THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Malachi 3: 1-4

God's people were complaining that their oppressors were prospering while they were left to suffer. "If God is just", they asked. "Where is He?" God answers that he will come but that they are not fit to receive his coming. He will have to purify them like gold is purified in fire before they will be fit to serve the Lord.

Second Reading: Hebrews 2: 14-18

Christ did not come to help immortal angels but mortal men. As helper of mortals he had to resemble them in every possible way so as to become merciful by partnership in misery. Experience of suffering and of trial is the best school of compassion. Knowing pain and trial, Christ is a competent helper of those who are being tried.

Gospel: Luke 2: 22-40

As in the case of the birth of Jesus the narrative of Luke is marked with great simplicity. The precise prescriptions of the Law are followed. As the firstborn, Jesus is God's property, consecrated to God as in a sacrifice. Mary offers what was known as "the poor woman's sacrifice": two young pigeons. The future of the Child is foretold by the two old people, Simeon and Anna. Luke, in one brief le sentence, passes over the first twelve years of the life of Jesus: "he grew to maturity and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.

The Beatitudes Attitudes Necessary To Be God's People

The Beatitudes are the most powerful expression in the Gospels of Christ's love for the poor in spirit. The poor, the hungry, the victimised and the persecuted are the privileged ones in His kingdom.

It is a big occasion: the crowds are still excited and over-awed after the healings, the twelve, newly-named Apostles are at Jesus' side. He is starting something, a new community for spreading the news of God's kingdom. These are the sort of people He is looking for, they have some unexpected qualifications:

Blessed are the poor in spirit – whether enduring poverty with good heart, or using their possessions in good faith as God's stewardship for right living.

Blessed are the gentle – not the aggressive, but the good-spirited, good-natured, the patient, those who encourage.

Blessed are – not those who seek after their own pleasure alone – but those who mourn – for the sins and sorrows of all mankind and open their hearts to neighbours in trouble.

Blesses are the merciful – not the unforgiving or the bully – but the understanding, those who listen, who rebuke, but do not condemn, who give good example.

Blessed are the pure in heart – not the mean and the greedy, but the sincere, whose motives are unselfish, who are honest with themselves and others if they do wrong.

Blessed are the peace-makers – not merely the non-violent, but those who spread peace by their reasonableness, their control of passions, and their good sense.

Blessed are those who are persecuted – not those who deliberately set out for the glory of martyrdom as a bitter revenge – but in the cause of right, the genuine witnesses to conscience and truth. Jesus is telling them ... You may die forgotten in a prison or be ridiculed by those around you because you took an unpopular stand, but 'rejoice and be glad, your reward will be great in Heaven.'

If you believe in your heart that those words are addressed to you, just as much as they were addressed to that new community 2000 years ago, then you are truly part of that community that builds up the kingdom of God on earth.

St. Blaise

According to legend, St. Blaise was a physician at Sebaste, Armenia, before he became the Bishop of that See. Accounts of his life place his martyrdom in the year 316. At the time of the persecution, he was taken prisoner at the command of the Governor, Agricolaus. The hunters of the Governor found him in the wilderness in a cave to which he had retired. While in prison, he performed a wonderful cure on a boy who had a fishbone in his throat and who was in danger of choking to death. After suffering various forms of torture, St. Blaise was beheaded.

The veneration of the saint was brought into Western Europe at an early date and he became one of the most popular saints of the Middle Ages. On the day of his feast a special blessing is given: two candles are held in a crossed position beneath the throat of the recipient and a special prayer for protection against diseases of the throat is said.

Monday 3rd February is the feast of St Blaise. Throats will be blessed after mass in both churches and also at 7.00pm in the church of St. Mary & St. John.


