Christ Our Light Innishmore

The Feast of Christ the King.

Pope Pius XI introduced the feast of Christ the King in 1925. This was a period of great tension and stress in Europe; many nations were still badly divided and people were living their lives in fear. Throughout Europe totalitarianism and fascism had taken hold and their encouragement for intolerance, racism and persecution brought suffering and fear to many. In Russia communism had taken hold and restricted people's freedom in varied ways. The feast of Christ the King reminds us that for believers there is a real gospel value, an allegiance higher than any other, an allegiance which prompts us to question all the ideologies or loyalties that would claim us.

Christ can only be truly called King as the crucified one. That the group gathered around him could truly be the children of the kingdom undermines our assumptions about who is worthy and who is to be excluded. None of those who jeer at him or reject him are placed outside his concern or shepherding care. The promise to the good thief is a symbol of Christ exercising his kingly power to deliver his people from those who would deprive them of their freedom - just as the prime duty for a political king is to ensure the security of his people.

The qualities central to the kingdom of Christ are Love, Peace, Justice and Forgiveness. The central proclamation of Christianity is the victory of the Love of God. What does it mean in today's world to talk about the reign of Christ, when so many ideologies and things seem to reign. Certainly weapons seem to rule; power seems to rule at times; terrorism seems to rule in many areas; violence rules in other quarters. For some, economics with it's twin advertising and marketing rules; for others an addiction may rule the roost. However on days like today let us reflect on the question Who or what is my master??

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 2 Samuel 5:1-3

David was anointed King; he was designated as ruler by a solemn act of pouring oil on his head. The word "Messiah" means the "Anointed One." For this reason, David is a figure of Jesus Christ, his descendant.

Second Reading: Colossians 1:12-20

Paul speaks of the ways in which Christ is our King. In all the aspects of his rule, Christ is spoken of in his human nature, as a man.

Gospel: Luke 23:35-43.

Associated with Jesus' passion, today's Gospel brings us to the scene of the crucifixion. Jesus, on his own cross, is flanked by thieves on either side. One of the thieves jeers and taunts Jesus calling him a king and wondering why a king cannot save himself and them as well. Jesus responds telling the thief that his royalty is not like that of earthly kingdoms. He has no material wealth or armies. The second thief asks Jesus to remember him when he comes into his kingdom. We know today that he is with Jesus in heaven.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Columban 23-November-2004

St. Columban, also widely known as Columbanus, was born around 543 and became a monk of Bangor on the coast of County Down. He later set out with twelve companions for Burgundy in France where he established a monastery in Annegray. Owing to the incursions of the barbarians and the laxity of the clergy, the Church in France was at that time in a weak state. Wherever Columban and his Irish monks went the people were struck by their modesty, patience and humility. So many joined them in their hard monastic life that two further monastic foundations followed at Luxeuil and Fontaine.

Because the life of Columban was a rebuke to the royal life style he and his Irish monks were ordered out of French territory. After many difficulties they journeyed to Italy where they founded the monastery at Bobbio between Milan and Genoa. There the saint died. In 1482 his body was placed in a new shrine and laid beneath the altar in the crypt where it is still venerated.

After Columbanus many Irish monks went to work on continental Europe where they are credited with keeping both Christianity and learning alive during the Dark Ages following the collapse of Roman power.


