Ash Wednesday

An ancient Ash Wednesday custom was the making of a Jack O'Lent. This figure was made of straw and was dressed up in old clothes. It was supposed to represent Judas, the Disciple who betrayed the Lord with a kiss. This figure was carried through the streets on Ash Wednesday and then set up in order that people might throw stones and sticks at it during the season of Lent. At the end of Lent, Jack O'Lent was publicly burnt.

Charles Causley, a Christian, poet puts his own interpretation on Jack O'Lent.

"What will you have from him, Jack O'Lent, before you thirty of silver is spent? I'll have some fish and I'll have some bread. And some words to cure the pain in my head.

How long will it take you, Jack O'Lent your legs all crooked, your body all spent? With the help of prayer and the help of praise it'll take me forty nights and days."

Ashes are our sign of Ash Wednesday and are distributed on that day. They remind us of ancient forms of penance and also that the human glamour of this life will soon come to an end when God will call us to Himself for judgement.

As Catholics we are obliged to fast and abstain on this day and to continue with this effort during the Lenten Season.

Even in Old Testament times the Prophet Isaiah advocates fasting as a penance as long as it is undertaken with the right frame of mind and the proper spirit. Isaiah goes further and advocates a positive type of offering.

So as we offer our sacrifices and penances to God during this Lenten period let us also give more of ourselves to our fellow men and women, sharing with all those who are in need.

Archbishop Fulton Sheen speaking many years ago on Ash Wednesday said,

"Self discipline never means giving up anything. For giving up is a loss. Our Lord did not ask us to give up the things of the earth, but to exchange them for better things."

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Deuteronomy 26:4-10 The Israelite people gather during the Feast of Unleavened Bread to offer the first fruits of their harvest and retell the story of their salvation.

Second Reading: Romans 10:8-13

Paul sends this letter to the people of Rome to remind them of the simple formula for salvation; belief and confession. He promises that all those who call on the Lord will be saved.

Gospel: Luke 4:1-13

Each year, at the beginning of Lent, we hear the story of the devil tempting Jesus in the desert. This year we hear Luke's version. Following his baptism, Jesus went out into the desert for forty days during which time he ate nothing. Knowing that Jesus would be hungry, the devil tempted him to turn a stone into bread. When Jesus did not, the devil showed him all the kingdoms of the earth, promising Jesus all the glory and power of them if Jesus would worship the devil. Again Jesus refused. Finally, Satan took Jesus to the top of the temple in Jerusalem and told him to jump because God's angels would save him. Jesus refused each of the three temptations by quoting scripture from the book of Deuteronomy thus making clear his obedience to God.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Kieran 05-March-2004

Kieran of Saigir was born in Cape Clear, Co. Cork. He is numbered among the pre-Patrician saints of Ireland. He went to the Continent, where he was baptised and later ordained priest and bishop. He returned to his father's territory, Ossory, and seems to have lived as a hermit. Disciples soon joined him and Saigir became a well-known monastery.

He was attracted to learning at an early age. An apt pupil, he studied with his friend, Columba, under the great Irish scholar, Finnian. Among their many tasks, was the copying of the Gospels and other books from the Bible. In those days, there was no printing, nor books to be found in the homes of "ordinary people". The word of God was passed on mainly through song and story and there were few who could read the written word. The sacred books were transcribed by pen on parchment and the scholars slowly copied each word, as they spent their daylight hours by the window, laboriously forming every letter. One day, the time came for Kieran to bid farewell to his teachers and friends and go off alone. He chose to live in a cell in a lovely spot surrounded by trees, with a fresh spring nearby. For some time he lived as a hermit, praying and learning from God alone. Soon news of his wisdom spread and disciples gathered around him to learn and to study.

A collection of huts, which became a monastery and later the town of Saigir was established. He became one of the first twelve Bishops of Ireland, consecrated by St. Patrick and honoured as the first Irish born saint.


