The Gift Of Living Water

The world of 'The Lord of the Rings' has become familiar to many people through the recent trilogy of blockbuster films. With spectacular special effects and computer wizardry mixed together with real actors, a world of Elves, Orcs & Dwarves comes to life before our eyes. The story has many strands but is focused upon the struggle between good and evil. This struggle takes place upon battlefields with vast armies but also in the hearts of the characters. One of the most intriguing characters is 'Treebeard', a tree herder. He is an ancient creature and very wise. Yet, when he encounters the small hobbits and hears their tales of struggles and bravery he says, "I am not altogether on anybody's side. Because nobody is altogether on my side." Each of us inhabit our own little universe and we can often feel that there is no one on our side. If it were true that no one else has our best interests at heart, then it would be good to be cautious, allowing fear and suspicion to keep us safe, thinking that loneliness is inevitable in our lives. But as Christians we know that this is not the way to be.

Often people can be wary of, or even frightened of God, "I am a sinner, unless I get my life sorted out I will be damned for all eternity." God can be seen as very strict or an avenger. When God is faced with the grumbling of Israel because of a watershortage, he responds to the needs of the people with a spring of life-giving water.

In our gospel passage this weekend we have the dramatic conversation between the Samaritan woman and Jesus at the well. This woman, an outcast, enters into a conversation with Jesus that leads to her life being transformed. As she listens to Jesus and opens her heart to Him she receives the living water of which He speaks.

During this time of Lent we may do some extra things to help us celebrate this the Lenten season well. Just as the woman at the well drank deeply from the teaching of Jesus so does His word become living water bubbling up inside us. The gift of the Holy Spirit granted to us in our baptism reassures us that God is very much with us and on our side.

As we journey through Lent let us pray that we will have the same enthusiasm for sharing the Good News. Let us realize that we are loved by God. Let us pray this Lenten time that we will be more aware of the Lord in our lives; that same Lord who gives us living water – the gift of the Holy Spirit.

May God, who has given us every good gift know us this Lenten time.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Exodus 17:3-7

The Israelites grumbled against Moses for leading them out of Egypt. They were thirsty, and there was no water in the desert, so Moses struck a rock with his staff, and water flowed out for the people to drink.

Second Reading: John 4:5-42

"The love of God has been poured out into our hearts," and that love is immeasurable; "While we were still sinners Christ died for us "

Gospel: John 4:5-42

Jesus approached a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well and asked her for a drink of water. This surprised the woman for several reasons. In the first place, it was unlikely that a man would ask a woman for anything and even more unbelievable that Jesus, a Jew, would ask something of a Samaritan, a great enemy of the Jewish people. Jesus explained to her that our thirst would return if we drank water from the well; but if we drank the water Jesus offered us, we would never thirst again. After Jesus told her many things about herself, she came to believe that he was the Son of God and called others to him.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Kieran 05-March-2005

Kieran of Saigir was born in Cape Clear, Co. Cork. He is numbered among the pre-Patrician saints of Ireland. He went to the Continent, where he was baptised and later ordained priest and bishop. He returned to his father's territory, Ossory, and seems to have lived as a hermit. Disciples soon joined him and Saigir became a well-known monastery.

He was attracted to learning at an early age. An apt pupil, he studied with his friend, Columba, under the great Irish scholar, Finnian. Among their many tasks, was the copying of the Gospels and other books from the Bible. In those days, there was no printing, nor books to be found in the homes of "ordinary people". The word of God was passed on mainly through song and story and there were few who could read the written word. The sacred books were transcribed by pen on parchment and the scholars slowly copied each word, as they spent their daylight hours by the window, laboriously forming every letter. One day, the time came for Kieran to bid farewell to his teachers and friends and go off alone. He chose to live in a cell in a lovely spot surrounded by trees, with a fresh spring nearby. For some time he lived as a hermit, praying and learning from God alone. Soon news of his wisdom spread and disciples gathered around him to learn and to study.

A collection of huts, which became a monastery and later the town of Saigir was established. He became one of the first twelve Bishops of Ireland, consecrated by St. Patrick and honoured as the first Irish born saint.


