## Twelfth Sunday In Ordinary Time

*Christ is known to us through the Gospels. They show not only his tremendous love, but also his might and authority. So even when things are going badly for us, we should never fail to trust him.*

### 'Why Are You So Frightened?'

In today's Gospel, we see where Jesus is in a boat crossing the Sea of Galilee with his disciples. During the journey he sleeps. While he slept, a storm with strong winds arose. After some panic-stricken moments, the disciples, who were filled with fear, woke Jesus up saying: 'Master do you not care that we are going down?' Jesus saw the danger, and said to the sea, "quiet now, be calm" And at once everything calmed down. Then Jesus asks the disciples 'why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?'

From time to time, all of us experience turmoil in our lives. The fear that the disciples had is the exact fear that we all have when we are confronted with a crisis. During these times we too may feel that Jesus is again sleeping and we question: 'Lord where are you; do you not know what I'm going through; why is this happening to me?' God, who is close to each of us knows our anxieties and fears. He challenges us as he challenged his disciples, "Why are you afraid? Where is your faith?" When troubles come our way, often we forget that God is still with us, telling us to 'be calm' and not to be afraid. Jesus himself knew what it was to be fearful. We remember the night before his crucifixion in the Garden of Gethsemane, he prayed to his Father, if it was his will, to take away the agony he was going through. While God did not take away his suffering, he answered his prayer by giving him the strength to face it.

Today we pray that our faith may be steadfast and strong whenever we are thrown into turmoil. The Lord is always there with us. And he can and will protect us. It is so easy to doubt and live in fear. Like the disciples in the boat, we only need to call on him. We have to be aware of Jesus' presence in our lives and his desire to care for us.

**THE SUNDAY READINGS**

First Reading: Job 38:1, 8-11

Today's first reading is part of God's answer. God asks Job to look at the sea and its power. Who created the sea? God asks Job. Not human beings, but God. Let us pray peacefully in the sight of the sea or a picture of it: You are great, O God, and mighty is your power. I will praise you as long as the seas last and crash on the shore.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 5:14-17

In this reading Saint Paul continues to help the Corinthians to understand what their response should be to Christ, who died for us. Paul tells them and us that the love of Christ for us should call us to love for him. We should no longer live for ourselves, in a self-centered way, but for Jesus Christ who gave his life for us.

Gospel: Mark 4:35-41

Put yourself in this scene. You are in a small sailboat with the apostles. A great storm comes up and the waves crash against the boat. Jesus, who must be very tired, stays asleep. The apostles, afraid of drowning, wake Jesus up. "Be still," he tells the storm at sea, and at once there is a great calm. His disciples' mood switches from terror to awe at this sign, which recalls so vividly the words of God in the first reading.

***A Holiday Prayer***

O God, who after completing the wonders of creation, rested on the seventh day, I thank you for the opportunity you have given me to get away from my usual surroundings, to spend this holiday, this time, apart from daily work and worry. I ask of you dear Lord, to let my time of rest be a time of closer union with you, and help me not to lose sight of you in my pursuit of pleasure. Let me recognise you in my joy and let me see on this holiday, Lord, the beauty, power, majesty and wonder of your creation. Let me see you in the sun and sea, snow and stars, and above all in my fellow pilgrims through life. Grant me Lord to lay down my cross awhile, and gather strength to take it up more willingly, when I resume my usual path through life. Let me see clearly in the fleetness of this holiday my Lord, the shortness of time and the length of eternity. Finally, O Lord grant me the grace of a safe journey through life to my eternal home in the glory of your kingdom. Amen.

***Irish Cancer Society***

- ◆ 90% of all skin cancers are preventable. Virtually, all the risk comes from the sun & sun beds/sunlamps.
- ◆ About 80 - 85% of the sun's rays can pass through clouds so you need to take care on cloudy days too.
- ◆ Damage to the skin by the sun is permanent. It also builds up – that means damage to the skin in one year is added to damage done in previous years. In later life this can lead to skin cancer.
- ◆ Skin cancer can take 20 to 30 years to develop, so the rates of skin cancer today reflect the trends of the 70's and 80's.
- ◆ Ultraviolet Radiation from sunlight and sun beds/sunlamps is the main risk factor for skin cancer.
- ◆ In Ireland, one in every eight men and one in every ten women develop skin cancer by the age of 74 years.
- ◆ The number of skin cancer cases is rising every year.
- ◆ Ireland has among the highest skin cancer rates in Europe.
- ◆ Two-thirds of Irish people have a higher risk of developing Skin Cancer because of their skin type.
- ◆ Irish people are exposed to the sun more often than in the past (mainly due to holidaying abroad).
- ◆ A tan has become more fashionable in Ireland than in the past. This puts us at greater risk of developing skin cancer in later years


