FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

GOD'S LIVING WORD IN THE BIBLE

The last and most barbarous of the Christian persecutions by the Roman Empire was inaugurated by the Emperor Diocletian in the Year 298. It raged more or less until the edict of toleration by the Emperor Constantine in 312. One of the weapons which the tyrants used to stamp out Christianity was the burning of all of the Scriptures and religious books in the spread of Christianity. They rightly concluded that if they were to destroy Christianity they would have to destroy the books of the Christians. During the persecutions those Christians who weakened & willingly gave up the sacred books were branded with a special name, the 'Traditores', meaning those who handed over the books. From this latin word has come the word 'Traitors' in English.

The word, any word, has a formidable impact. Campaigning politicians, solicitors in court and successful salesmen and women are aware of its magic power and work miracles with it. The word is conveyed in its written form and in its spoken form. God's word is in the Bible. The Bible is a best seller and it remains unsurpassed by any book. In it we can read about God's living word. Do you read the Bible or listen to its words with faith?

If we do not make an effort to learn all we can about God, meeting him will be like meeting a stranger. Most of us prefer to meet and talk with friends rather than with strangers. Perhaps the reason many people find religion so burdensome is because God is a stranger to them. Is God your friend or is he a stranger to you?

We cannot all be great scholars, but we can give up a little of time which would otherwise be spent watching T.V. or reading light material to study our faith. Each one of us should make the effort to read and to learn more about the word of God. We should reflect on what we read and in doing so grow in our love of God. FIRST WEEK OF LENT**17 Sunday** Gen. 2:7-9. 3: 1 -7. Ps. 50. Rom. 5:12-19. Mt. 4:1 -11 *Lect I:201*

The Church has in mind the catechumens throughout the world who set out today on their great preparation for the Easter Vigil when they will become Christians. The faithful, who are already baptised, are the concern of the Church too. They must be awakened once more to the meaning of being in Christ. The faithful join with the catechumens in the struggle against the powers of darkness, confident that where sin abounded, grace abounds still more.

18 Monday Lev. 19:1 -2, H -18. Ps. 18. Mt. 25:31 -46. *Lect I:210*

The Gospel reminds us that Jesus came to preach good news to the poor. At the beginning of Lent we again get a reminder that good works are essential to our proper observance of the season, along with prayer and fasting.

19 Tuesday Is. 55:10-11. Ps. 33. Mt. 6:7-15. *Lect I:212*

The model for our prayer is the Lord's Prayer. It is a summary of the whole Gospel, the most perfect of all prayers. Being taught and given to us by our Lord, it is indeed the Word of God that goes out and succeeds in what it was sent to do. It is the foundation of the daily prayer of all Christians.

20 Wednesday Jon. 3:1-10. Ps. 50. Lk. 11:29-32. *Lect I:214*

Interior conversion is a radical turning away from sin and evil in our lives. It brings about a change in our lives through the working of God's grace.

21 Thursday Esther 14:1, 3-5, 12-14. (Vulgate) Ps. 137. Mt. 7:7-12. *Lect I: 216*

Queen Esther knew the practical things to be done and did them, but she did not rely on them. Her prayer shows that her confidence was in God: "I have no one but you, Lord".

22 Friday 1 Peter 5:1 -4 Ps 22 Mt 16:13-19 *Lect 11:540***23 Saturday** Deut 26:16-19 Ps 118 Mt 5:43-48 *Lect I: 221*

St Peter Damian stands out in Church history as a strong figure, one of the greatest reformers of the Middle Ages, who preached penance and love, not only by words, but by the example of his life: he died 22 February 1072.

The Chair of St Peter. This ancient feast relates to early Roman custom at this time of year of remembering the ancestors of the family, those who presided over the family fortunes. The texts today celebrate Peter as Bishop of Rome. We recall Christ's choice of Peter for service to the whole Church.

St Polycarp was born between the years 70 and 80. As a young man he became a disciple of Saint John the Evangelist; Later, John consecrated him bishop of Smyrna, a city now in modern Turkey. Eventually Polycarp was arrested and brought before the pagan authorities and they demanded that Polycarp deny Christ, the bishop quietly answered "I have been serving him eighty six years and He has never harmed, me. How then dare I blaspheme my King who has saved me?" This simple declaration of faith caused his death..

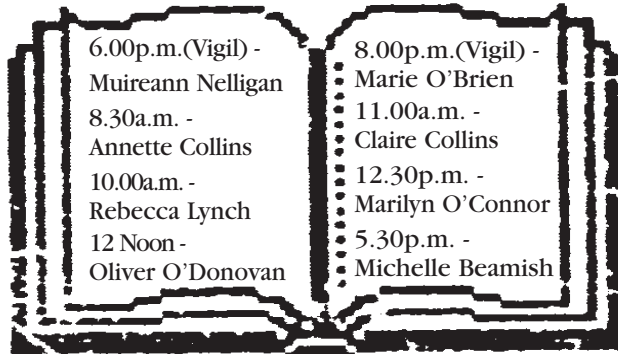

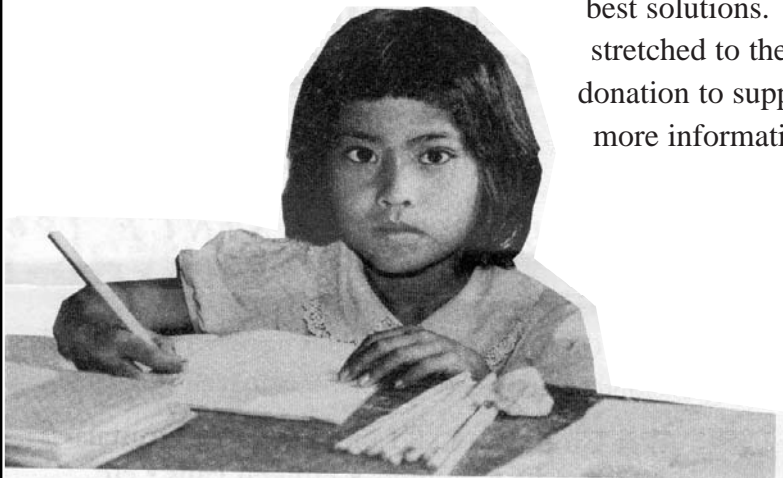

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**STATEMENT OF THE IRISH EPISCOPAL CONFERENCE
ON THE PROPOSED ABORTION REFERENDUM
- PART 1 -**

1. It is the clear and consistent teaching of the Catholic Church that human life is sacred from the moment of conception. In his 1995 Encyclical Letter The Gospel of Life (Evangelium Vitae) Pope John Paul II re-stated the teaching that "the human being is to be respected and treated as a person from the moment of conception. Therefore from that same moment his or her rights as a person must be recognised, among which in the first place is the inviolable right of every innocent human being to life" (#60). Nothing can ever justify the deliberate killing of an innocent human being.

2. The basic right to life is a natural and moral right which does not depend on legal or political recognition for its value. However, the Church has always insisted that a primary function of law is to protect the most needy and vulnerable human beings, including the unborn.

3. For these reasons, it is the responsibility and the entitlement of the bishops of Ireland, in communion with the Universal Church and its Supreme Pastor Pope John Paul II, to offer guidance to our people regarding the proposed Constitutional amendment as set out in the Twenty-fifth Amendment of the Constitution (Protection of Human Life in Pregnancy) Bill, 2001.

4. At present, the law in Ireland concerning the right to life of the unborn is determined by Article 40.3.3 of the Constitution as interpreted by the Supreme Court in the "X Case". It remains our conviction that the judgement in that case is profoundly flawed. It is for this reason that we have called on many occasions for a new referendum which would effectively overturn this judgement and restore adequate protection for the unborn.

5 We welcome and support the new proposal as a significant improvement on the current unsatisfactory situation. In particular, this proposal would appear to set aside deficient aspects of the "X case" judgement, including the acceptance of the risk of suicide as a legitimate ground for justifying abortion.

6. We are satisfied that, on any reasonable interpretation, the specific and particular protection offered to the unborn by the new proposal does not dilute or weaken the general protection already afforded by Article 40.3.3 of the Constitution.

7. But even if this new proposal is enacted, outstanding issues remain which require the ongoing attention of our legislators. We believe that the existing rights of the unborn from the moment of conception under Article 40.3.3 of the Constitution need to be reinforced by precise legislative measures.

8. In particular, we are concerned that adequate and clear legal protection be offered to the unborn prior to implantation. This is particularly urgent in view of what is happening and what is likely to happen in the area of cloning and research on human embryos, and also in the area of assisted human reproduction where particular problems arise regarding the storage and disposal of human embryos. It is of vital importance that embryos are never treated other than as human persons whose inherent worth and dignity are valued and vindicated.

9. In this regard, we are about to make a substantial submission to the Government Commission on Assisted Human Reproduction setting out in detail our moral concerns in this area.
