Lent, A Season of Growth

Early Spring is always an exciting time, suddenly Winter is past, the days lengthen, the sun strengthens, the birds sing and begin their nest-making. The garden comes alive again. The snowdrops and daffodils are the heralds of Spring. It is the time for pruning. Many plants are improved by being cut back, and careful pruning produces healthier and better plants. If left to themselves, they can become gnarled and twisted and don't produce the fruit or flower they are capable of producing. Other plants need to be split, divided up and replanted, and some of these can be given away. Plants, like people, thrive if they are not fighting for the same space, or if they are not in a space that has been used over and over. Spring is also a time to add some nourishment to the land.

I see Lent as a time of lengthening and letting God's power strengthen in our lives. If it is a time for cutting back, it is so that we can live fuller and more abundant lives, or so that we can have more to give away. I do not see Lent as a time of misery or pointless renunciation, but as a time of growth and hope. I do not ask people, "What are you giving up for Lent?" Better to ask, "What extra do you do for Lent?" "How do you live this Lenten time to the full?" All that pruning is only productive if it leads to growth and fullness of life.

I see Lent as a time for change, a change of direction, which is best described as a 'repentance' or a 'turning around'. What we need is a change of attitude – a move from a historic understanding of God to a personal relationship, usually referred to as Faith. And so we are faced with life-changing and life-challenging events.

If we want a nice garden, we have to work at it. Similarly, if we want a better and more fruitful life, we have to work at it. A garden left on it's own will go to ruin. It may take years but it's beauty and goodness will gradually be lost. Many people say that they do what comes naturally when it comes to their daily living. But doing what comes naturally produces weeds and briars. If we want to have a full and productive life we have to put some planning and effort into it. A wise old friend of mine who was a great gardener, once said to me, "Plan your work and work your plan." He was talking about the garden but I knew that he meant me to relate his words to the whole of my life.

Are we planning and working this Lenten time? Let this Lent be a positive time. A season of growth in all our lives.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Genesis 12:1-4

Abram was commanded by the Lord to leave his home and go to a new land. There the Lord God would make of him a great nation and all would be blessed because of him.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 1:8-10

God saves all people and calls them to a holy life, not because of their own merit but because of the grace held out in Christ. Christ "destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel."

Gospel: Matthew 17:1-9

The second Sunday of Lent always gives us an account of the transfiguration. Jesus asked Peter, James and John to go with him to the mountain top. While they were there, Jesus was transfigured and became dazzling white before them. Along with Jesus stood Moses and Elijah. The voice of God announced that Jesus was his son and that all should listen to him. The disciples were frightened, but Jesus calmed them. When Peter, James and John looked up, Jesus was the only one left . . . the one to whom we need to listen.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Polycarp 23-February-2004

A letter about Polycarp, bishop of Smyrna, written from the Church at Smyrna to the other Christian churches after his death, and reproduced by the fourth- century historian Eusebius of Caesarea, gives most of the available information about him. He is also mentioned in the writings of Irenaeus of Lyons, who was his disciple. Polycarp had learned directly from John the Evangelist, and in his old age, he could remember John's words and even the inflexions of his voice. He became bishop of Smyrna in about 107, and was noted for his defence of the Christian faith against the Gnostics, a defence carried on by Irenaeus in his Adversus Haereses. He was much given to peace and reconciliation, and he travelled to Rome to meet Anicetus, bishop of Rome, to try to heal the growing breach between the Eastern and Western Churches. The two could not agree, and finally decided to differ in charity. Polycarp died in one of the sporadic riots stirred up by Roman governors against Christians from time to time. He refused to escape, and sat calmly waiting for his pursuers to find him. Taken before the governor, he refused to sacrifice to the Roman gods, and said that he had been a Christian for eighty- six years: he would not deny his master in his old age. He was despatched by a. swordthrust. The letter from the Church at Smyrna concludes by saying, 'He was the twelfth to die at Smyrna, but he alone is specially remembered by all, so that even the heathen everywhere speak of him.

Human nature grows tired of always doing the same thing, and it is God's will that this should be because of the opportunity of practicing two great virtues. The first is perseverance, which will bring us to our goal. The other is steadfastness, which overcomes the difficulties on the way.
