The Power of the Word of God

When Jesus proclaimed the Word of God everybody listened and they "were amazed at the words that came from his mouth." All of us who are baptized. who share in the Eucharistic banquet and claim membership in the discipleship of Jesus Christ have heard and shared in the power of the Word of God. Like the stories we share about ourselves every day that communicate who we are, the proclamation of the Word tells us who we are, anchoring our identity as the people of God. We embrace the Word and let it change us, forming us into more perfect images of God for the sake of our world. Made present to us in the proclamation of the Word, Christ animates our conversations, encourages our hearts, strengthens our minds, and sends us to be ministers of the Word in the world.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal calls readers / lectors to help all of us "develop a warm and lively love for sacred scripture from listening to the reading of sacred texts." These are powerful words and profound challenges for us all. How can we become better listeners of the Word?

Buy a missal containing the Sunday readings, or just log on to http://www. usecb.org/nab/ where you will find the text of all the readings for any Sunday of the year. Some people like to prepare for Mass by reading the assigned passages. But it is also crucial to remember that Sunday begins and forms us for the week ahead, so look at the readings throughout your week, allowing them to form your disposition. Incorporate them into weekly and daily routines.

If you come to Mass with loved ones, talk about the readings on the way home or at a meal that follows. This is especially helpful with children. This doesn't have to be formal or forced, just look for ways to make connections with what naturally comes up in conversation or the day's other activities. Remember that God can speak to us too, through those around us. The people of Nazareth found this particularly hard to grasp. Not just our ears, but our eyes too need to be open to experience God's Word.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

Jesus went to Nazareth and taught in the temple. At first the people were amazed at his knowledge but then it occurred to them, he was one of them--a carpenter in their own village! They became very angry with Jesus and planned to throw him bodily from a nearby mountain top. Jesus simply walked through them and left. Some scholars say that the crowd's reaction and Jesus escaping them to continue his teaching and preaching is a fore-shadowing of Jesus' death and resurrection and the mission of the Church to continue spreading the Good News.


