FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The light of Christ's love has been given to each one of us but it will go out if we fail to use it. We are invited to share our food, our homes, our possessions with the needy so that through us they can see the light of God and give him thanks.

SEASON OF LENT

Consider how radical the teaching of Jesus is. Ponder how it goes against the grain. Meditate on how if we lived like this the world would be completely different. Reflect on how far short we often fall of this our vocation - to live a life in the power of the Holy Spirit. Examine how we can repent, change and move forward to embrace his teaching and apply it to our lives. On Wednesday next we will be entering into the season of Lent, which affords us a wonderful and God-given opportunity to examine our lives in the light of the demands of the Gospel. The point is, of course, that the gospel is demanding and challenging. To be a child of God is to live in a new way. To bear the likeness of our Heavenly Father is to be kind and merciful as he is kind and merciful. It can often seem almost impossible to think a charitable thought, let alone love those we find difficult to like and get along with. Have you ever been struck on the cheek and had the opportunity to offer the other one? Have you ever been cursed or sworn at and responded with a hearty and unprovocative 'God bless you'? Maybe not, but the notion of being struck raises in us a profound instinct to strike back - offering the other cheek seems a kind of bizarre pacifism - yet this is what Jesus is teaching. Jesus is also teaching that love which does not challenge our preferences, likes, dislikes, pettiness and discrimination carries little credit. Those we gravitate towards, whose company we enjoy and relax in and whose friendship we cherish and cultivate are God-given and we are to rejoice in them. Jesus, however, taught that it is not hard to be kind, charitable, forgiving, generous and tolerant with these people. The cutting edge of our love is how we reach out and respond to those who irritate us, who grate on our nerves, those who provoke and annoy us, those we find difficult, slow, inferior to us in some way, or those who don't like us, who speak ill of us and misunderstand us. It is tempting to despair and say, "This teaching of Jesus is too hard, it's impossible, who can possibly live like this, it's too demanding!" It is as we understand our inability to love our enemies, our own powerlessness in the face of our sometimes powerful passions, that we can turn humbly to God asking for his grace and power.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

11th Monday - St. Gobnait is one of the best loved saints in West Cork but only traditions concerning her life survive. The main part of her life was spent in Ballyvourney, Co. Cork, where there has always been a deep devotion to her, and which is a place of pilgrimage on this day. Her gifts of caring for and of curing the sick have been a significant part of her cult through the centuries. Happily her memorial is on World Day of the Sick.

14th Thursday- Cyril, a priest with missionary experience, and his brother **Methodius**, a monk, went to Moravia to preach the gospel in the Slav language. Cyril invented a Slavic alphabet and with the help of Methodius, translated the Gospels and certain liturgical works into Slavonic. They were consecrated bishops in Rome but there on February 14, 869, Cyril died. Methodius returned to Moravia. During the last four years of his life, he completed the Slavonic translation of the Bible. On April 6, 885, he died, worn out by his apostolic labours and by the opposition of those who failed to understand his methods. Pope John Paul II declared them Patrons of Europe.

CHRISTIAN FASTING

The Christian tradition of Lent as the "Great Fast" is a very ancient and universally respected one, with clear warrant in the Bible. In the present discipline of the Catholic Church the regulations prescribe that Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are to be observed as days of fast and abstinence. Fasting means that the amount of food we eat is considerably reduced. Abstinence means that we give up a particular kind of food or drink or form of amusement. Those over eighteen are bound by the law of fasting until the beginning of their sixtieth year, while all over fourteen are bound by the law of abstinence. There are many motives for fasting: To praise God by recognising that the good things we abstain from are gifts from God; to train ourselves in self-denial for times of temptation to sin; to do penance, fasting in atonement for sin to prepare for a feast - to heighten the enjoyment. So Lent prepares for Easter. To make an act of communion with those who live in want, fasting in solidarity with them, and then contributing to the needy. Other penitential exercises include: giving alms; abstinence from some foods or other pleasures; carrying out the duties of state; meditative reading of the scriptures or other religious books and magazines; controlling our desires for possessions that are newer, bigger, better and more automatic: controlling our desire for entertainment by TV and radio, films and spectator sport.

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St. Valentine

Valentine's Day is celebrated in honour of Saint Valentine, a Christian priest who was executed on February 14th, 270 A.D., by the Roman Emperor Claudius II. Though there is nothing romantic about his death, legend has it that Valentine was quite a romantic soul while he was alive.

Apparently Claudius II was concerned about the declining number of soldiers in the Roman Army. The soldiers were refusing to leave their wives and sweethearts, so Claudius thought he could solve the problem by outlawing marriage. But as the saying goes, love will find a way. Young lovers found their way to Valentine, who took pity on their predicament and performed marriages for them in secret. When Claudius found out, he had Valentine beheaded.

Another legend says that Valentine was imprisoned for performing these secret marriages, and that while he was serving his time, he fell madly in love with the jailer's daughter. He would send her love notes inscribed with the words "From your Valentine" - a tradition we still carry on today.

St. Valentine's Day has its roots in an old Roman festival called the Lupercalia, which was held each year on February 15. The festival involved a lover's lottery, where girls' names were written on slips of paper and put into a jar. Each young man would draw a name and that girl would then be his companion for the following year. The Christians found this custom immoral, so they created their own February festival in honour of the romantic St. Valentine, who helped love last a lifetime by sanctifying it with the sacred bond of marriage.
