SAINTS THIS WEEK

Monday 23rd - John of Capistrano 1386-1456, studied civil and canon law and joined the Franciscan Order. A faithful servant of four popes, he attended the Council of Florence, went to Jerusalem as apostolic emissary, and, in 1451, set out on a preaching tour through the German provinces and Poland. In a battle at Belgrade he contracted fever and died there. Patron saint of jurists and military chaplains.

Tuesday 24th - **St. Anthony Mary Claret** 1807-70, founded the Claretians in Spain for missionary work. Archbishop of Santiago, Cuba, then returned as chaplain to the Queen of Spain, and built schools and museums, before being exiled with the monarchy.

Wednesday 25th - Bl. Thaddeus MacCarthy was born in 1455. His appointment as Bishop of Ross was opposed and Innocent VIII then appointed him Bishop of Cork and Cloyne. He set out as a humble pilgrim to Rome, where he was confirmed as Bishop of Cork and Cloyne. On his return journey in 1492 he died at Ivrea in Italy.

Friday 27th - St. Otteran a descendant of Conall Gulban, is usually identified with Odhran who preceded Colum Cille in Iona. His death is recorded in 548 and his grave was greatly revered in Iona. He was chosen by the Vikings as patron of the city of Waterford in 1096 and later patron of the diocese.

Saturday 28th - **Sts. Simon & Jude** The teaching of the apostles is the living gospel for all to hear. Their authority comes from their fidelity to Christ and his message. St. Jude is patron saint of hopeless causes.

DESCRIPTION OF MENINGITIS

Meningococcal disease results from a bacterial infection caused by the organism neisseria meningitidis. Up to 25% of adolescents and 5-11% of adults naturally carry the bacteria, which causes the disease without manifesting any signs or symptoms of the disease (known as carriers). The route of transmission is through droplets or respiratory secretions such as coughing and sneezing or more directly through kissing. What triggers the disease to develop in a susceptible person is unknown.

SYMPTOMS OF MENINGITIS

The signs and symptoms of the disease are vomiting, fever, severe headache, painful joints and stiff neck. In babies there may also be a high-pitched moaning cry, refusal to eat, pale or blotchy skin and difficulty in wakening. As the disease progresses dislike of light, disorientation, reduced awareness possibly leading to coma and development of red or purple spots that do not fade under pressure may develop.

MINISTER FOR HEALTH & CHILDREN LAUNCHES IRELAND'S MOST EXTENSIVE NATIONAL IMMUNISATION PROGRAMME

The first phase of a national immunisation programme to protect those most vulnerable to the Meningococcal Disease Group C - babies and children aged 0-4 and adolescents aged 15-18 years - was launched today by Mr. Micheál Martin, T.D. Minister for Health & Children in Dublin in conjunction with the health board's Chief Executive Officers (CEOs) through the Office for Health Gain.

Meningococcal infection is the most common cause of death in children and young people to the age 20 years. Groups B and C account for almost all cases in Ireland. The incidence of this disease is of great concern to public health professionals. We have seen a 43% increase in meningococcal C cases this year (July 1999-June 2000) compared to the same time period in 1998/99. Recent reports from the UK have confirmed a 75% decrease in the number of cases of meningococcal C infection since the introduction of a similar immunisation programme.

During the first phase of the immunisation programme the vaccine will be given with parental consent to babies attending their GP for other vaccines at 2, 4, 6 and 15 months and to other children aged 0-4 years inclusive by their GP/family doctor. In this phase the vaccine will also be administered, with consent, by health board vaccination terms to young people in school from Junior Certificate and will also be available in 3rd level institutions to first year students. Young people aged 15-18 years who are not in full-time education should contact their health board regarding arrangements for immunisation.

The meningococcal C conjugate vaccine, while new to Ireland, has been distributed widely in the UK: more than 15 million doses have been administered up to August 2000. A rate of less than 1 report of a specific reaction for every 10,000 doses distributed has been reported, with the majority of these reactions being non-serious.

teams.
