FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

The Parable of the Prodigal shows us the power of the Father's forgiving love. The elder brother thinks of himself, and is begrudging. How often do we begrudge God's goodness to others? How many of us seek to use our good works as a means of monopolising God's love for ourselves.

THE REAL PRESENCE

The recently discussed question of inter-Church Communion has focused attention on a fundamental question of our Faith; the real presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Eucharist.

The Council of Trent taught that, after the consecration, the Body and Blood, together with the Soul, and Divinity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, are contained "truly, really, and substantially in the sacrament of the most Holy Eucharist". The words "This is my body" are not a mere figure of speech, as Zwinglians contended. Neither does His presence depend on the faith of the recipient, as Calvin claimed.

The Real Presence was taught by our Lord Himself in Capharnaum (Jn, vi). "The bread that I will give is my flesh....He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life". The future tense (the bread which I will give) shows that the gift was not yet given. This could only refer to the Eucharist which he would give at the Last Supper, a year later. An argument for the Catholic interpretation is supplied by the way Christ's words were received. The Jews exclaimed "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Our Lord, instead of explaining that He only meant to say that He was speaking of His teachings and not His flesh, repeated his assertion: "My flesh is truly food and my blood is truly drink".

Even when many of the people were shocked at His mysterious promise and did not believe, Christ still did not soften down or explain His words. As a result many of Christ's disciples went back and walked no more with Him. Then He turned to His twelve closest followers and asked them if they also would go away. They did not.

At the Last Supper, Our Lord made good His promise giving us the Eucharist with these words: "This is my Body.......This is my Blood.......Do this in commemoration of me".

When the Council of Trent in the 1540's spoke of the Real Presence it was not introducing some new teaching but rather repeating what the earliest Christian writers had already taught. In 166 A.D. St. Justin wrote: "We believe that the elements of the Eucharist are the flesh and blood of that Jesus who was made flesh". St. Irenaeus wrote around the year 300 A.D.: "Jesus said the chalice was his proper blood and the bread was his proper body". St. Cyril, who died in 386 A.D., wrote: "Since He has declared and said of the bread, 'This is my body', who after will venture to doubt?"

Perhaps it is appropriate to end with the words of Peter when asked if the Apostles would also walk away: "Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal Life".

FOURTH WEEK OF LENT

10 Sunday 1 Sam. 16:6-7. 10-13. Eph. 5:8-14. Ps. 22. Jn. 9:1-41. Lect 1:276 The experience of the blind man helps our understanding of baptism. "You went, you washed, you came to the altar, you began to see what you had not seen before. In short, your eyes were opened in the fountain of the Lord and by the preaching of the Lord's Passion. You seemed previously to be blind of heart: now you began to see the light." So spoke St Ambrose to the recently baptised, recalling that experience to them.

11 Monday Is. 65:17-21. Ps. 29. Jn. 4:43-54. Lect 1: 290
The echoes of an ancient, shorter Lent are still found in the semi-continuous reading of St John's Gospel, beginning today. The hope expressed in Jesus' words, "Your son will live" is the desire of all who are coming from sin to forgiveness, from death to new life in the sacraments of Baptism and Reconciliation.

12 Tuesday Ez. **47:1-9. 12. Ps. 45. Jn. 5:1-3. 5-16.** *Lect I:* 292 The water of baptism gives great joy to the Church. By this water we ore healed and saved.

13 Wednesday Is. 49:8-15. Ps. 144. Jn. 5:17-30. Lect I: 294
Pride and joy in belonging to the Church should be part of our inheritance. Frequently we need to recall our Christian dignity.

14 Thursday Ex. **32:7-14.** Ps. **105.** Jn. **5:31-47.** Lect *I*: 297
Jesus puts before his listeners the remembrance of Moses pleading for his people. The repeated failure of God's people to live up to the covenant serves as a warning for all generations. We also must call on God to give us the grace to turn back again.

15 Friday Wis. 2:1,12-22. Ps. 33. Jn. 7:1 -2. 10. 25-30. *Lect I:* 300 The sacrifice of Jesus for the sin of the world is in the plan of divine salvation. Every thing he does is directed to the "hour" when this will be accomplished. Suffering and distress, illness and tragedy, seem inexplicable within the plan of God. We believe, like Christ, that our heavenly Father is close to us.

16 Saturday Jer. 11:18-20. Ps. 7. Jn. 7:40-53. Lect 1: 303 Jesus is the Paschal Lamb. He bears the sins of the multitude as he allows himself to be led silently to the Cross. The whole life of Jesus is thus characterised as one in which his mission is "to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many". His disciples should be able to serve and give themselves.

11th St Aengus died 830, was a monk in Clonenagh, Co. Laois, who came to the Monastery of Tallaght. He composed two Martyrologies, thus showing his devotion to both foreign and native saints. He returned to Clonenagh, where he became both abbot and bishop.

I am always afraid Of losing the battle To the old enemy within; My own weaknesses and failures.



Re: Assessment of Need for Housing and other accommodation and of the number of Homeless Persons - Section 9 of the Housing Act 1988.

An Assessment of Housing Need is presently being undertaken by Cork County Council in the South Cork Area.

Those who have already applied to the Council for housing/other accommodation need not now re-apply unless their circumstances have changed since submitting the original application.

All persons seeking housing/other accommodation should apply to Housing Department, County Hall, Cork or to their local District Council Office where appropriate.

The submission of the names of persons in need of housing by Community Groups and Voluntary Bodies would be welcome.

HISTORY OF MOTHER'S DAY

The first celebrations in honour of mothers were held in the spring in ancient Greece. They paid tribute to Rhea, the Mother of the Gods. During the 17th century, England honoured mothers on "Mothering Sunday," celebrated on the fourth Sunday of Lent.

In the United States, Julia Ward Howe suggested the idea of Mother's Day in 1872. Howe, who wrote the words to the Battle Hymn of the Republic, saw Mother's Day as being dedicated to peace.

Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia is credited with bringing about the official observance of Mother's Day. Her campaign to establish such a holiday began as a remembrance of her mother, who died in 1905 and who had, in the late 19th century, tried to establish "Mother's Friendship Days" as a way to heal the scars of the Civil War.

Two years after her mother died, Jarvis held a ceremony in Grafton, West Virginia, to honour her. She was so moved by the proceedings that she began a massive campaign to adopt a formal holiday honouring mothers. In 1910, West Virginia became the first state to recognise Mother's Day. A year later, nearly every state officially marked the day.

But Jarvis' accomplishment soon turned bitter for her. Enraged by the commercialisation of the holiday, she filed a lawsuit to stop a 1923 Mother's Day festival and was even arrested for disturbing the peace at a war mothers' convention where women sold white carnations - Jarvis' symbol for mothers - to raise money. "This is not what I intended," Jarvis said. "I wanted it to be a day of sentiment, not profit!"

She died in 1948, at age 84.

Today, because and despite Jarvis' efforts, many celebrations of Mother's Day are held throughout the world.
