"Mammy, there's a man at the door!"

Unexpected visitors ("cold calling") will most certainly arrive at your door in the coming weeks, with an election around the corner. The cry of "Mammy, there's a man at the door" will be heard in many households. This type of visit is mercifully brief. Following acceptance of election literature, and promises to remember the candidate on polling day, you can give a sigh of relief and return to your couch undisturbed for the rest of the night.

Do you like unexpected visitors fracturing your routine or plans for the evening? If you have spent an exhausting day at work, collecting the children, cooking dinner, taking care of laundry and other household chores, returning missed calls; all you want to do is relax in front of the telly. And perhaps, sip a glass of merlot to help you unwind? This is not a good time for an unexpected visitor to drop by. With people's busy lives today, most visitors to our homes come by arrangement or invitation, so that we can have friends around when we are free to entertain and be sociable. An unexpected visitor thwarts our busy routines and tight schedules. Someone that might normally be very welcome, but who arrives unannounced at an awkward moment can leave us frustrated and make us less than receptive, even to the point of being perceived as unfriendly.

Growing up in the country years ago it was a case of the back door never being locked (strangely the front door used to be locked though!) and neighbours dropping in casually at any time. It was as if they were part of the extended countryside neighbourly family. Stopping to chat passed away the night around the fireside, in pre TV/cable/satellite/DVD/ wireless internet/home cinema days. However times have changed and in the countryside back doors now tend to be locked too, and people are as likely not to know some of their neighbours, as they are in an urban area like Ballincollig.

What about the priest dropping by to visit? Would he be welcomed with open arms, TV turned off, and all the family gathered to hear his every wise and spiritual utterance? Or perhaps he would be an intrusion into the tranquillity of the evening wind-down? In the past systematic visitation of homes was a routine in some parishes (though my only recollection of a priest visiting my family home was when my grandparents died). Visitation might have had the honourable goal of getting to know parishioners, but to be honest it was often seen as a veiled attempt to collect "Dues" (I still find it that a peculiar term, used to describe donations for the upkeep of the clergy).

However, "Dues" envelopes are now mailed to those identified as past contributors, accompanied with a letter of gratitude, in the interests of accountability. (Please know that your contribution is welcome anytime and your name can be added to the parish database, identifying you as a contributor)

"Cold calling" is something I don't feel comfortable with. I feel uneasy about intruding on people's lives, uninvited. For the age we live in, I believe in a model of ministry based on an appointment system. It is an efficient arrangement that works, and accommodates the needs of busy people. It is a model I would be pleased to maintain.

I also appreciate that visiting a home when there is a family member ill or dying is always welcomed and can offer real support and comfort at a stressful time. (The homes of the housebound are visited monthly on first Fridays). Following a funeral, I might make an informal visit to the bereaved. Sacramental moments involve a lot of interaction with people, often including a home visit i.e. before a wedding. I have often been invited to bless homes and I have happily accepted invites to BBQ's, coffee mornings and other family occasions! If you should like to meet with me, on any issue, please know that you will be welcome. Just ring to set up a time.
