Resurrection Experience In The Midst Of Chaos

I will always remember my first Holy Week in Peru, after ordination. It was my first time leading the Holy Week Ceremonies. Naturally I was excited and wanted to do everything well, with all my hard learned knowledge of liturgy and theology!

Palm Sunday got off to an exciting start when somebody arrived with a donkey before mass and as we gathered outside the church, an altar server called Angel got on the donkey ready to ride up the church as palm branches were waved. This was turning out to be a very biblical like re-enactment, I thought. What nobody counted on though, was that the doors of the church were not built for a donkey, fully loaded with rider, to be passing through the portals! Poor little Angel got clocked on the head by the lintel and was sent flying, saved from a nasty injury by the pressing crowd who broke the fall. Not to be undone the donkey was happy to proceed to the altar, where the excitement got too much for him and luckily I saw his tail rising in time to guess what was to happen next and duck out of the way!

On Good Friday, it was planned to carry a huge cross for the Stations, through the unpaved desert-dusty streets. It was hot, temperatures in the high 30's and a huge crowd gathered. Also gathering was a ferocious sandstorm and every corner we turned it was worse as the afternoon wind whipped up the dust and debris into a choking thick air. I was never so relieved to hit the shower after that and spent hours coughing and spluttering.

On Holy Saturday the Paschal fire was lit early on in a tar barrel in the schoolyard near the church. I went to vest and gather the crowd from the church. When we all arrived at the yard together we discovered that the fire was gone! The paschal fire stolen! Just unbelievable! (Later I was to discover that the tar barrel was valuable currency in the impoverished shanty town, and left unattended for a few minutes was a target for thieves, who dumped the fire, scattering ashes everywhere as they made off with the barrel) I was left begging for a match or a lighter to get the candle lit, while my blood pressure was rising by the minute. As the procession made its way back to the church a stampede began. They all wanted to get a seat and as the crowd surged I was knocked over and the paschal candle went flying, smashed to pieces. I brushed myself down and made for the sanctuary to restore order, only to discover that the microphone lead had been ripped out of the socket by the pushing crowd and it wasn't working! I felt so deflated. All my plans had fallen apart. I thought it was the most disastrous vigil ever. I just wanted to come home and cry. I expressed my upset to some parishioners and told them I was going back to Ireland that I just had enough.

In response a few days later I got a lovely letter from an old lady in the parish, who was barely literate. It contained several pages of apologies telling me that she was sorry for the way her country folk behaved and how they would be so sorry if I left and please don't go. It was just heart warming and moving to get this. It is something I will always remember. It was a resurrection moment. In the midst of chaos and disaster from my point; here was new hope and encouragement to begin again. I could see things in a different light, and even laugh at what had happened. I had received support and encouragement to press on ahead and not give up.

Let it be a lesson to all of us to bring hope, life, support and encouragement to those around us. Someone we know may need lifting up, a kind word, a card or a note, a hug? It can make all the difference to reach out in a positive caring way to those around us. We are so good at singing the praises of someone when they die. Why not value them when they are alive? Tell the people you care about that you love them; bring them joy and resurrection.

49th Cork Ballincollig Scout Group

On Monday last the Scouts travelled to the Paps, which are part of the Derrynasaggart mountain range; they are on the Cork Kerry border. We'd planed to climb the East pap. The Paps are called after the Goddess Dana, who was the God of the Tuatha De Danann (the people of the goddess Dana) who occupied Ireland from about 1500BC. They were believed to have great powers, which in time faded and they were eventually defeated and driven underground to become the fairies of Irish folklore. The three Scouts in charge of getting us to the top were Padraic, Owen and Alan, having studied the map they had narrowed it down to two routes, one which took us up through the fire break on the eastern side of the mountain, the second a longer hike, but a less steep climb on the northern side, We started hiking on the old track, soon coming to where the fire break in the trees was, here we had to make the decision, looking at the steepness of the fire break we decided to hike on, to the lake and go up the northern side, we got around the lake and they then had to find a safe gully to climb up to the shoulder. This they did and we started up, at the top of the shoulder they found a route to the top. We took many breaks to look at the view, or so the leaders said (in reality it was for them catch their breath and rest their aching bones). At the top is a Cairn, which are said to be burial mound of the high priests or the chieftains of the Tuatha De Danann they are about 3500 years old.

We headed back down, taking the Eastern side the mountain; on the way the scouts took the easy way down and rolled their way down most of the hill. We returned to Ballincollig very tired. No mans advice is entirely worthless. Even a broken watch is right twice a day.

There are high levels of hunger in Zomba, Malawi and a wide-spread food crisis. This is due to crop failure and continuing unpredictable rainfall. The main crop planted in Zomba is maize and when this fails many people have nothing else to fall back on. This project provides people with enough food and also enough seeds to plant. Many of the farmers are women. By working with farmers to help them improve their land, their practises and how they manage water, the project seeks to provide more food for families. It also provides better seeds and some livestock.

The cost of this work for poor farmers is € 7,314
