A CHILDREN'S EASTER MASS

Several years ago Fr. Sean O'Sullivan, who now works on the Cork & Ross Mission to Peru, initiated a special children's Mass on Christmas Eve. So successful was the experiment that the Children's Christmas Mass is established as one of the best attended celebrations of the year. This year Fr. Pat O'Donovan has come up with the idea of organising a special celebration for children on Holy Saturday night, or as it is also known the Easter Sunday Vigil Mass, in the church of Christ our Light at 8.00 p.m.

The Easter Vigil ceremonies of lighting the Paschal Fire and the Easter Candle will be adapted to suit the children. The Readings from the Old Testament will be presented as dramatic mime with the participation of the local children, the church choirs and the support of members of the Parish Council. For adults who prefer the traditional ceremonies of the Easter Vigil there will be the usual Holy Saturday celebration in the church of St. Mary and St. John at 9.00 p.m. A shorter Easter Mass will be celebrated in the same church at the usual hour of 6.00 p.m., the same as any Saturday evening.

There are some 2,000 children in the Primary schools in Ballincollig. Another 900 pre-school children were born in the last five years, many of whom are old enough to be brought to church at least for the great Feast days of the year. We hope that parents, grandparents and god-parents will make sure that their nearest and dearest will have the opportunity of sharing in the Church's joy in the Resurrection at this special celebration in the Church of Christ our Light next Saturday night.

THE EASTER RECONCILIATION SERVICE

On next Monday night there will be two Reconciliation Services in Ballincollig: in Christ our Light at 6.30 p.m.(before Mass) and in St. Mary & St. John's at 8.00p.m. (before Mass). The form of the ceremony will be as usual: a prayerful introduction by the celebrant; personal confession to any of the four priests who will be in attendance, personal absolution and general prayers of penance. The usual Lenten Mass will follow immediately for those who might wish to remain.

The Reconciliation Service has now generally replaced the queuing for Confession that was a feature of church life some years ago. It is the form of Confession that all young people have been brought up on. For older people it is a much more prayerful form of receiving the Sacrament of Penance stressing as it does the community aspect of Christian living.


