Alpha

Ballincollig Parish plans to run an Alpha course after Easter. This is an opportunity to explore the meaning of life in an informal, fun and friendly environment. The course starts on Wednesday April 15th, and continues in Colaiste Choilm on each Wednesday evening from 7.30 pm to 9.30 pm for ten weeks. The Alpha course explores some of the basic truths of the Christian faith – "Who is Jesus?" "Why Did Jesus Die?" "How does God guide us" and "What about the Church?" During the programme there is an option of a day away to explore the work of the Holy Spirit. The course is Christ centred and scripturally based.

The course is relaxing, non-threatening, low key, friendly and fun. Participants meet weekly and listen to a talk lasting 40 minutes, followed by a tea/coffee break and participants then break into small groups to discuss the talk and questions arising from it. Alpha is for everyone; no question is out of bounds and you are free to discuss as much or as little as you wish. We don't assume any background knowledge of or belief in Christianity and everyone is welcome. You don't have to come to the whole course – just pop along for the first night and see what you think. No pressure!

Alpha has been run in this area by the Carrigrohane Union of Parishes (Church of Ireland) for many years. I remember attending my first Alpha course there in 1995, I went along with some reluctance, but found to my surprise that it was friendly and enjoyable, fun really. It explored the faith in a "non-Churchy" and thoroughly adult way. I subsequently helped to run courses and found the Alpha experience to be enriching in terms faith and friendship.

History of Mother's Day in Ireland

The history of celebrating Mothering Sunday or Mothers Day in Ireland can be traced to the medieval practice where children from poor families were send to work as domestic servants and apprentices to work with the rich. Once in the year in the middle of the Lent these children were given a day off to visit their 'Mother Church' and worship Virgin Mary. After visiting the Mother Church or Cathedral of their home town these children visited their mothers and presented them with flowers they picked along the way. Girls bake special Mothering Cake on the day. Pattern of living changed after the Industrial Revolution and Mothering Sunday celebration almost lapsed. The custom was revived after World War II. Americans too helped to bring back the charm of the festival in European countries as their tradition and way of celebrating Mothers Day spread far and wide.

TROCAIRE

In the Old Testament we hear many stories of exile. The Jewish people were very familiar with being forced to flee from their home. The exiles to Babylon and to Egypt are the most famous examples of this. They knew what it was to be without the comfort and security of being in their own home. Jesus too was familiar with the type of experience Khalid had. He was a refugee as a child in Egypt and all throughout his public ministry he was an itinerant preacher. Since 1962 Burma has been ruled by the army who have continued to attack religious and ethnic minorities, burning villages, arresting people and forcing thousands into forced labour. Almost 1 million people have been forced to leave their homes and more than 150,000 have fled to temporary refugee camps along the Thai/Burma border. THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 2 Chronicles 36: 14-16, 19-23 The Sacred Writer sees the misfortunes of God's people as a well deserved punishment for their infidelity and sins. The King of Babylon (present day Iraq) conquered them, burned the Temple and took them away to his country between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers where they languished for seventy years. God, however, did not abandon his people. He brought about their liberation when the Persians came to power (present day Iran) and liberated them.

Second Reading: Ephesians 2: 4-10

Just as God liberated and purified his people by sending the King of Persia to help them so he sent his only Son Jesus to liberate us from our sins. We did nothing to deserve this great gift. We are God's work of art.

Gospel: John 3: 14-21

Salvation not judgment is the direct purpose of the mission of the Son of God. Men make their own judgment by their attitude to him. He who believes incurs no damnation. The unbeliever is already in a state of damnation because he has established himself as an unbeliever in the mission of Jesus. The person who confesses and accuses his sins is already on the side of God.

Car Parks

Due to recent vandalism in car parks adjacent to the churches parishioners are reminded not to leave handbags or personal items in their cars. We ask people to be vigilant with a view to protecting other people's belongings.

Car Parking, Station Road & Environs

Cork County Council has engaged Consultants to develop a parking plan for Station Road, Church View & Tudor Grove. These plans were made public a few months ago at a meeting of invited guests. Basically the plan is to develop park and pay in the areas adjacent to St Mary & John's Church and Station Road. This system may change the parking patterns for the patrons of St Mary & St John Church. There is limited parking around the Church, in the play ground of Scoil Eoin and around the Parochial house.

Last year there were seventy two funerals and thirty seven weddings. Most take place on weekdays and people generally travel. I envisage that park and pay in areas around the Church will cause major difficulties for parishioners during morning mass, funerals and weddings.

I am aware that Cork County Council has made adjustments to their parking plans in other towns to take into account the parking of parishioners for daily mass, funerals and weddings. I think it would help if parishioners spoke to our local council representatives to highlight the issues raised by the proposed park and pay by Cork County Council. The importance of accommodating the parking needs of worshippers at St Mary & St John need to be emphasised to the Councillors and Council Officials.


