Lent and Reconciliation

Lent is an intense time of purification and enlightenment. It is period in our lives in which the Church encourages us to emphasize and reflect upon what needs to be changed about the way we live our lives. One of the many ways we can go about entering into this purification is by celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

For some of us the idea of going to "confession" is frightening. It recalls nerve-wracking experiences as a child going into a dark confessional, reciting a long list of personal faults and enduring being scolded by the confessor. In the aftermath of the Second Vatican Council the entire experience of "Reconciliation," has changed enormously. First the name: to call the Sacrament "confession," is to describe only one aspect of the action. To confess is to merely voice one's faults and sins. To "reconcile," is to be brought into right relationship with the other. In this case, the other is our loving Father, who like the Prodigal Father in the parable is eager to welcome us home.

If it has been many years since you have celebrated the sacrament, do not feel you need to make a list of every transgression. Rather consider the consistent ways in which you have turned away from God, your family and neighbors. Voice to the confessor the opportunities you have missed to be a loving generous person, the times you have surrendered to gossip and blasphemy. In his Catholic Update "Understanding Sin Today," Richard Gula describes an example of a contemporary reconciliation between a confessor and a young Dad:

"Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been 3 months since my last confession. I am a husband, a father of three teenage children, and I hold an executive position in a large computer firm. Over the past month I have allowed love to grow cold at home and in my work. At home, I have been inattentive to my wife and children as I allowed my new projects at work to consume most of my time and attention. I have spent more time at work and little time with the family. At work, I have selfishly neglected to disclose some data which my colleagues needed for a new project. I wanted to gain the glory. I have also failed to support a female colleague who was clearly being sexually harassed and I failed to confront those who were doing the harassing".

This imaginary Reconciliation is an excellent example of how to express ourselves within the context of the sacrament. Although we become anxious when contemplating going to Reconciliation there is a tremendous peace that awaits us on the other side of that nervousness. Think about the possibility of celebrating Reconciliation during Lent. Approached with an open heart, it can be a positive, enriching opportunity to draw closer to God and find an inner peace. (A Reconciliation Service will be held as part of the Parish Lenten Retreat in early March).

As part of Ballincollig Tidy Towns work for 2008 the committee have commenced Weekly "Litter Picks". Each week they select a different area and carry out a litter pick on Sunday mornings from 11 am to 12 noon.

The second Litter pick took place on the Link Road last Sunday morning and at a glance the road looked fairly good but when the committee and those who assisted on the day picked 7 Black Bags of rubbish including a pair of men's safety boots which were dumped at the side of the road.

Some of the private commercial sites on the Road had a lot of litter around them some of which is old litter. Owners are asked to make a bigger effort in cleaning up around their premises.

One thing that surprised each person carrying out the Litter Pick was the huge levels of Dog Fouling all along the footpaths and the grass verges. According to one of the committee people with dogs are responsible for cleaning up after their dogs and failure to do so can lead to a substantial fine. The committee thank those who make the effort with their dogs but ask those who don't to be aware of the possibility of being fined by the Litter Warden who is very active in Ballincollig.


