### Security

We seek it here. We seek it there. We seek security everywhere. We seek security in our health, in our work, in our relationships, in our homes and especially, in our faith. The security instinct can be so strong, that when it seems threatened we develop a defensive shell that prevents us growing in inner peace by letting us settle protectively for conformity rather than courage, for selfishness rather than service, for wealth rather than wisdom, for a view about our calling rather than a vision of our greatness.

This is what happened to the people in today's gospel who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else. They saw rigid faithfulness to tradition as being an answer to God's call rather than recognising the striving and struggles of the people in their time.

To smash their shell of smugness, Christ told the parable of the Pharisee and the despised tax collector going to pray. One realised his need of God and had mercy shown him.

Donation Process                      Getting ready to give blood

- Take the give blood eligibility quiz, call us on 1850 731 137 or contact us at <http://www.giveblood.ie> to find out if you are eligible to give blood.
- Find out where and when you can give blood
- We recommend that you have eaten something and have had plenty of cold drinks
- Allow yourself about an hour to an hour and a half to complete the process at the clinic from registration to refreshments
- Come back and give blood again in 90 days. Next time, why not bring a friend!

**Registration at the Clinic**

When you volunteer to give blood you will be asked to register with the Irish Blood Transfusion Service (IBTS). We ask for your name, address, date of birth and telephone numbers. You will be asked about specific aspects of your life and medical history and also asked to fill in a health and lifestyle questionnaire. We ask that you read the questionnaire and leaflets provided thoroughly. All the information you give will be treated in the strictest confidence.

**Behaviour**

Donor Clinics must be conducted in a safe and supportive environment where the dignity of all staff and donors is maintained. Inappropriate behaviour will not be accepted.

**Haemoglobin Testing**

Your Haemoglobin (Hb) will be tested pre-donation using a non-invasive screening test that measures the levels of Hb in the small blood vessels of your finger. If your Hb level is high enough to donate, you will be asked to thoroughly read the information provided to you about donating blood and to complete the questionnaire. **Giving Blood**

Giving blood then takes approximately 8 to 15 minutes. The total volume of blood taken is 470ml, which is less than a pint.

You will then be advised to rest for a short period before going to the canteen where you will be offered a drink and light refreshments.

**Aleppo is now a Living Hell**

"This morning some "rockets launched from the eastern sector" of Aleppo landed in "the predominantly Christian district of Sulaymaniyah" in the west and "hit a school, killing at least four children," said Mgr Georges Abou Khazen, vicar apostolic to Aleppo of the Latins, who spoke with AsiaNews, evidence of the spiral of violence and terror that is engulfing northern Syria's metropolis.

"We do not want all these deaths, this destruction," the prelate said, "yet the tragedy continues and involves both sides of the city . . . Everyone here is suffering. Families in both east and west continue to count and mourn their dead."

Yesterday during his general audience, Francis renewed his appeal for peace in all of Syria, which he had called a "beloved and troubled" land in his statement announcing the appointment of Apostolic Nuncio Mgr Mario Zenari to the post of cardinal.

In asking for an urgent ceasefire to alleviate the suffering of the city's residents, the pontiff underlined and reiterated his "closeness to all the victims of the inhuman conflict in Syria". The pope called for a truce in the fighting, at least "for the time necessary to evacuate the civilians, especially children, who are still trapped by the cruel bombings". Yet, less than 24 hours after the pope's appeal, Aleppo weeps again for new victims among children. "It's always the same old story," Mgr Abou Khazen said, "with regional and international powers not working for peace. The pope's words are very important because they make us feel his closeness but unfortunately these appeals fall on deaf ears."

"The players are not interested in what is happening to people even though now more than ever a truce is needed to alleviate the suffering and bring some aid and comfort." For the apostolic vicar, a truce would be a "first step" towards gradual progression "on the path of peace to relieve suffering and fears."

"Aleppo is now a living hell," the prelate added. It is a "hell that touches everyone, east and west, full of death and destruction, refugees and lack of electricity and water, families who touch pain with their hands on a daily basis".

Such suffering "cannot be described with words," but it has not led to the loss of "hope for a solution to the conflict, because in the end, some agreement will be reached, even though selfishness now prevails." The alternative to peace, warns the apostolic vicar, is a war that from the local level "will expand to the regional and global level."
