EASTER

The Orthodox Church has an interesting Easter custom. At the end of services on this Easter Sunday eggs are blessed and distributed to everyone in Church to show that all share in the blessings of this great feast. The members then greet one another and crack their eggs together. When one egg cracks, the owner cries: "Christ is risen!" The other person answers: "Truly He is risen!"

Cracking the egg represents the breaking open of the grave of Christ. The egg shows new life. Inside the egg is the material which will make a tiny, new chicken. That new life comes forth when the chick breaks out of the egg.

Christ's coming forth from the grave is something like that. Christ was really dead before He came to life again. The egg seems dead before it brings forth life. The egg reminds us of the tomb in which Jesus was buried. The chick breaking forth from the egg reminds us of Jesus breaking forth from the tomb.

We are happy at Easter because Jesus rose from the dead and because He promised that we will rise from the dead at some future date. But our happiness can be even greater when we realize that we can rise from the grave – TODAY. There are many kinds of tombs and many kinds of resurrections. Every one of us can rise from a tomb – TODAY, because every one of us can rise to a better and higher life – TODAY.

In today's Good News we read, "the stone was taken away." But God's power Christ's grave was opened. By God's power the stone that holds you and me buried can be taken away.

What are these stones that weigh us down? First, there is the stone of selfishness, being concerned only with our own good. The risen Christ will help us roll that stone away by becoming interested in doing what pleases God and what helps our neighbour.

There is the stone of greed, the stone of gluttony. How these weigh down both body and soul! The stone of indifference or lack of love keeps us from trying to please God, keeps us from trying to do good to our neighbour. On this glorious day of the resurrection when we re-live the story of God's love for us, we can break out of this indifference, this lukewarmness, with the strength of our risen Saviour.

What is the stone you would like to have taken away so that you can come forth with Christ, bright and powerful? Is it impurity, dishonesty, laziness, pride, anger, envy? With the help of Christ throw it off and Easter will be a much happier day for you.

The main reason for our joy today is that Jesus rose and that He promised we will rise. But there is special joy in each of the resurrections we talked about. May our heavenly Father "bring us – all of us – to the glory of the resurrection," as we will pray after Communion. The Blessed Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – are ready to share with us the happiness of having the stone rolled away. That is the kind of Happy Easter I wish to all of you.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING: Acts 10: 34, 37-43.

At a time when racism is one of the topics of discussion it is important to note the teaching of the Apostles. God chooses his elect no matter what their nationality. The whole tenor of St. Peter's speech shows that the Gentiles were included in the command of Jesus to preach to the whole world. Salvation is not a matter of race. Faith in Jesus is alone required.

SECOND READING: Colossians 3: 1-4.

At Baptism Christians have died a mystical death when they went down into the cleansing waters, but they died only to be raised to a new life in Christ. This is more understandable when speaking of adult baptism. The adult who accepts baptism into Christianity dies to his old pagan way of life and comes out of the water a new person. To live a new life means to think, to love, to act in a new way.

GOSPEL: John 20: 1-9

One of the proofs of the Resurrection is the fact of the empty tomb. First Mary Magdalen, then Peter and John discover that there is no body in the tomb. The details show that body snatchers had not been at work. They would have never carefully divested the body of its linen bands before taking it away. The bandages were not in a confused heap, but were lying on the ledge. And the napkin that had been over his head was lying apart and carefully rolled up. John perceived the truth at once.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

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Saint Mark 25-April-2003

Even though Mark is one of the four Evangelists very little is known for certain about his life.

His name crops up frequently in the Acts of the Apostles. He was the son of a lady named Mary to whose house Peter came when he escaped from prison. The house was a meeting place for the Christians. It is probable that with other members of the household he had been baptized by Peter. Mark was a cousin of Barnabas, the missionary companion of St. Paul. There is mention of Mark travelling with Paul and later we find him in Rome with Peter. When Paul wrote to Timothy from captivity in Rome he instructed him to bring Mark 'for he is useful to me for the ministry'.

In his Gospel Mark puts the teachings of St. Peter into writing. He wrote especially for non-Jews, those newly converted from paganism. Scholars agree that his Gospel was written for the early Christians in Rome.

On the 9th of November 2002 Mick O'Connell set out with the Dolphin Senior Team for a Charity Cup match in Clonakilty.

Spirits were high; as Dolphin had won their first two AIL games, their best start in years. Little did we know that a freak accident was about to happen and Mick would suffer serious spinal injuries that would change his life and that of his family forever?

Mick was taken to the Cork University Hospital where he was operated on that evening, but his condition deteriorated within a week, due to internal bleeding and pneumonia, which left him fighting for his life for the next two months.

He lost nearly 6 stone in weight during that time, thankfully by the 22^{nd} of January Mick's condition had improved significantly to allow him to be transferred to the National Rehabilitation Centre in Dun Laoghaire where intensive remedial treatment began and he is gradually putting on weight and getting stronger day by day.

There is nothing we can do in respect to Mick's injuries except for our prayers but we can help in removing the financial challenges to ensure that he can have a future where his long-term needs are catered for, whatever they may be.

A Sponsored 5K Run/Walk will take place on Sunday the 11th of May, 2003 where each participant will be asked to raise a minimum sponsorship of €100.00. There is of course no maximum to what you can collect or donate.
