TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Our relationship with God can fall flat, like any of our loves and friendships. It needs to be renewed, revitalised. In our Sunday celebration of Mass we have an opportunity to renew our faith in God, and to commit ourselves for one more week to following his way.

RE-DECORATION OF CHRIST OUR LIGHT BEGINS

Worshippers in the "New Church" will be slightly inconvenienced during the coming weeks as the interior re-decoration of the seventeen year old church goes ahead. Over almost twenty years the church has lost some of its original sparkle. The sanctuary carpet is discoloured and fraying, the carpet tiles in the aisles are showing their age, the main entrance door is jamming due to corrosion of the overhead hinges. In an age when everyone's home is regularly redecorated and upgraded it is indeed fitting to bring the house of God up to standard as well.

the main plan of the refurbishment is to introduce more colour and brightness into the building and make some small changes that will both enhance the daily use of the building and add solemnly to the bigger occasions such as weddings and baptisms. "Walking down the aisle" is the dream of many young people. It is difficult to realise that dream in a church where there is no main processional aisle. Now the opening of an interior double door immediately inside the main door will give access to a new aisle leading straight up to the altar. This new arrangement of the seating will also add solemnity to the funeral processions.

The altar is already the focal point of the church, which, of course, is correct for the celebration of Mass. Locating the tabernacle directly behind the altar will mean that the Blessed Sacrament will also share the focal point when people drop in to make a visit at any time during the day. A round and domed tabernacle has been acquired that will sit in a niche in the sanctuary background which will be painted a suitable colour. Colour will also be added by fitting stained glass in the band of windows between the brick walls and the ceiling.

The sacrament of Baptism is a family event of great importance that attracts a large attendance of the new baby's extended family. It is also a much photographed ceremony. The present location of the font at the side of a bank of seats takes from the solemnity of the sacrament. In the original drawings of the church the font was sketched in front of the existing tabernacle. It will now be placed on the floor to the right of the alter (looking up) leaving space for the baptismal party of parents and sponsors to stand around it. The paschal candle will stand on the sanctuary platform to the rear of the font.

It is hoped that the completed renovation will meet with the approval of all the parishioners.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

Monday 28th - St. Augustine 354-430. Bishop of Hippo, where he lived with a community until his death. His theological influence has been most significant in the Church, especially on the understanding of God's grace. Patron of theologians.

Wednesday 30th - St. Fiacre was an Irishman who went abroad to a hermitage near Breuil, where he remained until his death c. 670. He kept a good vegetable garden at his hermitage and is patron saint of gardeners

Thursday 31st - St. Aidan was of Irish descent and was a monk of Iona. When Oswald, the exiled king of Northumbria who had fled for refuge to Iona, returned to his throne in 634, he invited Aidan to come to reconvert his people. Aidan made his head-quarters at Lindisfarne. With the aid of the king as interpreter he was very successful in his mission. He died in 651.


