

The Season of Lent - Third Sunday

"Is the Lord with us or not?"

A question born of frustration and fear of the unknown. In fairness, not a totally unreasonable question when people were deprived of the basics. It is a question however that our faith seeks to answer, and that answer must be, despite what might or might not be happening in our lives and world, "God is with us".

He is easiest found in moments of decency. When one reaches out to another, in situations of need and despair, God is found, and thirsts are quenched.

Few stories capture this as well as the encounter with the woman at the well. Jesus, like Moses' travelling companions, knew the ravages of thirst and sat beside a well. There he met a woman and asked for a drink. Initially she was reluctant and pointed out the differences between the two of them — he, a man and she, a woman; she, a Samaritan and the bad history that existed between her people and his and the practicalities of him not having what was needed to dip into the well and draw water. It was deadlock, stalemate and no progress would or could be made.

A conversation followed. A bit of banter between the two and it led to a place of respect. It is a conversation where judgements and assumptions are met with gentleness and respect; where the impossible becomes possible and where thirsts are quenched. For there was more than one thirsty person at that well. Water quenched the thirst of one while respect and acceptance satisfied the thirst of the other.

Maybe that's where we are today. Is it possible we have some pre-conceived notions about people and their intentions? Might it be that we feel we have all the answers when we are not even sure of the questions? Is there a chance our attitudes might change if we truly engage with another in a conversation we could never imagine taking place?

The Lord is with us! Talk to one another, listen to one another, with open hearts.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Exodus 17:3-7

The Israelites grumbled against Moses for leading them out of Egypt. They were thirsty, and there was no water in the desert, so Moses struck a rock with his staff, and water flowed out for the people to drink.

Second Reading: St. Paul's Letter to the Romans "The love of God has been poured out into our hearts," and that love is immeasurable; "While we were still sinners Christ died for us."

Gospel: John 4:5-42

Jesus approached a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well and asked her for a drink of water. This surprised the woman for several reasons. In the first place, it was unlikely that a man would ask a woman for anything and even more unbelievable that Jesus, a Jew, would ask something of a Samaritan, a great enemy of the Jewish people. Jesus explained to her that our thirst would return if we drank water from the well; but if we drank the water Jesus offered us, we would never thirst again. After Jesus told her many things about herself, she came to believe that he was the Son of God and called others to him.

COVID-19—Corona Virus

General Guidelines for all Churchgoers.

People who are ill should not attend religious services. If members of the congregation, religious leaders (e.g. priests) or others involved in religious services (e.g. ministers of the Eucharist) feel ill and may have COVID-19 (see below), even if their symptoms are mild, they should stay at home.

Holy Water Fonts

Because COVID-19 is a new disease and appears to spread easily between people, we advise that holy water fonts should not be used.

Holy Communion

Everyone administering Holy Communion should wash their hands or use alcohol based hand gel before beginning to distribute Holy Communion. Holy Communion should be administered into the hands only and NOT onto the tongue.

Only the celebrant should drink from the Chalice.

Night Prayer

Now I am going to sleep and if this sleep be for me the sleep of death then may your own mighty hand lead me from the light of this world into the great light of eternity. Our night prayers are our final conversation of the day with God, and this lovely old prayer from the Scottish Gaelic is a wonderful example of the spirit that should permeate our night prayer. This little prayer touches on so much of Christian faith and hope. It is a solemn but confident handing over of ourselves to God's loving care; it is a calm acknowledgement that we are pilgrims on this earth and that day by day, night by night, our heavenly Father is leading us to himself and to our heavenly home. Such an approach can help make our night prayer a richer experience. Many of us may have been encouraged or even dragooned, in our earliest years -'Say your night prayers' before going to bed. What did that mean for us? Perhaps it was a quick act of contrition for anything we had done wrong in the day. Now, an examination of conscience and an act of contrition at the end of the day are excellent practices, and I hope we are doing this and leading our children to do likewise. However, our night prayer is not to consist of these acts only - it is, like all our prayers, to be centred on God and his grace. It reaches out to God in gratitude, contrition, trust, hope and petition. We need not focus straight away on our failures, rather try and see how God was with us during the day, what God was doing with us and for us, and how we responded. then we can thank God for his grace at work in us and ask pardon for our failures. Finally, we can ask God for the blessings of his protection and a good night's rest - no small matter in our stressful world.
