### The Mysteries of Life

There are many mysteries in life; suffering is one of them, evil is another: death is a third. Life all humans Jesus came face to face with all these in his life on earth. Jesus did not shirk them; he didn't run or avoid them. He didn't give any explanation either; there are no easy answers to these mysteries. Instead Jesus faced them and conquered them. We live in the confidence that evil and sin, pain and suffering, death and mortality have all lost their power, all conquered by the love of Christ who gave himself up to death for us.

Today in the gospel we see Christ face to face with the enormity of what lies ahead. He knows that the ordeal will lead to God's glory being revealed, but to be face to face with the ordeals that he would endure would be enough to shake anyone. The human side of Jesus is clear to us as he says "my soul is troubled" and cries out "what shall I say: Father save me from this hour". This is someone we can identify with, a situation that we know well, for we know that life is hard and lands us in situations that we would rather not be, when there is no escape from the darkness that surrounds. The image of the grain of wheat indicates the pattern that life must follow, "unless the grain of wheat dies, it remains a single grain, but if it dies it yields a rich harvest." The pain of dying - - dying to self, dying to sin, the pain of the physical death of someone close to us and eventually our own – all of this is part of our experience of life.

The call that is given to follow Christ is to follow him in glorious days and also to follow him in suffering, to climb Calvary with him to believe that we too must lose our lives, give them up to follow him. "To whom shall we go you have the message of Eternal life".

We can be thankful to the prophet Jeremiah for what he has contributed to the understanding of God, which developed over the centuries of the Hebrew Scriptures. **THE SUNDAY READINGS**

First Reading: Jeremiah 31: 31-34

The prophet foretells the day when a new covenant will be made between God and man. Christ will be the new High Priest. Before him all men will be equal and the different religious beliefs will one day disappear, as all men will come to know the one true God.

Second Reading: Hebrews 5: 7-9

Gethsemane rather than Calvary is the scene here. Christ is presented in his weakness. Nowhere was Jesus more evidently one of our weak human selves than in the garden of Gethsemane where he suffered his agony of anticipation. Being innocent he could not offer sacrifice for his own sins like the High Priests in the Old Testament but he could pray out of the anguish of mortal weakness which he took on for our salvation.

Gospel: John 12: 20-30

The grain of wheat has life in it but that does not germinate into the production of other living grains unless it is subject to death and burial in the ground. Martyrdom is the highest act of self-denial. The cross frightens us, but it also frightened Jesus. The vivid image of a cruel death brought to Jesus a tremor of fear. Crucified, he will draw all people, without distinction of race, to himself.

**Trocaire Lenten Campaign 2015**

There is a very short parable in today's Gospel describing a seed which has fallen on the ground and eventually dies. It may remain a single seed or it may yield a rich harvest. This concept of losing what one has to give way to something new and life-giving is frightening for some. We get so attached and lifestyle changes are tough. In this passage Jesus knows that his hour has come; this is his crisis moment. But Jesus' time of anguish moves from a cry of 'save me' to one of glorifying God 'let it be as You not I would have it'. We are at an 'hour' in terms of climate justice. This is the time where big decisions and commitments must be made and there is no other option but to opt for life, to listen to God's will, not ours. The priorities of wealthy nations must change, must turn outward and take risks if we are all to experience peace and security. We remember the horrendous storms which battered Ireland last year and which will continue to do so as our climates changes. We are called to be stewards of the earth: 'Everything has been entrusted to our protection, and all of us are responsible for it' (Pope Francis). For us to be true stewards means campaigning for legislation at national level and different choices at a personal level.

*'I would like to ask all those who have positions of responsibility in economic, political and social life, and all men and women of goodwill: Let us be protectors of creation, protectors of God's plan inscribed in nature, protectors of one another and of the environment.' Pope Francis.*
