us known. The human life of Jesus has one purpose that is to give each of us a glimpse of how much God is on my side and His plans for me of peace, life and happiness.

This October Pope Francis has called a synod of Bishops in Rome to reflect on the role of family and our understanding of family. Earlier this spring the parish council devoted some time to discussing and giving our views on the family. To help us in our discussion a questionnaire was provided by the Vatican. The contributions and comments from the parish council were forwarded to Bishop Buckley. Each diocese was asked to forward a report to the Vatican to help the bishops of the world in their deliberations, (hopefully diocesan office will forward a copy of this report to each parish in the near future).

Recently I came across an article by Eleanor Cunney. She used the example of a stone mason building a wall. He picks a stone from the ground and uses it regardless of its shape and size. He finds a place for the stone even when it is odd, misshapen or uneven. The wall he is creating is full of gaps and spaces; it is these that give the wall its beauty and strength. Her understanding of church is similar. Like the wall it needs to find a place for all comers no matter what the differences. Together we form a unit proclaiming a common belief but drawing strength from the diversity of the individuals within it. As Kahlil Gibran put it "there must be paces in our togetherness."

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Num. 21:4-9

The people in the desert were losing hope. We know the feeling! Disillusionment, worry, loneliness and sorrow can wear us down. In the light of Christ's cross, we find hope that is stronger than any suffering. Jesus gave himself without limit to his Father, who raised him high. The meaning of our suffering is to share in his journey to the glory of his Father.

Second Reading: Phil. 2:6-11

The state of Jesus was divine, yet he did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave.

Gospel: John 3: 13-17

The feast of The Triumph Of The Cross is celebrated each year since 335 when a church was first dedicated on the site of the crucifixion in Jerusalem. Jesus died between two men. One of them said to the other. 'We are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. (Lk 23; 41.) Jesus lived his dying completely for others. The total exhaustion of his body, the abandonment of his friends, even of his God all became the gift of himself. As he hung dying in complete powerlessness, nailed to the wood of a tree, there was no bitterness, no desire for revenge or resentment. Nothing to cling to; all to give. " Unless the grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains only a single grain, but if it dies it yields a rich harvest. " (Jn 12; 24). Jesus the innocent one died and death became a gateway to life.

Jesus on the Cross lived with the greatest poverty as his cry from the heart reminds us of " My God, my God, why have you forsaken me ". He, who came from God us to God, suffered the deepest anguish a human being can suffer, the anguish of being left alone, rejected, forgotten, abandoned by the one who is the source of all life. Every human being needs to be loved, cared and treated with dignity. Parents have the privilege of providing love and affection for their children but each of us Christians face a daily calling to become more aware of the love and affection of God for us and to reflect that love in our dealings and living with others.



Christ Our Light

The roof of Christ Our Light church has for many years failed to keep out the water. Various efforts were made to repair the roof with little success. Rain and water seeps through the roof in several areas. I have decided to address the issue and the slates, felt and roof will be replaced. Work will begin shortly. This is a big job, removing old slates and felt and then replacing same. Mass on week mornings will take place in St Mark's centre courtesy of the Neo Catecummenate community. The total cost will amount to €120,000.00. There will be an estimated 14,000.00 slates put on the roof. To help defray some of the cost I am inviting parishioners to sponsor a slate at €5.00 each. An opportunity will be provided next week to sponsor a slate. Looking forward to your support.
