The Advent Wreath

Happy New Year! No, I am not jumping the gun; Advent is the start of the Church year. It is the season of waiting, watching, preparation, of being ready to welcome the Saviour. It is a 4 week period that is in danger of being engulfed by the Christmas spirit, which in the commercial world has long ago spilled over into Advent and well beyond. (My first sighting of Christmas merchandise in the shops was in early October). The Advent wreath is an increasingly popular symbol of the beginning of the Church year in many churches as well as homes. It is a circular evergreen wreath with five candles, four around the wreath and one in the centre. The circle of the wreath reminds us of God Himself, His eternity and endless mercy, which has no beginning or end. The green of the wreath speaks of the hope that we have in God, the hope of newness, of renewal, of eternal life. Candles symbolise the light of God coming into the world through the birth of His son. The four outer candles represent the period of waiting during the four Sundays of Advent, which themselves symbolize the four centuries of waiting between the prophet Malachi and the birth of Christ.

There are usually three purple candles, corresponding to the sanctuary colours of Advent, and one pink or rose candle. One of the purple candles is lighted the first Sunday of Advent. On subsequent Sundays, previous candles are re-lighted with an additional one lighted. The pink candle is usually lighted on the third Sunday of Advent, symbolizing the joy of Christmas which is almost here. The light of the candles itself becomes an important symbol of the season. The light reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world that comes into the darkness of our lives to bring newness, life, and hope. It also reminds us that we are called to be a light to the world as we reflect the light of God's grace to others (Is 42:6). The progression in the lighting of the candles symbolizes the various aspects of our waiting experience. Finally, the light that has come into the world is plainly visible as the Christ candle is lighted at Christmas, and we rejoice over the fact that the promise of long ago has been realised.

Christmas Appeal - St. Vincent de Paul

In Ireland of 2006, we are now the second wealthiest nation in the world, with very strong economic growth, low unemployment, and more disposable income. Over the last 15 years, inequality of incomes has greatly increased in our state, to the point where 300,000 people live in consistent poverty. One cannot but wonder how many of those who scoff at the poverty data would themselves be happy to be unable occasionally to afford a substantial meal; to have to wear second-hand clothes, to be unable to afford a warm, waterproof coat; or to live without adequate heating at some stage during the winter - to name but four of the eight poverty criteria. More than 40% of the unemployed and a similar proportion of the ill and disabled live in consistent poverty. And so, horrifyingly, do 100,000 children under 16.

Last year, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul spent almost €3.4 million per month on basic necessities such as food, fuel and electricity, clothing and education bills and so on. We depend on you to give generously this Christmas to help those who are less fortunate. We thank you for your help in the past year and we wish you a peaceful Christmas.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Bar. 5:1-9

In this reading, the city Jerusalem is addressed directly. Jerusalem, the principal city of Israel, is a symbol for God's people. God now makes known how he will save his people, how he will bring them back from exile, how they will be united in peace and joy.

Second Reading: Phil. 1:3-6. 8-11

Advent is a time of fulfilment. God has begun a good work in us; he will carry that work through to completion.

Gospel: Luke 3:1-6

Luke was very thorough in placing the beginning of John the Baptist's ministry within a historical context. He set John's ministry in time by telling who the leaders were in the region. John's role was to prepare the way for Jesus and to proclaim a theme of repentance for those who would follow Jesus. Like a Roman corps of engineers filling in gullies and levelling mountains to make roads, John's job was to make the pathway smooth for those coming to Jesus.

Tax Rebates

Last week I wrote about the Tax rebate scheme available to charities that assures us there are several thousands of euros in the department of Finance waiting to be collected on annual basis? This scheme is not about asking people to increase their contributions to the offertory collection. This scheme is encouraging us as people of the parish to get our act together draw down this money in the department of Finance. Many parishes in dioceses throughout the country, including some in Cork, are already drawing down these funds. To draw down this money at the end of 2007, the parish will need to provide written evidence that individuals did contribute at least five euro a week or two hundred and fifty euro on an annual basis. I suggest that the more direct way to do this is to ask parishioners who are contributing or willing to contribute five euro a week to sign up to a direct debit (on a monthly basis) and contribute to the parish in this way.

Hopefully at least one hundred parishioners will contribute. Then on the first of January 2008 the parish will be able to claim at least $\[\in \]$ 6,200.00 So now it is over to you the generous people of the parish, please let one of the priests know of your interest and we can then put the paper work in place Money coming to the parish from this scheme will be devoted to helping the young people of the parish to deepen their faith. 


