THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Isaiah 35:4-7

If you knew that the world was coming to an end, you would be grateful for some advance notice. The first Scripture reading today gives you that notice: you must read the signs of the times.

Second Reading: James 2:1-5

God commands us to treat all people fairly, the poor as well as the rich. In your Church, there must be no favouritism.

Gospel: Mark 7:31-37

" I was dumbfounded" not too long ago this expression was used to describe a sense of shock on experiencing a tragedy or a human disaster i.e. tragic death; horrific car accident or living hell an individual // family is forced to endure daily. This weekend Mark's Gospel is an account of Jesus meeting a deaf man with a speech impediment; Jesus touched his tongue and said' Ephpatha' that is ' be opened' Isaiah reads' Courage! Do not be afraid. Look your God is coming, -- for water gushes in the desert. '

We remember today children and adults who live in a world with deafness; blindness or speech impairment. May the Lord bless the work of families and the skill of language specialists and carers who work tirelessly to open our world to so many?

How many people live in their homes as a married couple or with a partner and I or a family who do not understand each other or care for each other; where people no longer speak to one another. Today's readings urges us to become more aware of the others precious qualities, their uniqueness and accept one another's weaknesses.

O God you have hidden yourself in every blade of grass, every towering mountain and in each of us - give us eyes to see you, ears to hear you and tongues to speak to you each day.
