SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FORTY YEARS OF LITURGICAL RENEWAL

Forty years ago in 1963 the Second Vatican Council published a document on the Sacred Liturgy which affected the lives of every Catholic throughout the world. Many still remember what Mass was like before that year. All of the Mass was said in Latin. Even the Altar servers had to learn the responses in Latin and many men today can still recall the response "Ad deum qui laetificat juventutem meum". Lay people usually brought an English missal to Mass in order to follow the prayers. Even the Gospel was read in Latin. On Sundays the priest read it again in English for the people.

The eucharistic fast, i.e. the fast in preparation for receiving Holy Communion extended from midnight to the moment when one received the Sacred Host. A result of that was that no one received Holy Communion at the later Masses. There were no evening Masses. All weddings were celebrated early in the morning. Afternoon funerals were conducted without a Mass. These are only some examples of what Catholic life was like before the great reforms of Vatican II.

Looking back now we can appreciate how beneficial the changes in Liturgy were for Christian living. Take funerals alone as an example. Prior to 1963 afternoon funerals were preceded by a short prayer recited in Latin in the church mortuary or rear porch. There was no requiem Mass. Contrast that today with the packed church, the funeral Mass in which relatives and friends participate in the liturgy by doing the readings, reciting prayers of the Faithful, bring up gifts, singing hymns etc. The whole spirit of the occasion is captured by the priest in his homily and the Mass becomes a prayerful celebration of the life of the deceased.

Wedding Masses capture in a similar way the spirit of an occasion characterised by joy and hope and love. Other sacraments such as Baptism and Confirmation touch the hearts of participants in a memorable manner.

Time was when only four people attended a Baptism, when First Communion and Confirmation were little different from school functions. How different all that was from the vibrant celebrations that today mark these occasions. Baptisms are attended by twenty or thirty family members; First Communion Day is a festival for the whole extended family and attendance at Confirmation is so large that three or four days have to be set aside in this parish for Confirmations because the church would not hold the crowds if all schools had the Confirmation on the same day.

With the wisdom of hindsight we can see how the Holy Spirit works in the Church inspiring it to move with the times.



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THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING: Leviticus 13: 1-2, 44-46
The Hebrews always regarded leprosy as a contagious disease and perhaps as a punishment by God. This explains both the isolation of the diseased person and the necessity of ceremonial purification. In some societies AIDS is similarly regarded today.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 10: 31- 11:1

This is a cry for tolerance at a time when Christians who had come from the Jewish tradition tried to impose their customs on converts from paganism. The scrupulous are not entitled to impose their scruples on others. Tolerance and kindness must be mutual.

GOSPEL: Mark 1: 40-45

Lepers were compelled to lead an isolated life, wearing a special garb, and giving notice of their approach by crying out: "Unclean", in order to prevent contagion. Jesus cured the man but spoke sternly to him because he had violated the prudent regulations by coming into contact with others who might receive the contagion.

SAINT OF THE WEEK 21st - FEBRUARY - 03

ST. PETER DAMIEN

This saint lived in Italy in the eleventh century.It was a time of great problems in the Church because of the interference in the appointment of Popes, Cardinals and Bishops by lay people. Their motivation in interfering with appointments was greed for the income that went with such appointments in those days. High positions in the Church were openly bought and sold and many who held those positions were openly married. Peter Damien watched these disasters affect the Church from the monastery which he had entered as a young man. He published a terrible treatise on the vices of the clergy. It caused a great stir and much enmity against its author. In 1055 he attended the synod held at Florence where these abuses were strongly condemned. Against his will he was appointed a Cardinal-Bishop. Almost alor,e at the time, Damien stood up for true spiritual values in the Church, values that he lived by in his personal life.

With the start of a new season the local committee appeals for adult support in organising this years programme. People interested in getting involved should contact the Chairman Rick O'Mahony at 087-2358347.


