Christmas Customs from Various Countries and Cultures

Centuries ago Christians brought plants and flowers into the celebration of Christmas, for did not Christ come to uphold the dignity of all God's creation? The natural world, as well as humans, angels and animals, should have a part in welcoming him.

Evergreens, from ancient times symbols of life and eternity, have always had a prominent place in Christian celebrations. Holly, with its green leaves, its prickly points and red berries, suggested that the Child born in the manger would wear a crown of thorns and shed drops of blood. Mistletoe, long associated in the pre-Christian world with healing, became a symbol of the healing power of Christ.

The poinsettia, from Central America, with its bright, star-like flowers, is a natural reminder of the Star of Bethlehem. Other plants that bloom during this season are images also of the Root of David that flowered with new life.

The Christmas meal after midnight Mass, in which all the family participates, is traditional among the French. Among the Slavic peoples on Christmas eve, the father of the family breaks the feast-day wafers of bread and gives them to the members of his household, while wishing all the peace of Christmas.

From Ireland came the custom of placing lighted candles in the window during Christmastime. It originated in penal times when the Catholic religion was suppressed in Ireland and priests were forced into hiding. Irish families put a burning candle in their window and left their doors unlatched, hoping that a priest might come to their door and celebrate the Christmas Mass with them.

On the feast of the Epiphany, January 6th, in Spain and South America the celebration of the coming of the Three Kings is highlighted with colourful processions and giving of gifts, (rather like our Christmas presents on the 25th Dec).

The Christmas tree probably originated from popular early medieval religious plays, "the Paradise Plays," performed in churches and town squares of Europe during the Advent season. The plays told the story of the human race from the creation of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Paradise till the Birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. On stage during the play was a great tree hung with apples, symbolizing the Garden of Paradise. Soon people began the custom of putting a "paradise tree" laden with gifts and lighted with candles in their homes during the Christmas season to celebrate paradise regained through the coming of Christ.

Representing many things--the original tree of paradise, the life-giving tree of Christ's cross, the tree John the Apostle saw in the Book of Revelations, "a tree of life, which yields twelve crops of fruit, one for each month of the year...for the healing of the nations"--our Christmas tree is rich in Christian symbolism.

It was St. Francis of Assisi who first popularised the Christmas manger. Wanting to see how Christ was born with his own eyes, he had a stable and some images made before Christmas and then invited his neighbours and friends to come and join him at his "Bethlehem." And thus began the tradition of the Christmas Crib that we see in all churches and many homes at this time of year.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Mic 5:1-4

Jesus Christ is coming soon, as he once came to Bethlehem. His origin is ancient. His message is timeless. His truth is eternal. Jesus Christ is peace itself.

Second Reading: Heb 10:5-10

The coming of Christ brings about our sanctification. As Jesus came to do the will of God, we too have the same purpose in life. We offer our bodies as a spiritual sacrifice to God. In his will is our peace.

Gospel: Luke 1:39 - 44

Luke tells us much in this account of Mary's visit to Elizabeth. Mary went to Judah to visit her cousin, Elizabeth, who knew nothing of Mary's pregnancy before their encounter. Yet Elizabeth knew that there was something special about Mary and the baby she carried. This is made clear by her calling Mary the "mother of my Lord." The baby that Elizabeth carried leaped for joy at the sound of Mary's voice. This completes the prophecy of the angel that Elizabeth and Zechariah were expecting a baby and is symbolic of John's announcing Jesus' coming.

Window on Our Past

In keeping with the age-honoured tradition of the festive season this childhood memoir casts a backward glance to the rare auld times in the home parish of Ballincollig.

The era of the forties and fifties was a time when God-fearing parents herded their betimes reluctant offspring along the “via dolorosa” - up the square and under the archway - the well trodden path which also led to the Church of St. Mary and St. John, erected in 1866. Though not blessed with the religious fervour of our forebears, we dutifully trudged along for devotions, confessions, confraternity meetings, retreats and general missions. Even at home the inspiration of Rosary Crusader, Fr. Patrick Payton, conspired with mother’s perspiration to have us on our bended knees each evening for the recitation of the family rosary. In due course, altar service beckoned and having memorised the Latin responses under the guidance of popular curate, Fr. Timothy O’Mahony, we were duly assigned to the “hierarchy” of senior acolytes, John “Bull” Fitzpatrick, Tim Murphy, John O’Connor, ‘Spud’ Murphy and Paddy Joe O’Brien. “Don’t fret over Fr. Sexton - his bark is worse than his bite” confided church sacristan Polly O’Sullivan as she inspected the starched surplices and petrified demeanour of her latest troupe of novices. The awesome presence of his lordship the P.P. was enough to instil the fear of God and instantly call into question the true depth of our commitment to the noble calling!

Yet our place of honour on the altar steps did afford a grandstand view for the local highlights of the church year. Led by the venerable Nell Cody, West Village, the entire congregation was in splendid voice for the hymn-singing on Christmas morning with maestro Jane Callanan providing the accompaniment on the harmonium. One could sense the expectant mood of the faithful as they waited for that memorable moment when tenor Jerry Delaney rose from his lofty perch in the gallery to deliver his widely acclaimed rendering of Panis Angelicus. The Nativity Crib faithfully erected by Eric Down, a popular member of the farming fraternity, was, of course, an integral part of that Christmas scene. By far the post prestigious event of the church calendar was the biennial visit of Bishop Cohalan on Confirmation Day when the spirit of the Holy Ghost appeared to descent on every inhabitant of the parish.

To us it seemed to follow the natural order of things that the front pews should be reserved on such occasions for “the lords and ladies” of Ballincollig N.S. with the tiny contingent from neighbouring Ballinora bringing up the rear. But the inbred superiority of Ballincollig over Ballinora was ruefully shattered on the afternoon of Sunday, February 15, 1951, when the village and approaches to the church were gaily bedecked with flags and bunting for the eagerly-awaited homecoming of the newly-appointed Coadjutor Bishop of Cork - a boy from Ballinora no less - one Cornelius Lucey of Windsor, Waterfall. The elated visage of Fr. Sexton, more so than the colour and fuss which surrounded us bore graphic testimony to the parish’s moment of triumph.

On that historic day when the purple biretta came to town our chief dilemma as we were pressed forward to kiss the Episcopal ring was one of elementary theology. That God should enlist the humble services of a Ballinora boy to transform us all into strong and perfect Christians seriously undermined our faith in the divine wisdom of the Almighty!
