CHRISTMAS

Every year the Church expresses its profound wonder as it contemplates the great mystery of the coming of the Son of God as a human child into our world. The Christmas carols, the Crib, the presents, the popular Christmas songs, the wide range of decorations, the holly, the mistletoe: all these images transport us, adults into a child's world of wonder.

God became man. Why? Who must humans be if the Son of God took on our human nature? Who must we be if the Son of God gave up his life for us on a Cross? The Pope in his wonderful book, "Crossing the Threshold of Hope", devotes a whole chapter to reflection on this central question for mankind: "Who must we be?"

When the Germans were defeated in 1945, Poland - a staunchly Catholic country came under Communist rule. Christianity and Marxism faced up to each other in the battle for the minds of the young. Interest in man and his dignity became the principal theme of the debate. The Pope was then involved with young people who were asking questions, not so much about the existence of God but rather about how to live their lives, how to face and resolve problems of love and marriage and problems related to work. The young people's confusion in a confused country led the Pope to reflect on the importance of the human person. How should we treat a human being? How should a human being live his or her life?

The New Testament rather than the writings of Karl Marx was the key to answer these profound and most relevant questions. The human person is a being for whom the only suitable dimension is love. We treat people with full justice only when we love them. Love for others excludes the possibility of treating them as objects of pleasure. Not only that but on the positive side we must always affirm a person as a human person made by God in His own image. Human beings are the only creatures on earth that God wanted for their own sake. In other words, a person has value not because of wealth, or power or usefulness in some way but by the simple fact of being a person.

The Pope posed the question: "How does man affirm himself?" He affirms himself most completely by giving of himself. This is the fulfilment of the commandment of love. This is the full truth about man taught to us by Christ and lived out by so many saints ever since.

Christmas is the happiest time of the year because we are happiest when we give to others. Mothers are happy organising family celebrations; fathers are happy bringing home their Christmas bonuses, children are happy putting their savings together to buy their parents some little present, old people are happy as they write greeting cards and send gifts to the youngest additions to their extended families. Only by giving of ourselves do we understand why God loved us more than any other creature.


SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL say Sincere Thanks

THE ORIGIN OF 'SILENT NIGHT'

A holy night, a silent night, with Mother and child, all is calm, all is bright. This inspiring hymn came to us because an organ in Germany broke down about one hundred years ago. Without an organ the parish priest in a small country church said it would be a 'Silent Night'. The organist would compose a melody. The priest would write the lyrics and the choir would just sing the soft praises of this hymn for Midnight Mass. That is all it was meant to be, just a simple hymn sung once and forgotten. then a snowstorm prevented the man who fixed the organ from coming until the snow melted in the spring. After he finished he noticed the music left on the organ since Christmas night and took it back to Munich. the rest is history. "Silent Night" has reverberated throughout the ages. With its quiet sounds of love and peace it has inspired millions and millions, touching the lives of countless people.
