The children's religion book provides a host of opportunities for parents and others to play a part in the faith development of each child.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Numbers 11:25-29

Today we hear how Moses allowed two good men to continue their work. Even in the desert, there was freedom among God's People; Moses was a leader, not a dictator.

Second Reading: James 5:1-6

People who have money and power sometimes discriminate against the poor; they may live in luxury and not pay fair wages. Such selfishness is a serious sin; today's reading tells why.

Gospel Mark 9:38-43

My first appointment after ordination in September 1971 was to the parish of St. Peter's; Woolwich, London S. E. 18. Life there was some experience, it was a massive sprawling parish with huge ethnic diversity and a very small proportion of Catholics but a great community and lots of people involved in the life of the parish. The Catholics in Woolwich then were mainly emigrants from Cork city and the Beara peninsula. The parish included three churches, five hospitals and an army barracks so plenty of variety.

The parish priest was Canon Ronald Pepper and at the dinner one day he suggested that I had a streak of "Jansenism" in me. I had heard of the Jansenist's but did not remember too much about them. The Jansenist's depicted the crucifix with rigid arms raised upwards, symbolising a salvation reserved for a few. This was a contrast to the Christ figures of the middle -ages; even nailed to the Cross they appear to embrace the whole world with their outstretched arms. The way of being a Christian is to be open to the dimensions of all humanity, in the manner of these medieval figures.

Today in the Gospel Christ frowns on the exclusivism of the Apostles, today exclusivity is a real temptation within the church. In our communities there are many little ones, weak, ill-instructed people whose faith we sometimes dismiss as puerile. Nothing authorises us to reject or despise them. Still less may we scandalise them, as though, having the monopoly of the Spirit, we were free to do what we liked.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Francis of Assisi 04-October-2003

Son of a wealthy cloth merchant in the Italian city of Assisi, Francis as a young man led the pleasure seeking life typical of young men of his class. Like most of such youths he got involved in the inter city skirmishes between Assisi and Perugia where he was held captive for a year. A fever which he contracted as a prisoner turned his thoughts to eternity. A further bout of illness resulted in his conversion to the spiritual life. When his father discovered that Francis was selling the family goods to help the poor he had him confined to a room. Later his mother released him and he went to live as a hermit in a ruined church near the city renouncing all worldly possessions and helping to nurse some lepers. He dressed in the brown woolen tunic tied with a knotted rope, the dress then worn by the poorest Umbrian peasants while he preached to the same peasants penance, brotherly love and peace.

In his newly found poverty, Francis was soon joined by a rich magnate of the city and a Canon of the Cathedral. These new recruits went to the public square where they gave away all their belongings to the poor and went to live in huts at a spot called the Porziuncola where he had restored with his bare hands the ruined church of St. Mary of the Angels. More followers joined him and the Friars Minor were formed as a religious Order. The order was approved by the Pope and Francis was ordained a Deacon and spent the rest of his life preaching repentance in the streets, in public squares, from the walls of castles. So many wanted to join his movement that he devised the Third Order, a sort of middle state between the world and the cloister for those who could not leave their families to join the First Order, or Friars Minor.


Energy Awareness Week Some tips to save energy
