Lay Leadership in a Changing Church

The Irish catholic faithful has been spoiled for generations! An inordinate number of vocations resulted in more priests than were really needed to serve the population. Therefore parishes offered more services than were pastorally necessary or desirable, whilst lay participation was stymied. It meant huge choices in Sunday mass times and even options in the times of daily masses! This is a luxury that won't be always there.

20 years ago there were an average of 6 ordinations every year for this diocese. Now that has trickled to one, or none. This translates to fewer priests to serve an increased population with more demands than ever. Despite fewer numbers and a greater workload, the expectations remain unrealistic. Add to this, the age profile of the clergy, where the majority of PP's are working well beyond the normal retirement age and you get a sense of a harsh reality. There are currently about 70 men under 66 years (and most of them are over 40!). In another 10 years this figure will have dropped to about 40 men just under the normal retirement age! It is obvious there will not be enough priests to staff all 68 parishes within 10-15 years. Practically every parish has had the experience in recent times of already seeing numbers of clergy reduced. This will be the continuing trend with some parishes in the not too distant future, undoubtedly not having a full time resident priest. With such a huge change in the pipeline, then it is prudent to plan now for this changed model of church.

My experience of ministry in Peru over 20 years ago mirrors what is happening in Ireland now. It was common there for parishes not to have a priest. Rural parishes got a visit from a priest just once a year and this was an occasion of major celebrations, with baptisms, 1st communions, confirmations, confessions and marriages as well as masses for the dead of the past year, all celebrated with great fervour over one weekend. It was enlightening that a community without a priest was not without an organised church. Lay leaders and catechists kept the faith alive. The community worshipped each Sunday, services being led by lay leaders. These communities displayed a vibrancy than was not always found in parishes that had the luxury of a full time priest!

In Ireland it has been taken for granted that there is 24/7 availability of clergy. What would happen then, if there was no priest available on a weekday, or God forbid, on a Sunday, in Ballincollig? Something as simple as a bad flu outbreak, affecting all 3 of us priests currently in the parish, could have the parish paralysed in one fell swoop! Would the congregation just pile into cars and head to a neighbouring parish for mass? Perhaps a substitute priest might be sought...... but where? (There are no subs in this game!)

But, like rural parishes in Peru, Ballincollig has the blessing of fantastically committed lay leaders, teachers and other lay ministers that regularly participate in the liturgical and faith life of the parish. Now is the time for their giftedness to be recognised so that they can exercise their ministry in it's fullness, in the call to service, that is part of being baptised.

On Saturday mornings during July and August Lay Leaders of Prayer, along with Lectors and Ministers of the Eucharist will pilot a 'Service of Word and Communion'. This Service will take place at St Mary and St John's at 10.00am. This is new to Ballincollig, but is a regular occurrence in other parishes (Knocknaheeny, Clogheen, Innishannon, Glanmire etc). Lay Leaders have been trained, but undoubtedly may be apprehensive leading the service for the first time, so please give them your support and encouragement. Hopefully the regular morning worshippers will come as usual on Saturday at 10.00am and pray together as a parish community. The service has a familiar format starting with a Penitential Rite followed by the Liturgy of the Word and Communion. The Lord will be truly present among His people gathered to worship. He will be present in His Word to guide and enlighten. He will be present in the Eucharist to nurture and sustain.

This is a new departure in proactive planning for a future reality. It is a sign of the action of the Spirit, like in the early church, bringing forth leaders in the community, which is a blessing for all of us. May all who lead and participate in the Services of Word and Communion be truly enriched.

St. Patrick's Missionary Society

St. Patrick's Missionary Society, better known as the Kiltegan Fathers, was founded on St. Patrick's Day 1932, by Fr. Patrick Whitney, a priest from the Diocese of Ardagh and Clonmacnois. Since then, Kiltegan priests, together with Volunteer priests from different Irish Dioceses, including the Diocese of Cork, went first to Nigeria, and later to Kenya, Zambia, Malawi, Brazil, South Africa and Zimbabwe, and the West Indies.

Today, there are 308 Kiltegan priests, as well as 79 young African and Brazilian men preparing for priest-hood as members of St. Patrick's Missionary Society. The first 4 African "Kiltegans" were ordained this year and will be sent to various missions around the world. What began with Patrick Whitney from Ardagh and Clonmacnois has gone a long way - and is not finished yet!

The Mission Appeal for Kiltegan will ask for our continued support for their various missionary works, through enrolling in Mission Circle and/or subscribing to "Africa" magazine.

The Appeal will take place at all Masses in the parish this weekend.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 2 Samuel 12:7-10, 13

Nathan tells King David a story that helps David to see the terrible sin he has committed. Because he wanted another man's wife for himself, David deliberately placed the soldier in the front line of battle where he would be killed. God had given David so many blessings and David now realizes he has sinned against God. David is filled with sorrow but Nathan assures him of God's forgiveness. Like David, any one of us can lose our perspective and let our desires rule us. We are not entitled to take what belongs to somebody else. Pray for God's help against this temptation

Second Reading: Galatians 2:16, 19-21

St. Paul says that having faith in Jesus is what makes us favourable in God's eyes. Paul tells us that his faith is so strong that it's as if he no longer lives, but Christ lives in him. People should be able to see God's love radiating in us. Those who are so intent on keeping the law that they don't reflect God's love are missing the point. Keeping the law is important, but the law alone will not help us to be saved.

Gospel: Luke 7-36-8:3

In today's Gospel we see how Jesus forgave a woman, who 'had a bad name in the town', for 'her many sins' because she had shown sorrow for her sin; this happened in Simon's house where Simon had invited Jesus to a meal. Jesus turned to the woman and told her, 'Your sins are forgiven'...'Your faith has saved you; go in peace'.

We too hear these words of God's forgiveness spoken to us by the priest when he gives-us absolution for our sins in the Sacrament of Reconciliation

Some tips to Patrol leaders before they start out for camp. The difference between an ordinary handsaw and a crosscut is that in the first it is the push that does the work, in the second it's the pull.

A back-packer is only as good as his feet. Wash them before you set out on a long hike.

Sheerlegs, which must carry a considerable load, for instance, a monkey bridge, require fore and aft guylines on each leg.

The difference between mist and fog is one of density. Clove – hitches should always be locked – either with a half hitch or by tucking the end into the lay, or by turning the tail end round the part you are working with, as in a lashing. You can make tent canvas windproof by wetting it. During forestry activities, never climb a tree carrying axe, saw or any other sharp tool. Carry a light line, so that the tool can be drawn up when you are safely in the working position.

Scouting and backwoodsmanship is what we're out for, and what the boys most want. Let them have it good and strong. It is in camp that the Scouter has his opportunity for inculcating under pleasing means the four main points of training: character, service for others, skill and bodily health. But beside all it is his golden chance to bring the boy to God through the direct appeal of nature and her store of wonders. So wrote our Founder in 1917.

A Scouter of words and not deeds is like a garden full of weeds.
