Passion (Palm) Sunday

Jesus was tortured and humiliated by the pride and self-will of people. He accepted this fate so as to overcome human destructiveness. His humble attentiveness to God allows God's power to be active and recreative.

Our True Worth Is Expressed In Humility

The donkey was a familiar sight in Ireland years ago. Every farm had a donkey. When not grazing in a field, the donkey was tethered to the farm cart for carrying loads. Sometimes it was called "old side-pockets" a reference to the wicker baskets, strapped across its back for bringing home the turf. It might be a stubborn animal, but it was a gentle one, beloved of children.

On today, Palm Sunday, the donkey celebrates its hour of glory. It is the chosen form of transport for Jesus as He comes into the great City of Jerusalem. Jesus has arranged it, and so fulfills the ancient prophecy – "Look your King comes to you; He is humble, He rides on a donkey."

This moment of humble entry into Jerusalem is preserved forever in the Gospel pages and is celebrated again in the famous poem of G.K. Chesterton, 'The Donkey'. There Chesterton writes of the animal.

"The tattered outlaw of the earth, of ancient crooked will; Starve, scourge, deride me; I am dumb, I keep my secret still. Fools! For I also had my hour; One far fierce hour and sweet. There was a shout about my ears and palms before my feet."

Yes, this humble and lowly animal has a noble story to tell. It carried the Saviour of the world, the Lord of Life, into the sacred city. Jesus did not creep into the city like some hunted man. Nor did He demand pomp and ceremony in order to claim some worldly status. He came as He was, a good and honest man, humble and riding on a donkey.

When the palm waving was over, the donkey was returned home, no doubt to work and to carry packs and to pull carts. Perhaps even to carry children. A humble animal, yes, but one fit to carry the Son of God.

Jesus is our 'model of humility'. To be humble is to know who you truly are. To know your worth in the eyes of God, your value and your dignity. The humble donkey can remind us today of our own personal worth. We may learn from that animal a humble, truthful attitude to life and a deep respect for creatures. Most of all may we learn to treat people with gentleness, to deal with them kindly and to help them bear the burdens on the journey of life.

Let us in this Lenten time remember that our glory is to be found in serving one another.

Reflection for Parents

There is much to reflect on in this reading. One interesting note, however, is the different responses Judas and Peter had when they came face to face with their rejection of Christ. After his three denials, Peter "wept bitterly." These tears of regret led the way to reconciliation when Peter first encountered the risen Christ. Judas, on the other hand, knew what he did was wrong, but he couldn't face the hopelessness his actions brought. To relieve the pain of what he had done, Judas took his own life. Some days it is difficult (even beyond measure) to be a parent. The lesson we learn today is that reconciliation and healing bring us long-term joy instead of living in the harsh bitterness of despair.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7

The servant of the Lord was rebuffed but did not turn back; he was beaten and spat upon. The suffering one knew the Lord God was with him.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11

Christ was in the form of God but did not consider equality with God a thing to be grasped at. He emptied himself, took the form of a slave, and was obedient unto death! Therefore, God exalted him, and all proclaim him Lord.

Gospel: Matthew 26:14-27:66

Each year on this Sunday we follow the events of Jesus' life from the time he entered Jerusalem until the point where he was laid in the tomb after his crucifixion. Jesus first entered Jerusalem riding a donkey amid waving palm leaves. It was in Jerusalem that he foretold Judas' betraval, Peter's denial, and established the Eucharist at the Passover meal. Jesus took his disciples into Gethsemane to pray, but they could not stay awake with him. In the garden, Jesus was turned over to the authorities, tried before the Sanhedrin, brought to Pilate, and sentenced to death. When offered a choice during the festival to release a prisoner, the people chose the release of Barabbas. Their choice was beyond Pilate's comprehension, so he symbolically washed his hands of the whole deal. Jesus was turned over to the Roman authorities for crucifixion and mocked by them. Finally, Jesus died on the cross. The earth darkened and quaked. He was prepared quickly for burial and laid in the tomb.

All are welcome.


Open Night & Exhibition Of Work
