What a pity that for many the Trinity is just an intellectual puzzle! For the believer it is a sign of how close God has come to us by revealing (but not reducing) the mystery of his Being. He draws us into the mystery making us his children by the gift.

TIME FOR THE LORD, RIGHT NOW.

Isn't it amazing how frequently we mention or talk about time and yet never think too much or too deeply about it. We constantly complain that we never have enough of it.

The flow of time is steady and silent. We scarcely notice it's movement. It is only on an anniversary or a birthday that we become aware of it's passing: "I can't believe it..... another year gone by" or when, we remind ourselves, if we have the courage, that we are 50 years old or 60 years, or "imagine we are 30 years married this year".

Certainly, in January, with the arrival of a new year, we do realise the passing of time. We look back on past years and often talk of the good old days. Our memories bring us warm feelings tinged sometimes with regret for what has passed. We wonder about the future. Because it is uncertain, we may feel a vague fear about it. Besides, the newspapers & T.V. do not give us too much hope. The media appears to predict doom and gloom.

We should not allow ourselves to become trapped in our past memories nor paralysed by fear of the future. The only moment that is ours is right now. Christ is with us. As He has taken care of us in the past He will help us in the future. Since He is a God of love He will care for all of us and support us always. Will we always have time for Him? Do we have time for the Lord, right now?

Can we imagine that a God who loves us wishes us less happiness, in our adult years than in our youth, in our old age than in our time of childhood with it's physical vigour and vitality? Some years ago while speaking with a university student, he admitted to me that he was both anxious and upset for his best friend who had quite suddenly embarked upon a spiritual journey to the East, India and Nepal, in search of peace and inner harmony. "I can understand" the student went on, "his search for peace and solitude. I experience it when I kneel or sit in church. It is quiet, just the Lord and myself. I suppose I am fortunate in that I do not have to travel thousands of miles to the Far East seeking inner peace and quiet".

In Jesus' time His followers were searching too and they were curious. They wanted to know where He was staying. "Come and See", he replied. Too many people never experience the peace and quiet of a little time alone with the Lord. Are you one of them?

How often do you actually experience the soul-satisfying body-resting practice of spending some quiet time with the Lord? We don't have to travel great distances: the Lord is with us wherever we find ourselves, be it in church, at home or in the garden. Why not make time for Him, right now?



COMMUNITY GAMES

The annual Ballincollig Community Games Athletics will be staged in the G.A.A. Grounds on Friday next May 31st. As the aim of Community Games is to provide and encourage the youth of the area to become involved in sport and cultural activities, the programme of events will include races for all age groups from U/8 to U/16. The annual athletics events have over the years encouraged young girls and boys to become actively involved, with very many taking up the challenge and joining the local Ballincollig Athletic Club. Through winning events at the local Community Games young people are given the opportunity to represent Ballincollig at the County Finals, and indeed at the National Finals in Mosney at the end of August. The programme will begin at 6.30 pm sharp to which all young boys and girls are most welcome. In the recent past Ballincollig Girls and Boys enjoyed some tremendous success at County Community Games level, with many qualifying for Provincial and National finals. In swimming Jane Lucey had a great victory in the Girls U/14 Backstroke at County level and has now qualified for the National finals at the end of August. At the same events Fiona Hedderman won the bronze medal in the Girls U/16 Backstroke. In the County Final Basketball finals the Ballincollig Boys U/16 team triumphed and qualified for the Munster Finals, which will be held in Limerick on July 13th next. At U/13 levels the Girls and Boys teams put in outstanding performances in finishing in runner-up positions to win the silver medals. The U/16 Boys team took the gold medals for their victory at Table Tennis, from which they will represent Cork at the Munster Finals on July 13th in Limerick, meanwhile the Girls U/13 Soccer team won the bronze medals by finishing in third position. On this Saturday the Girls and Boys Pitch & Putt teams will travel to Kilworth to play in the County Finals, while the County Gymnastics Finals will be staged on Sunday in Coláiste Choilm. The local Community Games Committee wish them the very best of luck. On the following Saturday June 1st Ballincollig will host the County Community Games Soccer finals in the Regional Park, where the local Boys and Girls U/12 teams will take part, and on the final Sunday (9th) the U/14 Camogie team travel to Ballinhassig for the County Finals.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

This week we have several things about which to ponder, pray and smile. What place does mystery have in our lives? There are so many things, which we encounter and with which we deal every day and all the time we do not understand them. Gravity is a good object to ponder. We may know how much we weigh and why as well, but why gravitational pulls, we might just stub our toe on that one. We can see and touch things, but are left to ponder their realities. This is a form of prayer you see and our smiling at them is a great recognition that we are quite limited. Mysteries are different from ponderables though. God is a mystery, who, even when we will encounter God in eternity will be known, only in as much as we can and not be satisfied. There will always be more of God than we can know and that will be a joy for us. One wouldn't want to be bored after the first million years of eternity, because we figured out the "rubick cube" of God. This week we could pray with humility about these things and events of our lives which so easily can frustrate us. Rather than that reaction, we could respond by genuflecting before this event or person or thing and use allow it to be a temporary or longer, mystery. Seeing creation as a hint of the Creator and the love that offers it to us, is a great beginning to bowing before the Trinity. Praying with Jesus, Who came to show us that all creation, is a blessed place, including our humanity, is a blessed place, is a grand way to prepare for the Eucharist and living it. Our reverencing of God's presence in all creation and delighting in that presence is a gracious way of experiencing the Holy Spirit who sanctifies us and all matter. The Trinity, the divine Poet, poem and teacher is only a meagre way of inviting us all to let there be mystery, but pondering and enjoying the search which has no end. Three Persons Who love infinitely themselves, and us who are the highest expression of that creative love, redemptive love, and faithful love. We pray a little more humbly this week with the mystery of ourselves pushing up against the mystery of a Trinity. He has much more to tell us and perhaps this week we can bare a little more.



TOWN CENTRE AREA 1

- Small amount of litter but large number of cigarette ends at kerbside bus stop outside Fr Sexton Park.
- Occasional pieces of litter between above and entrance to Gunpowder Mills also kerbside weeds at entrance.
- Small amount of litter and some dog fouling on footpath between above and gate to barracks. Also litter in alley beside O'Donovan's Off Licence.
- Footpath from Barracks to West End Roundabout very good however the bus shelter opposite McNamara's was littered with a large number of cigarette ends.
- Occasional pieces of litter including cigarette ends between McNamara's and Statoi. Small amount of litter inside wall of Statoi but large amount inside wall of old Xtra-Vision premises beside same.
- Remainder of Main Street very good but small amount of litter inside wall of Shell Station.
- Time Square area bad in places. Large amount of litter on site inside concrete post fence at Northern end. Litter on planted areas and at kerbsides. Bottle bank very untidy.
- Trolley bay at Aldi badly littered.
- Station Road good. Only occasional pieces of litter and cigarette ends.
- The Square was excellent.
- Chapel Lane was littered at rear of Darby Arms with Beer Mats, Straws and Bottle Tops.

AREA 2

- Churchview Estate: small amount of litter beside wheelie bins at side of Central Laneway beside girls school very good. Laneway to Muskerry Estate was littered in places. Estate good overall but kerbside weeds a problem in places.
- Station Road very good.
- Oaklands, small amount of litter and kerbside weeds in places.
- Seven bags of grass dumped opposite entrance to Hazel grove.
- Island Way, Holly Road, Castle Avenue all excellent.
- Ivy Circle, Park Road, Elm Lawn, very little litter but kerbside weeds in places.
- Shamrock Drive, very good but litter at walkway beside walkway.
- Pinewalk, Maple Lawn, Cherry Walk and Beech Road all excellent.
- Willow Drive very good. Only small amount of litter.
- Hazel Grove excellent.
- Occasional pieces of litter on verges on back road.

Overall comments from the Judge:

Cigarette ends were a problem in places, particularly at Bus Stops and outside banks, shops etc. Time Square is a problem and needs serious attention. Whilst Area 2 was excellent I did notice dog fouling on some green areas. Our Committee are regularly doing litter picks on a voluntary basis all over Ballincollig and the support that we receive during these events from the nearly 20,000 residents is minimal. This it is very disheartening especially when we see the comments expressed by the judge as outlined above. If this is what the judge has seen, what do the tourists and visitors and future investors see as they pass through or visit Your Town and Your Community.

Remember First Impressions Last
