

THIRTY -THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

How often fear and anxiety prevent people from producing their best, from using their God-given talents to the full. In today's parable Jesus shows that a God who inspires fear may inspire little else. His image of God as a loving father inspires confidence and so enables us to develop what he has given us.

INDULGENCES

Indulgences are a special heavenly treasure which the Church grants us, to repay the debt we owe God for our sins and heal the damage done to our souls by sin.

God has allowed the Church to attach indulgences to certain actions or prayers, so that when we perform these actions or prayers, we can receive the indulgence.

There are two kinds of indulgences: partial indulgences, and plenary indulgences.

Plenary indulgences: The word "plenary" means "full," so a plenary indulgence takes away all the punishment due to our sins. If someone received a plenary indulgence, and died immediately afterwards, that person would not even have to go to Purgatory. The grace available in an indulgence is infinite (it comes from the merits of Christ), but our own sorrow for our sins is a large factor in receiving these graces. One of the conditions for gaining a plenary indulgence is that you have to have no attachment to sin. You have to be perfectly sorry for your sins, and never want to commit them again. This true repentance opens your soul wide to God's grace, so you can receive the full effect of the indulgence. However, if you perform an action or prayer which is attached to a plenary indulgence, but you are still attached in some way to your sins, you receive a partial indulgence.

Partial indulgences: A partial indulgence takes away part of the punishment due to our sins. The Church attaches a partial indulgence to less important prayers and actions. A long time ago, indulgences used to be measured in "days" or "years," which were equivalent to an equal length of time spent doing severe penance (i.e. if you said a certain prayer, you could get an indulgence of "forty years.") However, this led to people simply adding up the days and years of indulgence they had gained instead of concentrating on true sorrow for sin, so the Church abolished these indulgences in 1969 in favour of the term "partial indulgence." A partial indulgence is not measured in definite time lengths, because its efficacy depends on our own openness to God and our rejection of sin. Even partial indulgences are very valuable to us - would you complain if you owed a debt of 620,000, and someone paid 66,000 for you?!

Note: A partial indulgence may be gained several times a day. A plenary indulgence can only be gained once a day.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

THE SUNDAY READINGS FIRST READING: Proverbs, 31: 10-13, 19-20, 30-31

The Book of Proverbs was written to enable the reader, especially the young, to live rightly. It endeavours by earnest warnings and by stressing the importance of virtue to shape the reader's life in accordance with the will of God. The final section of the book which is read today is one of the most beautiful poems in the Bible, written in praise of a worthy wife. Economical in running the household she still finds something to help the poor. Peace reigns in her home. Things like beauty that are much prized in women pass away: wisdom remains.

SECOND READING: Thessalonians, 5: 1-6
St. Paul deals with the question: "Is the end of the world near at hand?". Neither the time in general nor the particular date can be known. It will be as catastrophic as the great flood and as unexpected; as sudden as the visit of a thief in the night. But it is possible to be ready for it whenever it comes and to live in a state of watchfulness.

GOSPEL: Matt. 25: 14-30

The parable of the Talents illustrates the faithfulness required of each Christian in the administration of the goods committed to him by the Master. The central figure is the lazy man who, even though he received a talent, made no use of it. He has many excuses even throwing responsibility on the Master who was "an exacting man". The parable teaches that God's gifts are held in stewardship and must not be allowed to lie idle. It is a day on which to reflect on the gifts and opportunities God has given us and to survey how we are using them now and in the coming year.

SAINT OF THE WEEK 23rd - NOVEMBER - 02 SAINT COLUMBAN

St. Columban, also widely known as Columbanus, was born around 543 and became a monk of Bangor on the coast of County Down. He later set out with twelve companions for Burgundy in France where he established a monastery in Annegray. Owing to the incursions of the barbarians and the laxity of the clergy, the Church in France was at that time in a weak state. Wherever Columban and his Irish monks went the people were struck by their modesty, patience and humility. So many joined them in their hard monastic life that two further monastic foundations followed at Luxeuil and Fontaine.

Because the life of Columban was a rebuke to the royal life style he and his Irish monks were ordered out of French territory. After many difficulties they journeyed to Italy where they founded the monastery at Bobbio between Milan and Genoa. There the saint died. In 1482 his body was placed in a new shrine and laid beneath the altar in the crypt where it is still venerated.

After Columbanus many Irish monks went to work on continental Europe where they are credited with keeping both Christianity and learning alive during the Dark Ages following the collapse of Roman power.






