Who Among Us Can Throw The First Stone

In today's Gospel we once more see Jesus reaching out in compassion, healing and forgiveness. When He challenges the Scribes and Pharisees to 'let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her', they all left the place one by one recognising that they too were sinners. He offers the adulterous woman and her accusers an equal opportunity to repent and make a fresh start in their life.

We can picture the woman standing there in her vulnerability, waiting to hear the verdict, too fearful perhaps to even utter a word in her defence. She sees the curious and judgmental looks of those around her. When Jesus looks at the woman, He sees a fragile heart in need of love and acceptance. He doesn't tell her what she did was right, but neither does He condemns her - He says those simple but meaningful words that no doubt changed her life: 'you are forgiven, go and sin no more'. He is showing her that he understands the human heart and in offering her forgiveness, healing and compassion He liberates her from oppression. Life for her could never be the same again.

This is a lesson for all of us when we too may be tempted to be judgmental of the weaknesses and failings of others. We too are called to show respect for the dignity of the human person. The woman in today's story was seen as an outcast with little or no respect shown for her human dignity. How do I respect the dignity of those who may be labelled the outcasts of our society today? In our own lives many of us may have experienced hurt, humiliation, rejection, oppression. We are equally aware of moments in our lives when we experienced the compassion and loving forgiveness and acceptance of others. This Gospel story is an encouragement to all who have felt the sting of judgement and rejection in their weakness and frailty to encounter a loving God who does not stand in judgment over us. Whether we are powerful or weak, oppressors or oppressed, we are all equally in need of God's compassion, healing and liberation.

Jesus continues to offer each of us another chance to do things better or differently. We can be confident that whatever wrong we have done, no matter what it is, or what people think, Jesus reaches out with love and compassion offering us healing and forgiveness. Like the woman in today's story we too have a choice. God is willing to let the past be the past and that gives us the freedom to experience the fullness of life. As Jesus said: 'I have come that you may have life and have it to the full'

As we enter the last two weeks of Lent, let us throw away the stones and in opening our hearts to God's loving forgiveness and healing, we in turn can reach out in compassion and forgiveness to others.

The Garment of Suffering

The Garment of Suffering is done every Lent as there is a lot of pain and suffering in life, that's never given expression in the church. Anyone with any unresolved grief or pain, or any kind of hurt, would take a piece of cloth about six inches by six and place it in the basket at the front of the altar. All the elements are represented bereavement, break-up of a relationship, misunderstandings between parents and children, the pain of parents having to let their children go, especially when they didn't like the direction they were taking, the pain of addiction, the pain of being gay, of being homosexual, lesbian, and not being understood, not being able to talk about it, the pain from the past, the hurt the church itself had inflicted On the Tuesday of Holy Week a number of women come to the altar with their sewing machines, needles and thread, and sew them on a long roll of white cloth. On Good Friday it is brought forward by the women and draped over the cross and spread across the width of the church. It is left there, representing the pain and suffering of the people of the parish, and on the eve of Pentecost it is taken out and burned. Every day during Mass there are prayers of healing for those whose pain and grief is represented on the Garment of Suffering.

Please place your piece of cloth about six inches by six e.g. handkerchief in this basket, and every day during mass, there will be prayers of healing for those whose pain and grief is represented on the Garment of Suffering.

49th Cork Ballincollig Scout Group

Fire lighting has always been part of Scouting, when people think of Scouting they think of camping, sitting around a campfire singing and cooking sausages on an open fire. Scouts been able to fend for themselves and be independent and be able to cook without adult help. They have to be expert firelighters and fire tenders or so non-Scouters believe. To let non-Scouters into a secret that scouts all know, there are two basic kinds of fire: the smudge and the inferno. The smudge is what you use when you are desperately in need of heat. By hunching over the smudge the scout could usually manage to thaw ice from his hands before been blinded by the smoke. The inferno was what you always used for cooking. Experts on camp cooking claimed you were supposed to cook over something called "a bed of glowing embers". The bed of embers was a fiction concocted by experts on camp cooking. As a result, the camp cook was frequently pictured, by artists who should have known better, as a tranquil Scout hunkered down by a bed of glowing embers, turning plump trout in the frying pan with the blade of his knife .In reality, the camp cook is a wildly distraught scout who charged though waves of heat and speared savagely with a long sharp stick at a burning hunk of meat he had tossed on the pan from twenty feet away. Meat roasted over an inferno was either raw or extra well done. The cook, if he was lucky came out medium rare. To produce hot embers for your cooking fire, hardwood is best.

Getting to know your Trócaire Box

Many people have contacted Trocaire with messages of support following the banning of their Lenten ads on radio over the past weeks. The controversy over the banning has ended, and the ads have returned. The Broadcasting Commission agreed to allow the ads back on the air once the two words 'Lenten Campaign' were removed. Trocaire agreed to this compromise because it meant all elements of the Lenten campaign remained in place including fundraising and public awareness. The dropping of the ads for a week and the associated publicity may still have a damaging effect on fundraising for Trocaire and on Trocaire's work in the developing world. This year, please make a special effort to support the Lenten campaign here in the parish.
