TENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Practicing our religion every Sunday can become superficial and can also lead to complacency. The antidote to this false religion is God's mercy - firstly the fact that we need it, secondly that we must offer it to others.

RECEIVING HOLY COMMUNION

Frequent reception of Holy Communion is one of the greatest innovations in the modern Church. Time was when Catholics received only once a month, or even once a year in some cases. The rules of the Church at that time did not encourage frequent reception of the Blessed Sacrament. There was, for instance, a very strict rule which demanded that one had to be fasting from food and water from midnight. Gradually such rules were modified to encourage frequent reception of Holy Communion.

Because Holy Communion is such a sacred thing - the Body and Blood of the Lord - there are still some Church regulations governing its reception. This article attempts to highlight the existing rules relating to receiving Holy Communion.

Priests are often asked by older people about the Eucharistic Fast. It is now little more than a nominal fast. First of all there is no fast at all for "the elderly and those who are suffering from some illness and those who care for them". Some of us may not be too flattered when we read in the Canon Law that "the elderly" are those "who have entered their sixtieth year". So there are three groups who are not bound by the Fast at all: the sick, the elderly, those who care for them.

The Church's concern for those who are sick in any way is also shown by the fact that the Eucharistic Fast never prohibits the taking of medicine or drinking of water.

In any case the Fast only asks us to abstain from food and drink for one hour before the actual time of receiving Holy Communion. On Sundays Communion is usually received about 20 minutes after Mass has begun; so the Fast for the 10.00 a.m. Mass, for instance, only begins at 9.20.

What about receiving a second time in the day?

The new Code of Canon Law states: "One who has received the blessed Eucharist may receive it again on the same day within a eucharistic celebration in which that person participates." This is a change from the old rules which allowed reception only once a day.

These Church laws are there to guarantee outward respect for the Blessed Sacrament. Much more important are our inner dispositions as we approach the Altar. Before so great a sacrament we can only echo the words of the Centurion: "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul will be healed." St John Chrysostom composed this prayer before Communion:

"O Son of God, bring me into communion today with your mystical supper. I shall not kiss you with Judas' kiss. But like the good thief I cry: Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

who are they?

Since we began our work in 1977, Cura have been a lifeline to many in Ireland facing a pregnancy, - a pregnancy they wanted or needed to keep to themselves. We see our role as reaching out to any woman who finds herself in this situation. We do this regardless of their religious, social or marital status. Our services are also free of charge.

Women come to us of their own free will and we respect that. We always listen with sympathy and understanding, no matter what is told to us we never judge any person. Nobody is pressurised into doing anything. That is not our role.

CURA, Latin for care, is an Irish organisation. The name is intended to express the purpose of its aim. i.e. to provide care for the mother and her unborn child.

Cura's primary objective is to ensure that every woman who is unhappily pregnant has immediate and easy access to the help which she needs. This help is provided during pregnancy, the birth of her baby and following birth.

The first response Cura offers is to listen. We often find that the hardest thing for a woman who is unhappily pregnant is telling anybody about it. This takes a lot of courage and there can be a lot of pain and hurt. But knowing there is someone to listen - not to judge can be of enormous help, especially in the early stages.

Practical help goes hand in hand with emotional support. Free pregnancy testing is offered. If the result is positive, the woman involved can be extremely distressed. She may wish her life would "return to normal" - the way it was weeks ago - and possibly can't see any future for herself.

As she comes to terms with her pregnancy, help will be needed with doctors appointments, hospital visits and possibly social welfare information. And her counsellor will support her through labour and the birth of her baby, if she wishes. This friendship is often invaluable.

Cura treats everyone involved with the highest levels of confidentiality, trust and respect. We do not judge or give advice. We don't call the shots. We listen unconditionally. We offer opinions. Any decisions are informed decisions - made by the woman herself.

Most of us would agree that the best support for a young woman is that of her own family and community. However as we in Cura have found, this ideal is not always possible. If a woman cannot or does not wish to stay at home, she can opt to stay with a host family or in shared accommodation where a Cura counsellor will be available and stay in touch.

Pregnancy by its very nature is not confined to the woman who is pregnant; others are also affected by it, her

boyfriend/husband and their families and friends. Counselling, if needed is available to all.

The ethos of Cura is clear from the organisation's philosophy which says:

"Cura upholds the right of every child to be born and to receive from society its consequent human rights. Therefore, Cura cannot regard abortion as an acceptable option nor can it find itself able to assist in any arrangements to facilitate abortion. At the same time Cura recognises that some will make choices and take decisions at variance with its own philosophy. Nevertheless it will seek to assist compassionately those who are experiencing the trauma of abortion and others affected by their problem".

When the subject of unexpected or crisis pregnancy arises, some people think only of abortion, and the controversy surrounding this. Perhaps this is not surprising in view of all the debates which have been going on in recent years. However we in Cura believe in looking at the wider picture, and in looking at the real life situations of expectant mothers who find themselves in a difficult and unhappy pregnancy.

When women approach Cura they are sometimes full of fear, anxiety and even panic. They see abortion as the only way out. We uphold the right of every baby to be born. Cura sees every human life as the wonderful creation of God and would wish to see each new life loved and nurtured.

The help that Cura offers is never conditional on people accepting our services. Sometimes our support is not accepted, we recognise that some will make decisions at variance with our philosophy. But powerless as we feel in such circumstances, our support for the woman does not end. We will respect the woman's decision, we will always be there for her should she feel the need for support and counselling at any stage.

We will always seek to assist with compassion anyone experiencing the trauma of abortion as well as others affected by it. Since its beginning as a telephone counselling service, Cura has expanded to include over 350 people who volunteer their time to provide this service. A school awareness programme has been incorporated, where counsellors visit schools at their request and meet with students and teachers.

The people who are Cura, volunteer their time because they believe in and are committed to what they do. They come from all walks of life, many with families of their own, some work full time in the home, others in employment outside the home. The majority are women, but men are welcome to volunteer also. All who counsel with Cura receive training to a high standard to ensure they deliver the best possible service. This training is on going and given by professionals in this field.

Cura received more than 9,000 phone calls last year and more than 4,000 personal callers visited the 15 centres Cura have in Northern Ireland and the Republic.



Short History

THE CHURCH OF ST. MARY AND ST. JOHN, BALLINCOLLIG, CO. CORK

Prior to 1808, Catholic families living in the Ballincollig area had to travel to Clash Cross in Carriganarra, Ballinora or Kilnaglory to attend Mass. With the advent of the Powder mills, and the employment they created, the population increased to such an extent that it became obvious a church was required in Ballincollig. A chapel was erected in 1808 and this served as the parish church, thus replacing the one in Ballinora. It served the community until 1866, when the church of St. Mary and St. John was completed. The chapel was then used as a school and is still in use, having been integrated into the Community Hall complex.

In 1865, it was decided to build a larger church, which would not only be more commodious, architecturally more attractive, and, above all, one which would serve the parish for very many years to come. We should be ever grateful to Canon David Horgan for his foresight. He appointed a Mr. George Goldie, a renowned architect, who had designed many churches, both in England and Ireland. His design was in the neo-Gothic style, which was typical of the period. He also incorporated features from other periods and that is why our church is so unique. A site for the church was donated by a Thomas Wise, who also provided the free use of a quarry in Coolroe, from which all the ashlar limestone was taken for making the blocks etc. required for the building.

The builder was a Mr. Barry McMullen of Cork and the church is a testimony to the craftsmanship of the tradesmen of that time. The stained glass windows came from Newcastle in England and the names of Canon Horgan, the Architect, the Builder and others are inscribed there on. The main altar was provided by the men of the Powder mills, the Lady altar by the women of the parish and the Sacred Heart altar by the Murphy family.

It is hard to comprehend that the cost of the church and furnishings amounted to only €5,000 but, no doubt, that was a large sum of money in those days. We should be ever grateful to the parishioners of that era, most of whom must have had very sad memories of the great famine, for providing the finances necessary to erect that architectural gem so dear to us in Ballincollig - the Church of St. Mary and St. John.

- Chapel Lane small amounts of litter and cigarette ends in places particularly at rear door of Darby Arms. Also litter under wheelie bins and barrels beside Darby Arms.
- The Square Excellent.
- Westside Retail Park litter in Trolley Bay, Aldi. Litter among shrubs in places. Some litter bins overfull with crows pulling litter from same.
- Station R d. W eeds outside T he Fry, otherwise good. Baker St. occasional pieces of litter. Build-up of litter beside galvanised sheds at Commercial Park.
- Main St. (from West Park Hotel to Statoil Service Station):- litter in places under trees near benches near sign for Gunpowder Mills.
- Litter among shrubs at Shell Garage.
- Occasional pieces of litter and cigarette ends in places. Cigarette ends tending to gather at bases of some trees.
- Weeds and some litter inside wall outside old X tra-Vision premises next to Statoil. Main St. (Statoil to Western Roundabout) - occasional pieces of litter and cigarette ends but overall, very good.
- Some weeds at bases of two houses opposite Westcliffe.

In general M ain St. was very good with no accumulations of litter. But, T ime Square and in particular Westside R etail Park needs attention.

Area 4

- L & N Shopping Centre: some litter at bench at entrance, some litter in places particularly along wall near Bottle Bank.
- Parknamore: entrance very good but kerbside weeds a problem in estate itself.
- Citi-West Mews: occasional kerbside weeds.
- Area from L & N Shopping Centre to Coolroe: Some litter on green area inside wall of Maxol Station. Litter in Gateway beyond same, but path and verge very good.
- Avonvourt: Excellent. Tiny amount of weeds near entrance.
- Coolroe H eights: Excellent. Two pieces of litter on green area.
- The Avenue:- lot of weeds and some litter in car parking areas.
