MISSION IS SHARING

The Society for the Propagation of the Faith was founded in 1822 by a French laywoman, Pauline Jaricot. She wished to help not only French missions and missionaries but all missions and missionaries, especially the poorest.

In 1922 it became the primary organisation of the Church for supporting the activity of missionaries. Pope Pius XI instituted Mission Sunday in 1926 and ordered that it be observed in all churches and oratories throughout the world as a day of prayer and material support for missionary activity.

It was Pauline who drew up the basic plan of the Society. It is one of prayer, offering of suffering and making a financial contribution for the spread of the Faith. The Irish collection on Mission Sunday is sent in its entirety to the Missions.

Salta: many legionaries make great sacrifices in rural areas to attend meetings and carry out their Legion work assignments, walking many miles, crossing streams and rivers. In many barrios areas, where there is no church, legionaries organise church services. In the *Corrientes* area, two mission projects were carried out and activities for young people were organised. Much work for prisoners is done by *Rosario* legionaries.

BRAZIL

A vast range of work is carried out by thousands of legionaries in *Sao Paulo* through visitation of homes, hospitals, orphanages, leprosariums, shanty towns and prisons. Also visited are people of other religions, those suffering the effects of AIDS, drug abuse and street children and families of prisoners. In the *Salvador* area growth of the Legion continues with 18 new groups set up in a three month period. The mentally and physically handicapped are visited and help is given to homeless people to build homes for them.

Belo Horizontes - in areas where lack of hygiene leads to disease, good hygiene practices are taught, children of poor families are cared for while their parents go out to work and in a maternity hospital the importance of the Sacrament of Baptism is spoken about to parents and godparents. Twenty-three beggars were led to a better understanding of their faith.

BALLINCOLLIG BASKETBALL CLUB

OUR SAVE THE GYM CAMPA1GN continues to gain support from local groups .In recent weeks our club has not commented publicy on the demolition of Ballincollig Community School Gym while we were waiting for a response to a number of meetings held during the past four months At our public meeting last May it was decided to look for the retention of the Gym for the use of the local community and schools who lack indoor facilities . We have spoken to public representatives from most of the political parties and the school's board of management and have been available to speak to all interested parties. We have put forward the following proposals;

1 The existing Ballincollig Community School Gym be retained

2 The Gym be leased to a local management committee

3 The management committee would be responsible for insurance ,maintence etc..

4 The Gym be made available to local primary schools who lack indoor facilities.

5 Access to the Gym should be provided through County Council land in the Regional Park 6 Permission to allow an independent engineer's survey of the Gym.

7 The School Board of Management, Jarvis plc., Dept of Education and local groups should meet and openly discuss the various issues .

The position at present is the demolition of the Gym is due to take place around Christmas. Growing towns like Ballincollig need more rather than fewer facilities if the needs of the large young population are to be catered for.Our community thrives on its clubs and societies and the stronger they are, the stronger will be the community. Retaining the existing gym is vital for the good of Ballincollig The demolition of a good Gym and the cost of hiring a privately owned gym has already caused local groups to look for alternative venues,possibly outside of Ballincollig Once again community efforts are being downgraded in favour of the profits of multinational companies

BLESSED DOMINIC COLLINS

Dominic Collins was born around 1566 in the town of Youghal, Co. Cork. In 1598, after a military career, he entered the Society of Jesus as a Brother. He returned to Ireland in 1601, but on the 16th. of June, 1602, he was captured by the English who tried in vain to make him abjure his faith. Condemned to death, he was hanged in his native town on 31st. of October, 1602, exactly 400 years ago next Thursday.

FEAST OF ALL SAINTS 1. 11. 2002

Saints are the real historical proof of God's love for us and the possibility of personal transformation which that same love promises. In recalling the lives of these people of prayer we are challenged by them. Saints lived at a particular time in history with its own special temptations and challenges such as wholesale drift from the Church as happened during the Reformation, or religious persecution, or the lure of riches at times of prosperity. In their spiritual lives they worked out how to live out the Christian life in the face of the challenges of the time. As Catholics in today's world we too face challenges quite different from those of previous generations. Our own salvation depends on how we meet those challenges.

Questions

Q. My understanding is that we will be judged on how we behave in this life. What is the point, then, in praying for the dead? It is too late to undo any wrongs they have done.

A. Purgatory is not so much a place of punishment as a process of growth in the journey of the soul to God. The residue of earthly imperfection impedes one's reception of the beatific vision. It is purged away. As members of che Mystical Body of Christ, our prayers are accepted by God for the benefit others.

Q. Jesus said to the repentant thief: 'This day you will be with me in paradise'. There was no mention of purgatory. Where does this idea of time in purgatory come from?

A. The repentant thief had to wait at least from Good Friday until the Resurrection completed the act of salvation! The Bible also says that with the Lord a thousand years is like a single day. On departing this life one moves beyond the succession of moments which we call time, into the eternal present. Speaking of time in purgatory is a familiar way of trying to express a mystical ourification.

FORMAL RECOGNITION OF NEOCATECHUMENATE

On the 29th of June this year Pope John Paul II signed the Statutes of the Neocatechumenate, giving full recognition to this reality as a way of bringing people to faith either as a preparation for baptism or for the majority who are baptised as a way of really taking on and living their baptism. The Neocatechumenate has been in existence in the parish for about 17 years and there are currently three communities up and running. The communities meet twice a week to celebrate the Word of God midweek and on Saturday for the Eucharist.

For some it has been like a hospital where they have begun to see their lives cured (e.g. marriages rescued from disaster, people finding a meaning for living, being able to pass faith to children who had given up practice of the faith, or just being able to see the truth in the face of things like abortion or divorce). Other benefits have also followed for the people of Ballincollig. Every year since its inception there has been at least one catechesis open to all where the really Good News of the Gospel has been preached. At this stage about 2000 people must have listened to these. Also our Parish has been blessed by the generosity of two families who have volunteered to work on the missions - the Deasys are it Taiwan for the last 7 years and the Dalys have been working in South Korea for a year now. As well as that Fr. Neil O'Donoghue was ordained two years ago and is now working in a Seminary in New Jersey helping to prepare new Missionary priests.

Why is all this coming up at the moment ? Well one of the series of catecheses or talks which I mentioned already has just started and this is an invitation to all to come and listen. It doesn't matter what your situation is you will all benefit from the news that God loves you exactly the way you are. It doesn't matter what big or small problems you face in your life, Jesus Christ can solve them for you. As He said " I have come that you may have life and have it to the full". So come to the catechesis on Mondays and Thursdays in the Crying Room of Christ Our Light Church at 8.00 pm

THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING:Exod. 22: 20 - 26

The Book of Exodus in the Old Testament recounts the life of Moses, the escape of God's people from Egypt and the giving of the Ten Commandments. The latter part of the Book of Exodus from which today's Reading is taken contains special instructions in moral living for the Jews. Much stress is laid on charity towards others. Here, the treatment of strangers, widows, orphans, and the poor in general is dealt with.

SECOND READING: 1 Thess. 1:5-10

After greeting his Greek converts Paul praises the sincerity and depth of their conversion to Christianity. The cultural transition from worshipping the gods of their fathers and grandfathers must have been immense. Yet so complete was that transition that everyone in Greece is talking about it. He urges them on to serve Jesus until His coming.

GOSPEL: MT. 22: 34-40

In the first reading today we see some of the commandments that the Jews developed out of the Ten Commandments. Over the years the Jews had expanded the Commandments into as many as 613 commandments of the Law. This naturally led to confusion; hence the question put to Jesus: "Which is the greatest commandment of the Law?". In the event he tells them not only the most important commandment but the second as well: love your neighbour as yourself. The two commandments are 'like' because true love of neighbour is but an overflow of true love of God.


