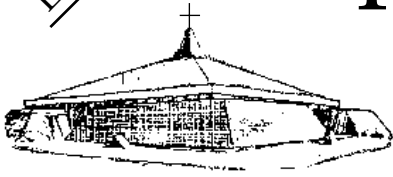

Peter, who denied the Lord three times, three times affirms his love. He learns that his share in the Lord's care for his people will one day bring him to the martyrdom of death - the early Church was founded on those who joyfully bore witness with their lives.

THE MASS IN EARLY TIMES

The Catholic who attends Mass every Sunday must sometimes wonder when this form of worship became central to the Church founded by Christ. The Gospels give us glimpses of the encounters of the Disciples with the Risen Lord in which they recognised Him in the "breaking of Bread". Could it be that these shared meals were the forerunners of the Mass as we have it? How soon after the Ascension did the Christian community begin to celebrate the Eucharist as we do to-day?

We are fortunate in having an interesting account of the early Christians' Sunday in the writings of St. Justin (born about the year 100, died 165 A.D.) This is what he wrote:

"We do not receive food as ordinary bread and as ordinary drink; but just as Jesus Christ became flesh through the word of God and assumed flesh and blood for our salvation, so too we are taught that the food over which the prayer of thanksgiving, the word received from Christ, has been said, the food which nourishes our flesh and blood by assimilation, is the flesh and blood of this Jesus who became flesh. On Sunday there is an assembly of all who live in the towns or in the country and the memoirs of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read for as long as time allows.

Then the reading is brought to an end, and the president delivers an address in which he admonishes and encourages us to imitate in our lives the beautiful lessons we have heard read.

Then we all stand up and pray. Then bread and wine are brought up; the president offers prayers and thanksgiving as best we can, and the people say "Amen" as an expression of their agreement. Then follows the distribution of the food over which the prayer of thanksgiving has been recited; all present receive some of it, and the deacons carry some of those absent.

So on Sunday we all come together. This is the first day, on which God transformed darkness and matter and made the world; the day on which Jesus Christ our Saviour rose from the dead"

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

29 Sunday Acts. 5:27-32.40-41. Ps. 29. Apoc. 5:11-14. Jn. 21:1-19. *Lect I:468*
In the gospels the disciples never catch fish without the help of Jesus. So, when they are told to go out and preach, to make disciples, and to feed the flock, they know that they will do so with his help. For now he is with us always.

30 Monday Acts. 6:8-15. Ps. 118. Jn. 6:22-29. *Lect I:472*
Stephen, filled with grace and power, witnesses to Christ, becomes a threat to the synagogue and is arrested. Jesus tells the people to look beyond the bread they eat to the mystery, and to seek him in faith.

MAY

1 Tuesday Acts. 7:51-8:1a. Ps. 30. Jn. 6:30-35. *Lect I:474*
Stephen becomes the first to die for Christ, echoing his Master's words of forgiveness for his executioners. Jesus is the Father's gift, sent to us on a life-giving mission.
St. Joseph Gen. 1:26-2:3. or Col. 3:14-15.17.23-24. Ps. 89. Mt. 13:54-58. *Lect II:1013*

2 Wednesday Acts. 8:1b-8. Ps. 65. Jn. 6:35-40. *Lect I:476*
The persecution of the Church in Jerusalem under Saul sends the Christians to preach the Good News elsewhere.

3 Thursday 1 Cor. 15:1-8. Ps. 18. Jn. 14:6-14. *Lect II:1017*
Philip asks to see and, having seen, he tells the Good News to others. He was born at Bethsaida. Formerly a disciple of John the Baptist, he became a follower of Christ. James, the son of Alphaeus and a cousin of the Lord, ruled the Church of Jerusalem, wrote an Epistle, and led a life of penance. He converted many of the people of Jerusalem to the faith and was martyred in the year 62.

4 Friday Acts. 9:1-20. Ps. 116. Jn. 6:52-59. *Lect I:481*
The conversion of St. Paul comes through his meeting with the risen Lord on the Road to Damascus. It is the same risen Lord who gives himself to believers in the Eucharist in a personal communion. That communion is a pledge of an eternal communion with Jesus and the Father.

5 Saturday Acts. 9:31-42. Ps. 115. Jn. 6:60-69. *Lect I:484*
The churches built themselves up and were filled with the consolation of the Holy Spirit. Peter raises Dorcas to life on his apostolic journey. The words of Jesus lead to life, and give life if accepted in faith.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

Monday 30th - St. Pius V, pope, 1504-1572, Dominican, who implemented the Tridentine decrees. He formed the Catholic league which defeated the Turks at Lepanto

Wednesday 2nd May- St. Athanasius Born at Alexandria in the year 295. He accompanied his bishop, Alexander, to the council of Nicaea and later he himself succeeded as bishop. He fought ceaselessly against the Arian heresy and as a result he had to endure much tribulation and was several times sent into exile. He died in the year 373.

Friday 4th - St. Conleth is believed to have come from the Wicklow area. While living as a hermit he was persuaded by Brigid to act as priest for her community in Kildare. He was venerated as a great saint and Cogitosus in his *Life of Brigid* calls him bishop and abbot of the monks of Kildare. He was buried beside Brigid in the great church there.

Saturday 5th - Blessed Edmund Ignatius Rice (1762-1844) came from Callan, Co. Kilkenny. After his young wife's early death, he sold his possessions and dedicated his life to the education of the poor. To advance his work he gathered other like-minded men who took religious vows and dedicated themselves to working for the Catholic education of boys. He is a model of patient and cheerful acceptance of the sufferings God sends, a true apostle and a deeply committed religious.

Fatima was officially recognised by the church in 1930 and now receives millions of pilgrims especially during the Feast Days which are on the 13th of each month from May to October. Our Pilgrimage will be accompanied by a Spiritual Director and representative of Premier Travel.
