A Feeling of Home

The word 'church' or parish has a bad feel for many people. It is about a personal experience of hurt or condemnation. It is about fear and guilt. It is about authoritarian teaching that seems to have little concept of what it is to be an autonomous adult human being. That this is not the complete picture, hardly needs to be stated. It does not include all that is positive and prophetic in the Christian vision. Part of the mission of the parish today is to be a place where this pain is addressed and this alienation healed.

An alternative image is to see church as 'home'. In exploring this image I am thinking of parish as a place where people can have an alternative experience of church. The image speaks of parish as 'the family of God, a familiar and welcoming home'. I do realise that because of our own personal experiences, not all will warm to the idea of home. So I pursue the image without trying to idealise 'home'.

The spirit in which the image of home is intended is captured well by Robert Frost in a poem, where he writes: 'Home is a place where, when you have to go there, They have to take you in'. 'I should have called it, Something you somehow haven't to deserve'.

Home is where a person always belongs, where there is a place at the table, when belonging does not have to be earned. This is true even for the black sheep of the family, while things may never be what they used to be, gradually people will come to break bread together again. To speak of the church as home is to see the church as always open to be big enough for those who belong to the family. It is to see the faith community as a house of welcome for all and a place of service to all. Pope John XXIII's image of parish 'as a village fountain' to which all might have recourse in their thirst is valuable insight.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 1 Samuel 3: 3-10,19

Like John the Baptist, Samuel was born when his mother thought she would never have a child. She dedicated him to the service of God in the Temple where he received his special calling from God. This extract recounts the moment of that calling and states that the Lord remained with him in a special way all his life.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians, 6: 13-15, 17-20 St. Paul explains the foundations of Christian chastity. The human body made for God must not be debased for present pleasure. The body is eternal and should be respected. The popular modern sentiment: "my body is my own" is contradicted by Paul who says: "You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for." Jesus bought and paid for us with his own blood shed on Calvary.

Gospel: John 1: 35-42

This is the moment when the Church began to find its Saviour. The solemnity and grace of the simple narrative are equal to the occasion: John the Baptist standing, two disciples nearby. The disciples follow Jesus. The heavenly attraction had begun to exercise its power. Jesus turned and gazed on the two men following him and spoke the first words from the lips of the Saviour reported by St. John: a "What do you want?". That same question is asked of all of us who follow Jesus: "Why do we follow him? What is it that we seek?

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Agnes 21-January-2005

During the first century Christianity was, in the eyes of the Romans, confused with Judaism which was a legally permitted religion. Because of that there were few persecutions. When Christianity was better understood as a belief incompatible with pagan ideas charges were brought against Christians. They were seen as dangerous to the Emperor and the State. Trajan ordered that those who refused to offer sacrifice to the pagan gods should be executed. From then until the Edict of Milan in 313 A.D. there were ten major persecutions of Christians in which many faced terrible torture and martyrdom. St. Agnes died in one of these. St. Agnes was only thirteen or fourteen years of age when an Imperial Edict was promulgated against Christians. She immediately voluntarily declared herself a Christian and suffered torture by fire before being decapitated by the sword. Around her tomb grew up a large catacomb that bore her name. The original slab that covered her remains is now in the museum at Naples. On the feast of St. Agnes two lambs are solemnly blessed and from their wool are made the "palliums" or white stoles that are sent by the Pope to Archbishops throughout the world on their appointment to that high office.

Preparation for Baptism


